Team debuts black uniforms vs. Troy

For the first time in FIU history, the Golden Panthers will unveil black jerseys when they face Troy on Oct. 17.

In a "Blackout game," the team is encouraging fans to wear black to the game as well.

Linebacker Toronto Smith recalls the first time he saw a team break out black uniforms, in a Louisville victory over West Virginia University in 2006. Louisville, the home underdog, came out on top in dramatic fashion.

Smith is excited for the perceived advantage his team will have against defending conference champion Troy.

"I like the idea," Smith said. "It gave [Louisville] the extra confidence with all the fans wearing black. The crowd showed they really support their football team. I think it's going to be the same for

us and Troy is going to be intimidated by all the black flying jerseys making around tackles."

Coach Mario Cristobal said the jerseys will not affect the outcome of the game, but is intrigued as well.

"That's an Adidas thing. They provided us with a blackout jersey," Cristobal said. "We felt it would be a good thing for the home crowd, and I think there is a nice buzz about it out there. It will be good to see the crowd decked out in black and bringing their best enthusiasm to the ballpark."

The consideration of a resolution encouraging the restructuring of the University's student government proposed by three senators was postponed by the Student Government Council senate at Modesto Maidique Campus in its Oct. 12 meeting.

Senators asked for time to review the claims of inefficiency in the current twocouncil system.

The resolution states that the current structure leads to two different views for the direction of FIU, which in turn leads to two different

collegiate experiences and a lack of identity for the student body.

"From seeing what I've seen, and hearing what I've heard, it's almost like it's two separate organizations trying to go in different directions," said sponsoring Senator Adam Johnson, from the College of Arts and Sciences, at the meeting. "It leads to two different identities."

When Senator Altanese Phenelus, also from the College of Arts of Sciences, asked if there were surveys performed with the student body that revealed the lack of identity the resolu-

Bay Campus met on Oct. 12 to discuss a resolution that could remove the Student Government Council presidency. They also addressed the constant absence of one of their key members, which kept them from fulfilling the agenda.

ique Committee meeting on Oct. 7, Adam Johnson, SGC-MMC Arts and Sciences senator, said that a resolution may be presented on Oct. 19 to eliminate SGC-BBC's presidency.

"They try to do it every year, so it is nothing new," said SGC-BBC President

CNN anchor highlights Hispanics in the U.S.

Sanchez's program aims to reconsider misconceptions

Hundreds of students surrounded the Graham Center Pit to watch CNN anchor Rick Sanchez broadcast live from there.

Sanchez, one of the hosts of CNN's "Newsroom" program, spent much of the program discussing Latino Americans in preparation for CNN's upcoming special "Latino In America," which will premiere Oct. 21.

During the hour-long broadcast on Oct. 13, Sanchez brought on a panel of guests including FIU President Mark Rosenberg, FIU basketball coach Isiah Thomas and FIU Athletics Director Pete Garcia to discuss the University and its role in promoting diversity.

The University's football program will be featured in the upcoming special. It is the only Football Bowl Subdivision NCAA team to have an athletics director and head football coach of Hispanic origin; Peter Garcia and Mario Cristobal, respectively.

During one portion of the program, Sanchez showed footage of FIU's Sept. 12 game against the University of Alabama during which the Golden Panthers held a respectable lead against the then No. 4 ranked team in the nation.

Later during the program, Sanchez asked Garcia, "In the end, does it matter

if you are Hispanic?"

"No. It doesn't because in the end you've got to get the job done," Garcia said.

"It's very simple. All we want to do is give people an opportunity to see who Hispanics in the United States are. It's not about celebrating the fact that they are here. A lot of people have misconceptions: what their ideologies are, what their beliefs are, where they come from. Well, here's their opportunity to find out who they really are. This is nothing more than an introduction," Sanchez said in an interview with Student Media after the show.

Sanchez also went on to discuss what he felt the significance of FIU is.

"I've gotten to know some of the folks in the administration here and it seems to me that their commitment to being an international school and taking in a global perspective is very serious," he said.

