When asked about how the team was reacting to the recent loss of team privileges that she enacted, head coach Danijela Tomic talked to her team's captains for a response.

"I talked to our team captains, Ines [Medved] and [Natalia Valentin], and I asked them when the team will earn back their privileges," Tomic said. "They said 'Not yet.' They have to show us that it's not with just one win they get everything back."

The team will look to earn some privileges back when Middle Tennessee and Western Kentucky come into town this weekend.

FIU (9-8, 3-2 Sun Belt) has a chance to split the season series with Middle Tennessee (17-4, 8-0 SBC) tonight, and with Western Kentucky (17-5, 6-1 SBC) on Oct. 13. This will be an important step for the Golden Panthers to get on a roll as they look to extend their winning streak to three games, tying their earlier season high.

Tomic is looking for consistency from this team. She pointed out the team's performance against Florida Atlantic as an example of their inconsistency. "The first thing that comes to my mind is inconsistency," Tomic said. "The sets

that we won, the first set, the third set, and especially the fifth set, shows you how good we can be. There is also inconsistency, to go from one set to the next and forget what it took to win the sets."

It is not only the team aspect, but also some players that Tomic is expecting a high level of play day in and day out. Tomic spoke about junior middle blocker Andrea Lakovic's career high 22 kills against FAU, and how she expects that more often.

"I was impressed," Tomic said. "But the same thing, inconsistency. The weekend before she had four kills in two matches. You can't have a career high one weekend and then not even have any kind of presence the next. Andrea is a junior. She cannot have these highs and these lows. We need her bad game to still be pretty good."

The inconsistency has to do with the youth on the team, according to Valentin, the team's senior leader. She knows that it's not easy for young players to play at this level, but they must not get too high or low with their emotions.

"It's going to go up and down," Valentin said. "We just have to be patient. Execute as much as we can when we're playing well."

Websites prone to cyberbullying, cases underreported

Over the last few weeks, the issue of cyberbullying among students has received enormous amounts of attention stemming from six suicide incidents in the United States, each resulting from the pressures of being the victim of hate crimes.

"Cyberbullying is becoming more and more of a problem," especially with websites such as Facebook, RateMyEx and CollegeACB available, explained Erika A. Nerette, assistant director at the University's Victim Advocacy Center.

Senior Leonardo Ramirez explained how some comments referring to his sexual orientation were posted on JuicyCampus, a former gossip website that targeted college communities.

"People said that because I didn't have a girlfriend, I must be gay," said Ramirez.

"It just shows how sad people can be and how they haven't grown up."

JuicyCampus was shut down on Feb. 5, 2009 as a result of shortage in revenue.

"The site is likewise not shutting down as a result of any lawsuits or other sort of legal trouble," stated Matt Ivester, founder

of JuicyCampus on the official JuicyCampus blog. "All traffic is being redirected to www.collegeacb.com."

According to Nerette, many of these cases of cyberbullying go "underreported" at the University.

This is because most people do not know what to do when caught in this scenario, she explained.

In the case of cyberbullying she said: "people are desensitized because the person is not in front of them."

The main concern when it comes to these websites is that one does not have to log in to post a comment, explained Nerette.

Therefore, students may post a thread or comment without having his or her identity revealed.

"If you have something to say about somebody, you should tell them to their face," said freshman Brittney Polo.

Besides being disrespectful, Polo feels

it is cowardly and, as adults, people should have the respect to explain what they feel about someone in that person's presence.

Nerette explained that most students have probably posted these threads as a joke to get a laugh out of it.

According to Nerette, what is not thought about beforehand is how much one comment can affect someone's emotional stability.

"People post things that can destroy someone's life," Nerette said.

She hopes that the recent tragedies, like Tyler Clementi's suicide, will bring light to the issue.

ABC reported Clementi, 19, committed suicide after his roommate at Rutgers University secretly filmed him during a sexual encounter with a man and published it live on the Internet.

