# Alumnus and students face felony charges in exam theft ring

Three students and an alumnus are facing felony charges as part of an exam theft ring. The scheme involved breaking into an Owe Ehan room, hacking into a professor's email to obtain unauthorized exams and selling the stolen material to students during finals week.

Krissy Demadrid, 21, Jason Caldeon, 23, Neissy Vasquez Amador, 22, and 30-year-old alumnus Alex Anaya have been charged with dealing in stolen property.

Information about their December

arrests was made available by University Police Chief Alexander Casas.

"We have two students and a former student who have been implicated in a scheme where exams were obtained without authorization and then sold to other students," Casas said.

Anaya, the alleged ringleader who began his distribution scheme fall 2013, gained access to four exams through a professor's secure email account and a fifth exam by breaking into room 219 at Modesto Maidique Campus.

# University publicly opposes boycott of Israeli academic institutions, supports academic freedom

Members of the American Studies Association recently voted to honor the call of Palestinian civil society to boycott Israeli academic institutions -- a resolution the University has publicly opposed.

President Mark B.

Rosenberg and Provost and Executive Vice President Douglas Wartzok authored a University-wide email on December 26 in response to the ASA's action.

"We support research and scholarly dialogue among all scholars including full participation of Palestinian as well as Israeli academics," the

email read

The 5,000-member national organization dedicated to the interdisciplinary study of American culture and history says it supports a boycott of Israeli academic institutions given that the institutions are "complicit in the multitiered system of oppression that has denied Palestinians

basic rights

More than 1,250 ASA members voted on the boycott proposal and over 66 percent supported the resolution.

The ASA claims Israel's academic institutions have a direct partnership with the military, citing cases like Tel Aviv University's development of weapon systems and Safed Academic College's ban on Palestinian students running for student govern-

Wartzok said the ASA should not protest the lack of academic freedom for one group by taking it away from another.

ment office.

"Progress toward solving difficult issues such as this

one will be achieved only when the academic freedom of all scholars is preserved and enhanced," Rosenberg and Wartzok wrote in their email.

### Frost art may be forgery

The painting "Untitled" that hung on a Frost Art Museum wall had an illegible date and was labeled oil on paper while director and chief curator Carol Damian thinks it's acrylic. But the painting has become even more ambiguous with critics challenging whether it is correctly credited to the late Cuban artist Carlos Alfonzo.

The work was removed from the museum's current exhibit From Africa to the Americas after outside experts challenged its authenticity. But Damian says experts are yet to be determined.

"Some people had seen the show and commented on it — a couple of so-called 'experts.' But I haven't determined who the real experts are," Damian said.

Miami developer and art collector Jorge Pérez donated the abstract work in July along with 23 other nineteenth- and twentieth-century Cuban paintings valuing more than \$315,000.

The gift also included \$250,000 for research — a donation Damian hopes will cover the expensive investigation that she said will take at least a year.

"Usually we would bring in an expert on that artist, but since we don't know who the experts are the painting will undergo scientific testing and research," Damian said.

Damian said nobody works for less than \$300 an hour.

One of the first steps will be to determine the painting's date and whether it is oil or acrylic on paper.

"It can be 1981, 1984 or 1987. It's not clear and we need to determine that to give us the ability to go into the catalogs and research what he was painting and what his work looked like in those years," Damian said.

# Parking and Transportation offering 2,700 temp spaces

First-week madness and the loss of Lot 1's 230 spaces with Parking Garage 6 construction may leave University-goers in a scramble to find parking, but the Office of Parking and Transportation is offering over 2,400 additional parking spaces and extended shuttle services through January 10.

The department hopes to alleviate congestion with temporary parking areas at the northeast corner of campus, east of Parking Garage 5-Market Station; Tamiami Park, east of FIU Stadium, south of Lot 6;

Fair and Exposition, east of the Wertheim Performing Arts Center, south of Lot 5; and the Engineering Center located at the intersection of SW 107 Ave. and Flagler Street.