Sanchez is a South Florida native and was a former anchor at WSVN-7 News. He currently hosts his show from CNN headquarters in Atlanta, Ga.

"This is my hometown. This is where my heart is. This is where it will always be. As a Cuban American and as a Hispanic, I feel like Miami has been the gateway for other Hispanics in the United States," Sanchez said. tion describes, sponsoring Senator Vignesh Doraiswamy, from the Honors College, cited information collected in the past.

"Everybody knows that the experience a student receives at the primary campus, MMC, is completely different than the one they experience at BBC," Doraiswamy said. "And that does lead to a lack of identity as an FIU student."

The resolution states that, "A system with one unified student body leader can help fix such issues, while representing all Florida Inter-

national University students. The SGC-MMC senate encourages the student government leadership to look into creating a more unified student government to provide better results for FIU students."

Doraiswamy told Student Media the resolution intends to find a more unified student government.

"We did not call for a unified student body leader," Doraiswamy said through an e-mail. "It was presented as one of the ideas."

One of the other ideas presented was to implement completely independent councils.

The resolution uses the University of South Florida as an example

of the independent governments for each campus. It also lists the University of Central Florida as an example of a university with one united student body leader.

The resolution language, however, does not endorse one more than the other.

The resolution's sponsoring senators said they will send information packages on the subject to their fellow senators.

As of time of printing, no information had been sent to the senate. Doraiswamy told Student Media that the sponsoring senators wanted to get everything in order before they presented their case.

SGC-MMC President Anthony Rionda later told Student Media that he is a firm believer that the current system works.

"I think it is something that is necessary," Rionda said of the twocouncil structure. "I'm not going to sign anything that leads to division of the students," he said. Rionda said that now is not the time, nor is the resolution the way to address the concerns brought up.

He wants a united front when it comes time to fight for Bright Futures Scholarships or better student representation.

"We are one University," Rionda told the senate.

Now, sometimes I just get the craving for comfort food, and for me, that means anything with eggs and a side of fun conversation. So for my weekday weekend, I wanted to incorporate both those things.

I started off my weekend by going out with my good friend Christina on Tuesday night.

We first went to a Cuban restaurant called Little Havana, located at 12727 Biscayne Blvd., North Miami. If you are anything like me, you have driven past this place a million times and promised yourself that you'd go in one day. Well let me tell you: totally worth it well kinda.

You walk in, and there are cute brown rocking chairs, stuffed

It is about the size of a personal frozen pizza, and tastes like eggs with soft potato on the inside. There are no strong flavors in this. It is not spicy whatsoever, just a perfect blend of food.

Senate speaker's absences raise concerns among members

Since she is the person in charge of leading senate meetings, the senate was unable to make the meeting official.

Zapata told the senate that only De la Calle, SGC-BBC Vice President Christin "Cici" Battle, or the speaker pro tempore could chair the meeting to make it official.

Battle, who is also the president of the senate, was not present at the meeting. According to the SGA constitution, it is not mandatory for her to attend senate meetings. SGC-BBC Graduate Senator Tanya Williams was elected by the senate earlier this year as speaker pro tempore. Her role is to assist the speaker of the senate in all administrative duties in her absence. "The Speaker Pro Tempore Tanya Williams is holding the meetings," De La Calle later told The Beacon. "I have been working behind the scenes. I create the agenda and review the minutes."

senate meetings continue to be held on Mondays, but that the time should be temporarily changed to 4 p.m. Other senators are unable to make the time change.

The SGA constitution states that a quorum must consist of 50 percent of the total members plus one. In the senate meetings, there must be nine members in attendance. There were nine members present at the meeting, but there was no chair, which aggravated some members because they couldn't get any business done.

Nickolay Chikishev, SGC-BBC lower division senator, asked who is keeping track of the absences.

"I have not heard about the attendance issue until now, which is unacceptable in my part. Now that I am seeing [this], I'm compelled to do something about it," Neistein said.