DCF won't appeal ruling against Florida's gay-adoption law

Florida child welfare administrators will not appeal last month's ruling that tossed out Florida's controversial gay-adoption law, according to The Miami Herald. George Sheldon, secretary of the Department of Children & Families, announced Tuesday his agency will not appeal a ruling by the Third District Court of Appeal that declared the 33-year-old law unconstitutional.

The ruling involved two former foster children adopted by Frank Martin Gill, an openly gay North Miami man who took custody of the boys under DCF's authorization. As of last week, the state had challenged the Gill adoption, and so, regardless of the law's status, the two children will remain Gill's adoptive children.

Chile miners rise to the surface

By Wednesday afternoon, rescuers rose to the surface more than half of the 33 miners trapped in a Chile gold and copper mine. After 69 days, the miners ascended to freedom one by one, hoisted through a more than 2,000 feet of rock in a rescue mission that began in the desert night.

As they came out in a capsule, the miners celebrated. One led the crowd in a chant for Chile, another dropped to his knees and prayed, but mostly they embraced their families.

Chilean President Sebastian Pinera called the mission "magical." Florencio Avalos was the first to step out from the "Fenix" capsule, named for the mythical bird that rose from ashes.

Faculty and students will get a first-hand glimpse of world's challenges with poverty, health and sustainability during the University's second ever Geopolitical Summit.

"Challenges of Poverty, Health and Sustainability: A Geopolitical Summit," will be held on Oct. 18 at the Graham Center Ballrooms at the Modesto Maidique Campus and on Oct. 19 at the Wolfe University Center Ballrooms at the Biscayne Bay Campus.

This year's geopolitical summit will

feature thinkers from around the world in the fields of international relations, economics, politics, health, medicine and the environment.

Featured guest speakers include Dr. Paul Collier, professor of economics and director of The University of Oxford's Center for the Study of African Economies; Dr. Len Nichols, a healthcare economist who headed New America's Health Policy Program from 1995 until 2010; and Bruce Babbitt, former United States secretary of the interior.

"The idea that a young man or woman, in some cases barely teenagers – just at the start of life – would feel so hopeless and tormented as to want to end their lives, saddens all of us," said Valerie Jarrett, senior advisor to the president at the annual national dinner of the Human Rights Campaign.

Nerette explained that students at FIU have the option to report any incidents of harassment including cyberbullying at the Victim Advocacy Center.

The student may choose to report the incident to the police or to Student Conduct.

Under the Student Code of Standards, "cyber stalking involves the misuse of computers," said Nerette.

According to the University student handbook, besides stalking, the misuse of computers includes but is not limited to: "unauthorized access, entry or use of a computer, computer system, network, software, password, account or data." For instance, hacking into an unauthorized Facebook account.

Senior Stephany Da Silva explained how someone stalked her and used her information and photographs to make a fake Facebook account.

"It just makes you doubt people," she explained.

Students may also choose not to report the incident and in any case if the person is willing, he or she may go to therapy.

"All services are free and confidential," explained Nerette.

"Cyberbullying can affect a person's self-esteem and feelings of self-worth," said Nerette. "At the end of the day, it's not funny."

Victims of actual or threatened violence are encouraged to visit the Victim Advocacy Center.

Services are available at both Modesto A. Maidique Campus and Biscayne Bay Campus and are accessible 24 hours a day through the crisis hotline 305-348-3000.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

FIU aims for win against injury-plagued North Texas

The Golden Panthers are looking to accomplish something this Saturday that they have only achieved once in Mario Cristobal's era: win two consecutive games.

"This game means a lot to us," said quarterback Wesley Carroll.

Carroll will lead the Golden Panthers (1-4, 1-0 Sun Belt Conference) to Denton, Texas to face against a depleted University of North Texas football team (1-5, 1-2 SBC) that has suffered potential season-ending injuries to eleven of its starters.

The injuries have piled up so much for the Mean Green that they're down to its fourth-string quarterback Chase Baine. In his first start against Arkansas State, Baine completed

nine passes for 77 yards, but the bulk of his yards came on the ground as he scrambled 13 times for 80 yards.