Expanded shuttle service will include transportation to and from the Graham Center and PG5, to and from the Health and Wellness Center and School of International and Public Affairs and the western side of Tamiami Park, to and from the drop off area between Frost Art Museum and Blue Garage and the Fair and Exposition, and to and from Frost Art Museum and the Ryder

Business Building and the Engineering Center.

Additional Panther Mover pick-up and drop-off areas will be available at temporary parking areas at Tamiami Park, PG5 and the Fair and Exposition at peak hours between 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. and 6 p.m.

There will also be additional entrances: Fair and Exposition at SW 107 Ave. and SW 19 St., Tamiami Park at Coral way and SW 112 Ave. and an entrance east of the Florida Turnpike at SW 117 Ave. and SW 21 St.

### Iraqi troops press battle in West with Al-Qaida

Under siege by government forces, al-Qaida militants tried to strengthen their hold on two of Iraq's main Sunni cities Friday, telling residents that they were defending them against the Shiite-led

Iraqi troops and allied tribesmen surrounded the western city of Fallujah and fired artillery at a nearby area where up to 150 militants were stationed, a military official said, speaking on condition of anonymity as he was not authorized to release information. Troops also made forays into the city of Ramadi, he added.

#### Police seeking killer of Rwandan spy chief

A Rwandan man was reportedly being sought Friday by South African police in the death of former Rwandan spymaster Patrick Karegeya whose body was discovered in a plush Johannesburg hotel on New Year's Day.

According to the opposition Rwandan National Congress coalition and the local New Age newspaper, the man was the last person to be seen with Karegeya. However, police would not confirm nor deny it, saying they were chasing up several leads.

### Four arrested for exam theft, dealing in stolen property

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exams for \$150 a piece and he has also been charged with theft

Lamadrid and Caldeon were involved in the distribution of exams and the collection of money.

Lamadrid claimed to be the financial manager of the operation and was found with approximately \$860 on her person — money she claims she was entrusted with to purchase exams on behalf of

Calderon claimed the exams were obtained by a former student, presumably Anaya. Police reports state that Vazquez was also a financier of the operation. All students acknowledged they knew the exams were stolen.

In total, three exams were compromised. One class and a limited number of students were impacted. University officials did not name the professor or the affected class, but Casas said a microbiology exam was compromised. Finals proceeded as

William Beesting, associate dean of undergraduate education, said he has never seen academic dishonesty "on this kind of scale" but he believes the community can benefit from the incident by inciting others to step forward in light of such dishonesty.

"I have seen students that are obsessed with a goal -- for example, going to medical school -- and they forget or ignore any ethics. Anything justifies the goal. Whatever it takes," said Astrid Arrarás, senior lecturer and undergraduate adviser in the School of International and Public Relations. "But I have never heard of

While University members say they have never witnessed academic dishonesty at this scale, the exam theft ring is only the latest of several high-profile cheating allegations at state universities in recent years.

Many are cases of cyber security. The University of Central Florida made national news in 2010 when about 200 students came forward to admit involvement in purchasing and accessing a test bank sold online. Students had to retake the exam and complete an ethics course.

Central Florida Future, UCF's student newspaper, reported in 2012 that the university would start denoting cheaters with a "Z" designation on students' transcripts.

Cheating has also plagued schools like Florida State University, which discovered that 61 athletes in 10 sports had committed academic fraud in 2009, and University of Florida, where a professor found that over 240 students in a computer science class had cheated in 2012.

Casas said updating security systems including cameras and locknetics is an ongoing process. "No security plan is 100 percent perfect," Casas said. "When it comes to cyber security, the most important element is the human element."

Casas said universities are facing big problems both psychosocially and in cyberspace, but are maintaining integrity.

"You demonstrate integrity when you find things that are wrong and show the community that you found it and you're fixing it," Casas said. "I think that builds confidence in the University."

Under Florida statute, those who knowingly purchase stolen property face second-degree felony charges whereas those who steal and then plan to sell stolen property face first-degree felony

Lamadrid faces six felony counts of dealing in stolen property, Amador faces three and Anaya and Calderon both face one.