Georgia Bedeau, SGC-BBC chief justice, said that according to the SGA constitution Article 4, section 5: Terms and Vacancies, a meeting cannot be held without a chair or speaker of the senate

She also told The Beacon that both Battle and Neistein are aware of her situation.

"I cannot attend senate meetings during the Fall. I have class during that time, and I need it to graduate," she said.

Zapata suggested that

"Now we officially have quorum, and we can't even have a meeting," said Andrea Cruz, Honors College senator.

According to the senators, this is not the first time attendance is an issue.

"She [De La Calle] has not been to the senate meetings for a really long time. Tanya has been the chair for the past few meetings," said Zahra Arbabi Aski, SGC-BBC lower division senator.

As stated in SGC-BBC Title IX: General Statutes, "senators may not miss more than three (3) Senate meetings or two (2) consecutive Senate meetings without properly submitting a 'Leave of Absence' form and turning it in to the chief justice. Leave of absence is only valid for the Summer term."

present.

She then called her counterpart at MMC, Juan Sebastian Gil, to clarify the situation on speakerphone.

Gil said that if quorum was met, but if leadership of the senate was not in attendance, then the senate can nominate a member to chair the meeting. If the nominee is approved with two-thirds vote confirmation of the senate, then an official meeting can be held.

Gil also extended a personal apology about the comments made by MMC members.

"I just wanted to apologize on behalf of MMC. I can assure that any type of negative sentiment is not something that we share in SGA," Gil said over the speakerphone.

Don't ask, don't tell Obama must repeal policy

Feeling a bit overwhelmed, President Obama? I feel you.

You tried your best to bring the 2016 Olympics to Chicago, only to lose in the first ballot. Your opponents applauded your failure to bring the Olympics to your hometown.

You won the Nobel Peace Prize and instead of celebrating with you, critics from both sides of the political spectrum would like to remind you that you have done nothing, except make promises. Even Saturday Night Live lampooned you as not keeping up with your agenda for change.

So why not prove them wrong, Mr. President, by fulfilling a campaign promise? Repeal the military's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy.

Under the policy, homosexuals are allowed to serve in the military, as long as details about their sexual orientation are not made public, in which case would lead to the soldier's discharge from the unit.

When former President Bill Clinton enacted this policy in the 1993, it was meant to be a compromise between the White House and members of Congress and the armed forces who largely opposed integration of homosexuals into the military, arguing it would ruin morale and unity for those who wished for the ban to be lifted.

But let's be honest, this was just a way to side step a complex issue. It's time for a real solution to the issue: allow gays to serve openly in the military without fear of being discharged. And while I have no personal stake in this as a heterosexual who has never served in the armed forces, I believe this is a step in the right direction.

It's been 16 years since the policy has been enacted, and nearly 13,000 troops have been discharged from the military for being suspected homosexuals. In a time where our war in Afghanistan is escalating, it would be unwise to let go of some of these hard working and brave individuals who served this country with honor, only to be let go because of their sexual orientation, like Lt. Dan Choi, an Arab linguist who was let go because he came out of the closet on national television.

Attitudes within inside the military have also shifted. A Zogby International poll conducted three years ago found that most military servicemen who knew of an openly gay soldier in their unit reported no problems with cohesion or morale. John M. Shalikashvili, who was chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff for President Clinton from 1993-1997, has recently called for an end to the policy, citing more studies that debunk any belief that these men and women will do nothing to deter morale or cohesion in the armed forces.

And just as we've lagged behind our allies in healthcare, we've also taken a backseat on this issue, too. Britain, France, Israel, as well as 17 more countries have allowed gays and lesbians to serve openly in the military, with little or no reports of discord among troops.

Now I know what you're thinking, Mr. President: if the Republicans can't even support me in my Olympic bid, they most certainly won't support me on this issue.

I would take the time to remind your conservative critics of another opponent of the policy: Barry M. Goldwater, who is considered by as the father of the modern-day Republican party.