"He's better with his legs. For a quarterback, he can move so that's another weapon that he has upon him," said Panthers free safety Jonathan Cyprien. "Just knowing that into the game you can gameplan for him, but we got to take him as any other quarterback because we don't have enough film on him."

Cyprien and the rest of the defense will look to confuse Baine with different schemes throughout the game.

"That's always a technique of ours...trying to keep the quarterback and the offensive line off balance. We'll come at it as we do to every quarterback and play our defense how we know," said Cyprien, who is

led for first in the Sun Belt with ten tackles per game.

After holding Bobby Rainey, the top rusher in the conference to 94 yards last week, the Golden Panthers defense will have to line up against Lance Dunbar. Dunbar has racked up 582 yards on the ground, second in the Sun Belt Conference.

"Dunbar is really special," said Cristobal, who talked about his pre-season accolades in the Sun Belt. "He deserves all of that stuff and more."

Despite having the second best total defense and scoring defense in the conference, Carroll feels like his offensive line will help decide the result of this game.

"I think our line will determine a lot of the outcome. As long as they play assignment football, I think that we'll be able to block them," Carroll

said.

FIU has had one of the best offensive lines in the conference. Their linemen have only conceded three sacks this entire season, only twice with Carroll under center, tops in the Sun Belt.

According to Carroll, he wants to take advantage of as many man-to-man situations as he can.

"We got to find mismatches in their defense, find a way to set up one-on-one opportunities with our outside guys as with our running backs and our slots," Carroll said.

Outside of Carroll's three turnovers in his first game of the season, the red-shirt junior has settled down and has scored three touchdowns, including one on the ground despite only three interceptions.

According to Cristobal and the

rest of the coaching staff, he has only gotten better.

"He hasn't disappointed," said Cyprien, who gets to play against him in practice. "He can make something

Golden Panthers pick up first conference win at home

After a long road trip around the country, the men's soccer team (6-5-0, 1-2-0 Conference USA) faced off against conference rival Memphis (3-8-0, 0-4-0 C-USA) on Oct. 13.

The confidence of being home brought the Golden Panthers a 2-0 victory over the Tigers, especially for Sebastian Frings, who put in the final goal in the 89th minute to secure the win.

"There is a huge difference in playing at home," Frings said. "Our mood is up, our style of play is more confident, and when we have confidence in each other we find openings and score goals."

Frings is pleased with the team's progress, as the Golden Panthers have now won two consecutive contests after losing three straight.

"Team chemistry is up, I scored my first goal this season and I'm glad our team is helping the man next to him out each game," he said.

Frings scored nine goals last

season and was named to All-Conference USA Third-Team and the C-USA All-Freshman squad last season. This season, Frings is off to a slow start, but could be poised for a breakout.

Frings' last minute closer wasn't the only goal scored on the night. The opening goal belonged to Panthers midfielder Carlo Schmid early in the second half off a double assist from Frings and star freshman forward Nicolas Rodriguez.

"It was a tough time last week, recently we've all been playing better. When you pass more, you find open spaces and with open spaces always comes better opportunities and the better the chances more goals in the back of the net," said Schmid after scoring his first collegiate goal.