Hearings will take place Jan. 8 and 9. The investigation is ongoing and the University said in a statement that new, relevant information will be provided when available.

years," Damian said. "That will lend information regarding the kind of imagery he was doing or not doing at a particular date in time."

In a statement, Pérez expressed "total shock" at the news.

He said he purchased the painting in 1997 from a reputable source and it hung in his home for over 16 years without anyone questioning its authenticity.

As part of a study collection with the Cuban Research Institute, the work was not yet part of the museum's permanent collection. If the painting is in fact forgery, Pérez has promised to replace it.

### Professors and administrators ignore boycott

Affairs, agrees.

"I'm proud of the University for making its statement," Katz said. "There's this huge academic backlash and the list of opposing institutions is growing everyday."

FIU joins Harvard, Yale, Boston University, University of Florida and University of Miami in opposition.

Katz outlined three opposing reasons the boycott, citing the importance of communication, the concern of discrimination and the academic strength of Israel's institutions.

"For one thing, academic boycotts are a bad idea because conflict means we should speak more, not less," Katz said. "Shutting off universi-

ties means closing off that communication."

The ASA will not allow academia. representatives or ambassadors of Israeli academic institutions including deans, rectors and presidents, to participate in conferences or public lectures. The association will not participate in conferences or events sponsored by Israeli universities either.

"You can't regulate communication between institutions just like you can't regulate two people," Katz said. "Breakthroughs are made at these conferences and they are needed to generate research."

Katz also feels Israel is being singled out.

"There's no boycott against Syria or Tibbett," Katz said. "I'm nervous about the motivation."

Katz said Israel's institutions are crucial to

"The boycott would shut off crucial, important research in areas like aerospace and agriculture," Katz said. "We need Israeli institutions."

While ASA's boycott targets institutions and their representatives, it said it will not regulate individual scholars, students or workers. While the organization will not collaborate with Israeli academic institutions, it said the boycott will not curtail dialogue between American and Israeli scholars.

Still, academia opposes. And while FIU is not a member of the ASA, Penn State University at Harris-

burg and Brandeis Univer-

sity have withdrawn their

"If you call for a party and no one comes, that's not a party. If there's a call for a boycott and no one joins then there's no boycott," Katz said. "I hope the boycott is ignored and it becomes meaningless."

She mentioned that, as a candidate, you have to be personable and appeal to all of the judges.

This is not an easy task since each of the judges are well rounded and different from each other.

She also talked about how the judges look for a candidate who will represent FIU well.

In the formal interview portion of the competition, the judges will ask about anything from social media to the economy.

"The interview was the one you had to prepare for the most," said Diaz. "It's hard because they can ask you about anything. You won't know if they'll ask you about your charity platform or gun control!"

She explained that being in this competition means being very well versed and always being up to date with current news and events.

Diaz mentioned this as one of the most challenging aspects of the pageant and said that, "You're blind when you come into the interview because you don't know what you're

going into. Even if you watch the news and are knowledgeable in a variety of subjects, it's still nervewracking because you never know what the judges will ask."

She explained that the most common misconception about the pageants is that they are all about looks.

"Yes, there is a swimsuit section but it's a scholarship pageant so you have to be smart. You have to know how to talk to people you don't know and you have to know how to answer difficult questions on the spot."

As a communication arts major, she spends a significant amount of time in the studio which has helped build her communication skills thus making the interview section less difficult for her.

### Panthers defeat FGCU, stumble into new year

As everyone counted down to the holidays and planned what gift to get their loved ones, the FIU men's basketball team spent their break on the hardwood taking on some of their most top-notch opponents of the season.

In what was the largest attended home game of the season, the Panthers played host to last season's sweet-sixteen Cinderella team in Florida Gulf Coast University.

In the first nationally televised game on the Lime Court, the Panthers clipped the Eagles in a 72-61 win.

The Panthers have been led by the "Batman and Robin" duo of senior Tymell Murphy and redshirt senior Rakeem Buckles. In the matchup with FGCU, Murphy withstood the fast paced Eagles, finishing with a game-high 23 points, as well as a perfect 10-of-10 from the free-throw line. Buckles added a double-double, with 11 points and 13 rebounds.