"Government governs best when it governs least - and stays out of the impossible task of legislating morality," Goldwater wrote in 1993. "But legislating someone's version of morality is exactly what we do by perpetuating discrimination against gays."

Now Mr. President, I know that this issue will cause an uproar in the public discourse, but let me just point to the fact that when President Truman made the decision to integrate African-Americans to the military, 82 percent of the country was against the move. Yet his bold decision would be the first step in greater civil rights for a group that has been constantly maligned in American history.

It's time for bold action, President Obama. The question is: are you up for the task?

Report finds disparities evident within social networking Web sites

if you want to hear live music but are not too fond of straying off into bumsville. Located in Miami Beach on 1342 Washington Ave., Jazid often showcases great talent from a novel

mix of genres. Monday nights is when you'll rock to reggae, hip-hop and live art shows while your friends munch on the free supply of chicken wings. Afrobeta, a group that specializes in "electro-funk ghetto-tech house," is doing shows on Tuesdays while the DJ spins deep house upstairs. The mural on the upstairs wall is a great example of the graffiti art that Jazid caters to.

The last time I was there, graffiti artist Arthur Baute was painting on nude models - not too many people were focused on the B-boys that night.

Friday and Saturday nights at Jazid are when you'll see prominent live acts perform, and you're likely to get blasted by the immense wall of sound coming from the saxophones of Brazilian music, or bass from the hip-hop.

I wasn't always a fan of jazz music and I was skeptical that someone in Miami could claim such a status. Yet, one strum from the bass guitar pulled me into the world of the chaotic, melodic expression of jazz music.

Although I don't think I fit in with the punks, bums or dread heads, I will definitely still groove along with them – the bass, deep as the pulse of the earth, still moves us all.

Then it comes to pasta, *nonna* can do no wrong. But, what if she's on vacation?

Nunzio's Ristorante located at 11433 SW 40th St., serves up respectable Italian cuisine that will, at least temporarily, satiate your need for such comfort food.

Upon stepping into the 84seat dining room, it looks as if the restaurant is the home of a large Italian family, complete with wine bottles lining the shelves, old family photographs filling the walls and traditional operettas softly playing on the stereo. The small but efficient wait staff and complimentary warm Italian bread also makes for a hospitable experience. This would also be a prime spot for an intimate dinner.

Their lunchtime offerings include sand-

giana, the meatball sub and the Italian sub, all around or just over \$8. However, their limited lunchtime schedule (Monday through Thursday only) and their ban on ordering the sandwiches after the dinner hour could make trying one a bit COLUMNIST of a hassle.

> For dinner, one dish that stood out to me was their rendition of gnocchi, small dumplings of potato-based pasta topped with melted mozzarella cheese and marinara meat sauce. The gnocchi had a soft, slightly chewy consistency to it, unlike any pasta I had

tried before. The tomato sauce had a fresh, homemade quality; the notes of oregano and basil really stood out. I found it refreshing that the portion that I received wasn't the monstrosity familiar to most restaurants today. Instead, it was just enough to fill my plate - and my stomach.



Another stand-out dish at Nunzio's is the medaglioni gilda, made of lasagna noodles wrapped around a spinach, ground beef and ricotta filling baked in marinara sauce and mozzarella. The freshness of the spinach complimented the mild flavor of the ricotta. Both elements were a welcome juxtaposition to the sharpness of the marinara. This was also marked by a modest serving size.

I only have a few complaints regarding the restaurant. The complimentary salad that came with my meal - lettuce, onion and a lone tomato swimming in Italian dressing - left much to be desired. Furthermore, I wasn't a fan of their meatballs; they came out dry and desperately needed the marinara sauce to carry them through.

Nunzio's prices aren't the most walletfriendly. Although lunch can be had for just shy of \$10, most dinner entrées start at the \$15 range. As for their daily dinner specials, all of those cost \$16. But, if this is the price for decent, old-fashioned Italian food, then no expense is too great. Despite the minor need for improvement, I can honestly say that Nunzio's Ristorante is still a viable option for Italian food in Miami.

START THINKING AHEAD.