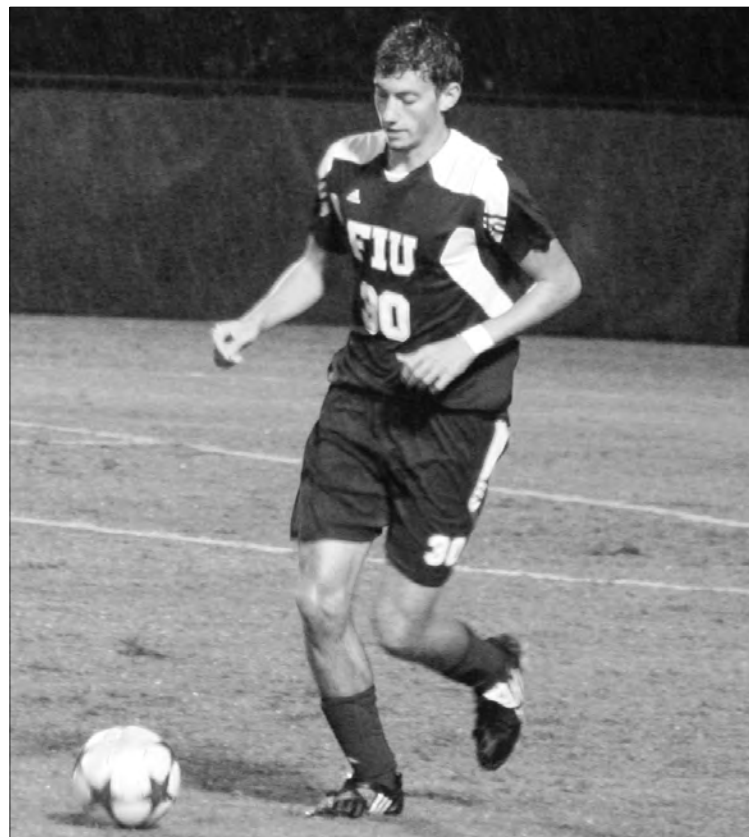
Early in the first half, the Panthers were dominated and couldn't get the ball out their own half. But, as Memphis continued to pressure into the second half, the Panthers quickly broke through on a through ball from Rodriguez that was then

deflected off Frings and buried into the back of the net by Schmid.

As the game pushed on, the Panthers spread the ball out opened up the Tigers back four. Off another swift counter attack Frings took a shot on goal only to come off the cross bar shortly after the opening goal. Panthers midfielder Jahbari Willis followed with another shot only to be saved by Memphis goalkeeper Jordan Leedle.

For the Tigers, midfielders Mark Sherrod and Liam Collins both had two shots on goal. Jamal Keene and Maxim Van Dyck also combined for five shots on goal. Throughout the game Memphis out shot FIU 13-11 and out cornered 6-3. It was the Panthers swift counter attack that sent the Tigers back home with their fourth conference loss.

The biggest story of the night, however, was Golden Panthers star goalkeeper Shane Lopez. Lopez tied last year's season high with eight saves against Memphis. He also got

FIU prepares for two-game road trip

After ending their streak at five in a row, the women's soccer team looks to start anew as they travel to both North Texas and Denver for a two-game road trip this weekend.

The Panthers are now 5-1 in the Sun Belt Conference, just a game behind undefeated Denver for first place in the SBC standing. In order to pass them, they will have to first beat North Texas on today, which will not be a very easy task to conquer. The Mean Green are currently riding a four game win streak, and have just two losses in the conference, one of them coming at the hands of Middle Tennessee, a team that ended FIU's streak on Sunday.

FIU has been a team that typically out shoots their opponents and it will look to be one of their most difficult challenges in dealing with North Texas. They average the most shots in the SBC, which

goes hand-in-hand with them having the most goals as well. Along with there great scoring is the fact they have the lowest goals scored against them, and the most shutouts.

"No matter how good your defense is, you have to give up something. We just to look for the weaknesses, and use our strengths," said Panthers midfielder Victoria Miliucci.

One player that the Golden Panthers must contain is Julie Lackey, as she ranks third in the conference with eight goals on the year thus far. FIU's game against North Texas ended in a tie last year, and have not been able to beat them since the 01-02 campaign.

With FIU's first loss, Denver is now the only unbeaten team left in the conference, and it will be the Panthers biggest test of the year come Oct. 17 when they must face the Pioneers on the road.

Nicholette DiGiacomo is both first in the conference in assist, and is clearly their most potent offensive player. If FIU

looks to have any chance of taking them down, they will first have to contain her and not let her get the ball as much as she normally does so that she does not get as many opportunities to pass the ball.