Entering the New Year, the two had combined for 47 blocked shots (24 -

Buckles; 23 - Murphy), the most by any two players in Conference USA.

Size has also been a plus for the Panthers. Standing at 6 feet 5 inches and 6 feet 7 inches respectively, Murphy and Buckles lead the conference in rebounding.

Buckles has been hovering around with some of the nation's top rebounders, reaching as much as second in the nation in that category.

After the FGCU game, the Panthers had a two-week layoff before hosting last year's National Champion Louisville Cardinals. The Cards, ranked sixth in the country during their matchup, were led by Hall of Fame coach Rick Pitino.

The game was scheduled as a part of a contract when Richard Pitino was the leading man for the Panthers.

When Pitino left FIU for Minnesota, Louisville had the option to cancel the series.

Father Pitino chose to honor the contract and play FIU, the first time ever that a National Champion has played at the U.S Century Bank Arena.

The bench for the Panthers struggled to cut into the Cardinals lead, only accounting for five points in the contest.

"We played against a very good basketball team," Head Coach Anthony Evans said. "We went out there and played good in spurts. I think their depth wore us down a little bit and they finished the game."

The dynamic duo of Murphy and Buckles were kept in check by the Cardinals, as Murphy finished with 16 points and Buckles with 13.

Buckles had originally started his collegiate career with Pitino and the Cardinals, but a series of devastating injuries ended his tenure at Louisville.

At the time, Richard Pitino was an assistant for the Cardinals and when he was named the head coach for the Panthers, he was accompanied by Buckles who came back to his hometown to play for FIU.

"I treated it as another game. I didn't really see them guys as anybody special, I just wanted to win," Buckles said after the game.

A week after the loss to the Cards and celebrating Christmas with family and friends, the Panthers headed up to the nation's capital to face the Georgetown Hoyas in their final game of 2013.

The game was the thirdstraight game that FIU was featured on Fox Sports

1, making it more regular-season national TV exposure than last season and one game short of the 2011-12 season.

Whether it was the cold weather or the week in-between games, the Panthers were unable to end the year on a happy note, losing to the Hoyas 92-57.

A 30-4 run helped the Hoyas offense gain momentum and keep the Panthers grounded.

It wasn't until there was 6:57 left in the first half when the Panthers took a bite out of the Hoyas lead and began running their

offense.

Evans chose to start the game with regular starters Murphy, Buckles and freshman Jason Boswell on the bench.

"We started off the game with a whole different chemistry, a whole different fire that starts the game," Boswell said. "Us not starting the game definitely messed up the teams flow but coach, he's a great coach. He's willing to teach us a lesson. We messed up, you have to deal with the consequences."

Eight different Georgetown players attributed to a

season-high 50 points in the first half, 30 of which came from in the paint.

The Panthers have also been playing minus their senior point guard Ray Taylor.

Taylor played the first seven games of the season before eligibility questions arose, forcing him to leave the team for the time being.

There is no timetable to if or when Taylor will return to the team.

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### Freshman uses NBA family to improve his game

Many college athletes look up to professional athletes in order to improve their game, but rarely does the college player have not

one, but two, family connections to the big leagues.

FIU freshman Jason Boswell is the exception.

The Bronx native is closely related to Cleveland Cavalier point guard Kyrie Irving. The two are first cousins, and for Boswell, it's been a positive note in his basketball career.

"It's fun because whenever I get into a tough spot, I got people I can talk to," Boswell said. "I speak to Kyrie a lot and for the most part I get a lot of good advice from him. Try to play with a lot of poise. Be deceptive."

Boswell is also first cousins with Lance Thomas, former forward for the New Orleans Pelicans, now member of the Guangdong Foshan Dralions of the Chinese Basketball Association.

Boswell grew up with Irving. Both their fathers played pickup basketball games as the cousins watched from the sidelines. As time went by, the two kids would later play each other for fun, and with Irving already a top athlete in the NBA, it gives Boswell an advantage on what to work on to become a better player himself.