IS IT WORTH IT? Controversy aside, Diaries a worthwhile road trip film

Road movies are a staple of the Hollywood tradition.

From It Happened One Night to Bonnie and *Clyde*, a road picture allows for great creativity from the filmmaker; a bevy of supporting characters with great variety in locations and the ability to show the characters grow or discover some greater message or purpose.

And, in that respect, 2004's The Motorcycle Diaries is a very potent example of what a road picture should be.

A chronicle of Ernesto "Fuser" Guevara's (pre-"Che") four-month journey through South America in 1952 with his close friend Alberto Granado, this is a simple and honest story about the evolution of a young man into one of the most loved and reviled men of the 20th century.

The film picks up in March of 1952 as Guevara (Gael Garcia Bernal) and Granado (Rodrigo de la Serra) decide to travel more than 5.000 miles from Buenos Aires north through the Andes before taking jobs in a leper colony in Caracas, Venezuela. Mounted atop Alberto's rickety old motorcycle, the men search for new sights and adventure.

Hedonism is the order of the day for the two vouths until their travels reveal to them the disparity in class and wealth throughout the continent. Coupled with the beautiful, sparse deserts and fog-shrouded mountains are images of the poor, impoverished natives of the areas.

Take one instance, as Guevara is traveling down river on a river ship on the Amazon. He looks onto a smaller boat kept in tow with lower-class passengers. He sees their misery and grows a closer tie with the people. The seeds are slowly planted through the film as a revolutionary is born.

But this film is not about the revolutionary and not about the murderer or the enigma that was Ernesto Guevara. It's about the young, privileged doctor with his biochemist friend who find their paths in life.

Bernal's transformation is so profound and realistic in this film: He doesn't rely on starting to grow a beard and expounding on the beauty of Marxism or guerilla tactics. You see his disgust along with his youth-filled zeal.

The screenplay by Jose Rivera is based on the book of the same title written by Guevara, as well as Granado's Back on the Road - which presented his perspective of the real life events.

It's a personal and intimate film made on an epic scale. Your eyes glaze slightly in awe as you see the ruins of Machu Pichu, courtesy of Eric Gautier's cinematography. Coupled with Gustavo Santaolalla's soundtrack, you become transfixed on one of the most beautiful pairings of music and cinematography in recent memory.

Not enough is made of the friendship between "Fuser" and Alberto, however. Through all the trials and tribulations they witness and experience, their friendship goes nowhere. It is one of the few critiques one may have of this film.

It is essential to divorce the history and facts of who Ernesto Guevara was before entering this film. I, for one, can't begin to unravel who he was. Rather than enter the moral quandary of this issue, this film takes a more traditional and fundamental stance. It's about who he was then.

It's a similar stance that director Steven Soderbergh used when making his two part epic, Che, and though it raised many protests among historians and members of the Cuban exile community, neither film is willing to attempt to determine who "Che" really was.

I lament this and feel that a fully encompassing film on the revolutionary, poet, romantic, tactician, murderer should be made. It's not good history, for sure. But it is damned fine filmmaking.



'BEAST'

The Trojans boast four receivers with at least a dozen catches, led by Tebiarus Gill's 23 grabs for 280 yards.

Chip Reeves and Zack give Brown Marcum options to throw to as well, but the biggest weapon in the Troy offense is the versatility of First Team All Sun Belt Conference performer Jerrel Jernigan.

"They have a very high powered offense. He is a beast," linebacker Toronto Smith said about Jernigan.

The 5-foot-10 athlete had 77 catches in 2008 but also carried the ball 33 times for the Trojans.

Through five games in 2009, Jernigan has over 100 yards receiving and rushing, while acquiring nearly 300 yards on kick returns.

The wildcat formation

gives the Trojans options. "They run it out of couple of different а personnel groupings," Cristobal said of the wildcat. "Sometimes they run it with a quarterback, with Dantavious Parker. He has proven he can throw the football but he runs the ball extremely well. At the same time, they've got Jerrel Jernigan in the game, who provides a threat of the sweep and the sweep pass like they threw last year.