"If she gets the ball, you don't give her any breathing room," Miliucci said. "You don't want to be risky, but you might just have to be a little bit more aggressive."

FIU will be taking on North Texas Oct. 15 at 7 p.m. They will then proceed to Denver on Oct. 17 with a game time of 1 p.m.

Despite missing the Western Kentucky game last week, running back Jeremiah Harden is set to play against North Texas.

"As of right now, we feel good about him playing Saturday. We expect him to participate [in practice this week] and if everything is

good, he will be playing," Cristobal said.

Harden, normally the starter at running back, may not get the starting nod this week.

Cristobal is still unsure of who he will start as running back this week after having explosive performances out Darrian Mallary and Darriet Perry against Western Kentucky.

Mallary rushed for 97 yards and a touchdown while Perry gained 64 yards on the ground with a touchdown as well. Kedrick Rhodes also helped the running game with 57 yards rushing.

Harden, a transfer from Syracuse playing in his first full season for FIU, leads the Golden Panthers with 226 rushing yards in four games so far this season, averaging 3.4 yards per carry with one touchdown run.

The museum is a little hole in the wall in South Beach with a few surprises and bright spots.

You enter a tiny room adorned with a welcome sign to something the prudent type may not be ready for.

This museum is an interesting place well worth a visit if you are not too sensitive to explicit images.

Each room has its own theme and culture.

There are collections of

The World Erotic Art Museum is open Monday-Thursday from 11:00am to 10:00pm and Fridays and Saturdays from 11:00am to midnight.

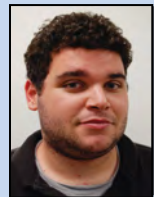
Admission is \$15.00 for adults, \$14.00 for seniors, and \$13.50 for students (with I.D.) You must be 18 or older to be admitted into the museum.

FISTFULS OF TECH!

Not in the Moodle

Students, the fate of your online learning experience is at hand.

The University is currently on the fence when it comes to what software will be used in all online and web-assisted courses.

In one corner, Moodle, an open-source educational software platform that is slowly gaining market share.

In the other corner Blackboard Learn9, the newest iteration of the system we have all grown to love...or hate? Gus Roque, e-learning consultant and instructional designer for FIU Online, gave me a tour of both systems. Currently, these are the two systems looking to replace the java-based Blackboard 8. Let's

see how they match up.

MOODLE – OPEN SOURCE IS AWESOME...SOMETIMES.

Moodle is the better-known system among students, as there are currently over 20 classes that are using the service. The system is designed around three columns of information, the central one being where all your class information is displayed.

What makes Moodle appealing is the fact that this is an open source platform. Open source software allows for an enormous amount of flexibility in that it can, with some work, be tailored to any specific needs. The platform also offers students the ability to access wiki directories and podcasts.

However, I find Moodle's user

interface to be lacking; it really doesn't look user friendly.

These types of problems tend to come with the turf when using open source anything: they require a lot of customization to be efficient.

Other complaints I have with Moodle include the overwhelming amount of information displayed on the class's homepage and the lack of announcements, a feature students are familiar with after using Blackboard CE8. Roque noted that a professor could regulate the amount of information on the class page, but few do.

In general, I'm just not in the Moodle. The allure of an open source platform simply doesn't make up for the fact that it just lacks the user friendliness that a lot of students and professors look for.

BLACKBOARD CE9 – WHOA, WAIT. SO YOU ARE TELLING ME IT TWEETS?

The newest iteration of the Blackboard has actually gone through a lot of changes under the hood, you know, the good kind of changes.

First off, Learn9's UI is familiar but fresh; gazing at the screen I had little trouble getting acclimated with the software.

Currently, FIU Online offers 14 courses on Learn9. The software itself is particularly useful as it, according to Roque, is built specifically for higher-education institutions. He added that the platform integrates well with Adobe software and other third-party services like Turnitin.com.

Learn9 also has a trick up its sleeve that Moodle doesn't. Out of the box, Learn9 can integrate with Facebook and Twitter along with sites like NBC News.