"Try to play with a good pace and try to change speeds a lot is what he tells me," Boswell said.

Boswell, who is averaging 4.5 points per game, is still learning the system of new Head Coach Anthony Evans. Boswell did not start the season as the team's starting point guard, but with NCAA eligibility concerns hovering over senior Raymond Taylor, Boswell was thrown into the fire and is adjusting as days go

"Ray's my teammate, my friend. I want him to come back but if he can't I still have to play, I still have to step up," Boswell

As a student at Florida Atlantic

University, Taylor declared for the NBA Draft after the 2011-12 season. According to the NBA, Taylor was included in the early draft list released on May 3, 2012, but listed as having withdrawn from the list on June, 20 2012.

According to the NCAA manual, the deadline to withdraw was April 10, 2012.

With Boswell taking over the starting point guard position, each day has become a learning experience for the college rookie.

"I think I'm adjusting more every game," Boswell said. "The team is starting to gel better each game. I know we had a couple tough losses but those are all learning experiences for us."

Boswell was recruited by schools such as Pittsburgh, Oklahoma and UCLA, just to name a few, but ultimately decided to begin his college career at FIU, most in part to what Evans, a New York native, told him during his recruiting period.

"Coach has a New York background so that relationship was there and I can trust him," Boswell

said. "He was 100 percent honest with me when he was recruiting me and that's what really sold me."

Evans is known to help players reach the NBA level, most notably Kyle O'Quinn who played under Evans at Norfolk State. According to Boswell, Evans is a big reason why O'Quinn was able to make it to the Orlando Magic.

"The kid [O'Quinn ] wasn't that good when he started playing basketball and now he's a professional athlete," Boswell said.

O'Quinn led the Spartans to their second round win over the second ranked Missouri Tigers during the 2012 NCAA Basketball Tournament.

Prior to playing for the Spartans, O'Quinn had contemplated quitting basketball to pursue football. Under Evans, O'Quinn earned several awards, such as the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Player of the Year and was twice named the MEAC Defensive Player of the Year.

Though Boswell chose to leave his hometown for Miami, he still has a little bit of New York in his new state. Senior forward Tymell Murphy was also born and raised in New York, is giving Boswell an easier transition to the new chapter in his life.

"It makes it a lot easier to adjust to because I got people I can relate to," Boswell said.

The lifestyle and culture of Miami has been different for Boswell, but having the close relationship with his coach and teammate, has allowed for him to easily adjust to his new life.

"They understand where I'm coming from, so they understand why I do certain things. So it makes it a lot easier," Boswell

Standing at 6 feet 6 inches, Boswell is taller than most other college starting point guards. His size, though, does have its benefits.

"It has its advantages and disadvantages but I take it more as an advantage because I can use my size," he said. "I'm not just slow—I'm actually quick so that works in my advantage."

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# Women's basketball remained busy over break

Over the duration of the break, up until Jan. 2, the Panthers went 3-2 and went 1-1 in the two tournaments that they participated in.

FIU participated in the Gator Holiday Classic in Gainesville, Fla. on Dec. 20-21 and hosted the FIU Fun and Sun Classic on Dec.

The lone game that FIU played over the break that was not a part of a tournament was the 70-65 win on the road against Tennessee Tech on Dec. 16.

In addition to the games, the team has taken advantage of extra practice time, and players such as senior guard Jerica Coley and sophomore guard Taylor Shade have used the extra time to work on certain aspects of their game.

While Shade is on break from being an FIU student, she has been using the extra time to focus on the student side of the game of basketball through film.

"I'm just trying to break down what I can improve and what the defense may do and then coming to practice and kind of just feeding off Jerica [Coley] as well and just listening to the coaches and doing what I need to do to help the team win," Shade said.

Coley had herself a couple shining moments including scoring a career high 47 points against Wake Forest on Dec. 29. This feat also broke the school record for points in a game previously held by Albena Branzova, who scored 45 points in 1993. She was also named Conference USA Player of the Week on Dec. 30.