When [Jernigan] is in the game at the quarterback position in their wildcat surrounded with those athletes, he poses the same kind of issues. He's a guy who can run it and throw it."

Parker broke out against Middle Tennessee on Oct. 6, running for 83 yards in the Trojans 31-7 win.

"We have different adjustments depending on the quarterback that comes in," Smith said. "We're pretty much going to send people."

KEEPING UP

The Golden Panthers offense did not skip a beat after Hilton left the game in the first quarter against the Hilltoppers, as FIU had a season-high in points and rushing yards, and receiver Greg Ellingson had a season-best 132 yards.

Quarterback Paul McCall is quietly leading the SBC in touchdown passes with nine, and is third in passing yards per game (240.8). For the Golden Panthers, the defense will have to improve and contain a potent Troy offense.

During last season's 33-23 loss, the Golden Panthers recovered from a 13-point deficit to come to within three at the half. Key turnovers put the game in Troy's favor as the Trojans ripped FIU's three-game winning streak.

"Last year we lost a tough one," Smith said. "We could have really beaten them. We kind of walk into this game with a bad taste in our mouth, and knowing that we could have got them last year makes us want to get them even more this year."

Trent Richardson, Joe Martinek, Dajuane Collins, Frank Goodin and Bobby Rainey have all shared one common attribute. The five running backs have all accumulated over 100 yards against the Golden Panthers this season.

Against Troy (3-2, 2-0 SunBelt) on Oct. 17 at FIU Stadium, FIU (1-4, 1-1) will look to finally solidify the defense against the defending Sun Belt Conference champions.

On the flipside, FIU will also look to showcase an improved rushing attack that pounded WKU en route to over 200 rushing yards on Oct. 10. The breakout game was led by Daunte Owens and Darriet Perry, who both attained season high yard totals.

Troy, however, will display an offense with wrinkles that include formations in the wildcat, a popular scheme that has recently been picked up by NFL and college teams, that involves direct snaps to skill position players that present mismatches for opponents. Led by quarterback Levi Brown, and a deep core of wide receivers, the Trojans are averaging more than 30 points per game in conference play.

Coach Mario Cristobal also mentioned that Troy feels it has the best receiving corps in its history.

"They do a nice job blocking downfield," said Cristobal.

FIU's leading receiver T.Y. Hilton is still being evaluated on overall good grades In the sports world, especertain.

But with the way the Golden Panthers' 17-2 season has been going, one thing is certain: 2009 is shaping up to be one of the most memorable campaigns in

The Golden Panthers men's soccer team ended their fivegame losing streak by having the healthiest roster on the field so far this season vs. the Jacksonville Dolphins on Oct. 12.

"I am really happy tonight. For the first time we have a roster of 18 legitimate healthy players, but we are still putting band aids. We found a way to win," said Coach Munga Eketebi.

Coming off a 7-1 loss vs. Alabama in their previous game, the Golden Panthers managed to fill in the holes on defense against the Dolphins, leading them to a 1-0 win and a huge relief.

Forward Steven Jair Cabas made the penalty kick for his fifth goal of the season, giving the Golden Panthers a 1-0 lead.

"I think we need to put a hard 90-minute performance together and I think if we do that then we can play the best teams in the conference differently," Dawkins said.


Less than three minutes after FIU's goal, Tyler Williams tried one last shot for the Dolphins and it was saved by senior goalkeeper Phillip Lamarre.

"There were a couple of big saves I had to do back there, at the end of the day that's my job and the defense played well. I am there to make the stops," Lamarre said. In the 87th minute, Jacksonville came close to a tie when Stefan Runeman had control of the ball at the top of the box and found an opening to fire on goal. However, Lamarre was there to make his eighth save of the season.

"Whenever you win a game, it gets you going for the next one," Eketebi said.

The Golden Panthers earned a win, as well as confidence.

"We are still not out of the conference, we have a chance, we just have to get those four wins, " Cabas said.