But the feature I like the most is that it provides free mobile applications for popular smart phones like the iPhone/iPad. Imagine taking a test on your iPad while sitting at home or at your local coffee shop? That is a step in the right direction in terms of keeping the convenience of students in mind.

Roque noted that in the future Learn9 will be able to integrate with eBook distributors, so a student could, theoretically, download the text for their class straight from the site and export it to their eBook reader.

Overall, Blackboard seems like the next logical step for the aging platform. Social integration, mobile apps and the fact that it is much easier to use make Learn9 quite a contender.

DECISIONS, DECISIONS...

The clear choice here is Blackboard

Learn9.

The system is specifically built for higher-ed, it offers a lot of modern features, solid technical support and requires a lot less effort to maintain and deploy.

"Though I applaud FIU Online for considering an open source alternative, in this case it's simply not the best choice for students.

Ultimately, the choice will come down to one thing: money. How much will this cost? What is the cheapest solution?

We need to keep in mind that online learning is a very forward moving trend. Pretty soon technology will allow online classes to be on a par with web-assisted, "real life" courses.

A choice needs to be made that provides students with the most feature-rich platform to facilitate online learning that is, above all else, easy to use.

Moodle is not easy to use. It requires heavy tweaking to deploy.

Blackboard Learn9 is familiar, packed with features and abilities and is custom tailored to the needs of a higher education student and faculty member.

The choice to me seems clear.

Fistful of Tech is a weekly technology column. Look for it every Friday.

Closed-source. You have to depend on Blackboard to move the platform forward.

Though the UI is cleaned up a bit, it's still not very welcoming. If CE8 looks like Windows 95, then Learn9 looks like Windows 2000.

Borat breaks standards of humor for higher purpose

Borat is quite simply one of the great miracles in cinema.

It's a comedic triumph. Nothing is to be expected or should be expected on first viewing.

It's a firestorm set along the American landscape, tearing down popular conventions about decency, behavior and common sense.

It's also the reason I'm no longer welcome at the Hialeah Muvico Theater.

Most comedies that come out today seem to have the life span of week old milk: already terrible when you take a whiff of it and quick to be thrown out.

Five years after *Borat's* release, it's still able to leave me heaving in laughter like the first time I saw it on a miserable November day in 2006.

I knew I was in store for something different by the time our sweetly offensive protagonist, Borat Sagdiyev (played by Sasha Baron Cohen), was doing televised commentary for a popular event in his home country of Kazakhstan, "The Running of the Jew."

A blend of the popular Running of the Bulls and traditional Chinese New Year Celebrations, hordes of Kazakh citizens run in fear from an oversized papier mache Jewish figure: demonic glare, fangs and all. A female figure chases more citizens down with a rolling pin and then lays an egg. Children rush as Mr. Sagdiyev urges them to crush the "Jew Chick" before he "hatches."

Borat is a television celebrity in Kazakhstan, a country plagued by three problems, "social, economic and Jew." Sent by the Ministry of Culture to learn what makes America the greatest nation in the world, he travels

around America in the greatest road film since *Easy Rider*.

Except they travel in an ice cream truck. Sometimes with a bear chained inside of the truck. And Peter Fonda never defecated next to a Manhattan office building. Or washed his underwear at the lake in Central Park

It's that kind of movie.

Borat is lightning caught in a bottle. Upon its release back in the fall of 2006, the film was not only a cultural talking point but the cause for millions of terribly forced faux-Kazakh accents at many an office water cooler.

Cohen insists on staying in character and not batting an eye even as he runs nude around a hotel chasing down his producer and sidekick, Azamat (Ken Davitian).

This is guerilla film making at its finest. Cohen as Borat, Davitian as Azamat and director Larry Charles, often with just hand held cameras,

bring common Americans into their film under the premise that the film is a legitimate documentary. Most, if not all, are not in on the joke. They are the punch line.

Cohen and Charles tried to recapture the sheer sense of shock with their 2009 film, *Bruno*. Though they met with success the second time around, that sense of discovery and unpredictable was gone. Cohen, although star of *Da Ali G Show*, was no great star. His low profile among the American public allowed him to move along the landscape without encroachment.

The full title of the film, *Borat: Cultural Learnings of America for Make Benefit for Glorious Nation of Kazakhstan* is itself nonsense, reminiscent of Kubrick's extended title for *Dr. Strangelove*.

Strangely sweet yet utterly ignorant, Borat spurts out hilariously offensive lines. Example: "I arrived in America's airport with clothing,

U.S. dollars, and a jar of gypsy tears to protect me from AIDS."

Yet people accept him for who he is.

At a Virginia Rodeo, Borat spurs on a crowd of thousands. "My name i' Borat, I come from Kazakhstan. Can I say first, we support your War of Terror." The crowd cheers.

"May we show our support for our boys in Iraq." The crowd cheers even louder

He continues; "May George Bush drink the blood of every single man, woman and child of Iraq." The crowd continues to cheer loudly.

He holds a mirror to our collective faces, and what's frightening is that, if you can actually find the time to stop laughing during the 82 minute run time, you'll wonder who we are as a nation.

The thing is, we don't need the federal government to waste money working out the kinks of legislation that will be obsolete when the newest update is released.

With so many other things to worry about, it isn't really important that the federal government spend time, money and energy to regulate something that is really better off regulating itself.

Flash cookies reappearing in your browser may seem like a gross invasion of privacy. In reality, however, it is no different from how regular cookies

operate.

We should want targeted ads as they help keep our sites free. The problem comes when Flash cookies and their ilk re-spawn in a seemingly subversive attempt to gather this information.

The answer to this is not government intervention, but awareness on the part of users as well as awareness on the side of the companies.

Flash cookies are not a new thing. They don't deserve a full-blown federal freakout. Maybe targeted ads will even help you find that perfect motorcycle helmet you were Tweeting about.

University boats used for marine research in the Everglades

The School of Environment, Arts and Society at the Biscayne Bay Campus houses five boats primarily used for student hands-on research around the bay.

The largest motor boats, a 21-foot Proline and a 23-foot Mayco, are mainly used for research along the southwestern portion of Everglades National Park, commonly known as 'Shark River,' by Michael Heithaus, SEAS director.

The boats are used as platforms to capture sharks and alligators or sampling fish populations. They are also used to take divers to reefs to conduct research or for observing dolphins.

Shark River is a 100-mile long river that is a part of the Everglades and is a major distributor of the Harney River, which resides along Ponce de Leon Bay.

"These boats are used for research on alligators and sharks in the Shark River and will also be used in studies of dolphins and small fishes in the

same area," Heithaus said.

Other professors that utilize these two boats are: Deron Burkepile and Rebecca Vega, professors of Biological Sciences. The majority of their research on these boats is done closer to shore, in shallow waters, studying coral reef and other types of microbiology.

The 14-foot boat, Carolina Skiff, supports more research in shallow waters and areas where students need to research in tighter spots.

Professors are utilizing the Carolina Skiff for collecting specimens for

labs in various disciplines.

"It depends on the project at hand, however, most of the time crews don't bring much back. From time-to-time, tissue samples are collected from the sharks or alligators," Heithaus said.

When samples are brought back, they are usually studied within various labs inside the marine sciences building.

The pontoon boat, which holds 20 people, is an 8-foot boat that hasn't been in use for some time. "Today this boat is currently on blocks, however, we are in the process of rebuilding

it for student studies of marine and biological sciences," said Joel Trexler, professor of biological sciences and director of marine sciences.

The fifth boat located is an inflatable raft recently donated by Judge Raphael Steinhardt.

Calls to Trexler regarding the cost of the boats were not returned before press time.

"We haven't used this boat as of yet, but it will be nice to have a portable small boat for getting into small creeks and shallow waters," Heithaus said.