Despite that, the senior still took the extra time off from school to work on some aspects of her game.

"Just always do extra shooting and watch some

extra film which I don't do that often but I need to do and so I will probably do that a little more," Coley said.

#### Russo Nearing 700th Career Win

As of Jan. 2, Head Coach Cindy Russo stands at 694 career wins in her 35th season roaming the sidelines for FIU women's basketball.

Russo stands six wins shy of joining the 700 club which is a plateau that only 16 other coaches in NCAA Women's basketball history have reached.

When Russo was asked about it, she seemed more concerned about just getting victories and more focused on this season than the accomplishment itself.

The 700th win can happen as early as Jan. 22 when the Panthers host the University of North Texas.

"I didn't even know anything about it, but you know right now winning games mean more than the honor to me," Russo said.

# Jerica Coley: an overlooked superstar

It isn't a shock that some of the nation's top athletes c h o o s e to attend schools other

than FIU, but when one of the top scorers in women's basketball stays true to her commitment, you would think there would be more buzz on campus.

But there isn't.

FIU is home to the nation's second ranked scorer and leader in Conference USA in senior Jerica Coley, but according to the FIU Athletics website, women's basketball home games only average 373 people per game.

It's no surprise that Miami is not a sports town. As much as people want to believe it is, people would rather spend three hours out by the pool or beach with a drink in one hand and their phone in the other.

Most recently, Coley dropped a mere 47 points against Wake Forest, the second-highest scoring night in C-USA history, the most points by any FIU player (men's or women's) at home and was named C-USA's player of the week. She accounts for over 40 percent of her team's offense, leads or is in the top two of every school record, yet the team is only 5-7.

Now just to add to the rarity of having a player such as Coley representing a team, prior to the start of their inaugural season in C-USA, Coley was named the Sun Belt Conference Female Athlete of the Year and only the second student-athlete from FIU to earn such honor.

She was also named the Preseason Conference USA Player of the Year.

Coley can fill a wall from top to bottom with the awards she has earned during her time at FIU, but has yet to earn the grand prize in a National or even Conference Championship.

Granted, the team is missing arguably their second best player in senior Marita Davydova, the Panthers haven't seemed to have done due diligence for both Coley and Head Coach Cindy Russo, whose been with the program before many of you reading this were even born.

Last season, the Panthers finished 19-13 with both Coley and Davydova playing all 32 games. It's too early to tell how much of an impact the loss of Davydova will be, but it may also force Coley to continue to post 40-point games and possibly add more awards to an already stacked resume.

Davydova isn't expected to return this season after eligibility concerns arose prior to the start of the season.

With that being said, one would think it would give fans more of a reason to support a team, or shall I say a single player who will show people outside of Miami who and what FIU is all about.

For us who grew up or simply live in Miami, it may be hard to miss FIU. But believe it or not, once you reach the state line, FIU just brings a puzzled look to the faces of others.

FIU has not reached the national level of UM or FSU. Maybe with the success of Coley and having two possible pro bowlers in the NFL it could be, but I'm not holding my breath on it.

For a team struggling to make a dent in the conference, Coley has hit numbers that even LeBron James would be impressed with. Yet with even all the success she's had and the "Holy Coley" era sweeping through campus, the support has been non-existent.

There are no numbers to truly back it up, but I'm confident enough to say that FIU is one of the top schools in the country where students wear apparel for other institutions other than the school they pay good money to attend.

Unfortunately, the image of not being a sports town will forever be tied to Miami.

When the world witnesses fans leaving early from an crucial NBA Finals game, only to storm back banging at the doors at the American Airlines Arena and become the butt of everyone's joke, it's going to take more than season tickets to get rid of that stain.

I'd like to think that the city has spectators more than it does fans, and there's nothing wrong with that. I've never been but I'm sure there's more to do on South Beach then there is in Alabama or Kentucky.

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
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

### FIU signs partnership with Royal Caribbean

The University and Royal Caribbean Cruises Ltd. made their partnership official on Dec. 11 by signing a contract.

The deal allows Royal Caribbean to break ground on their new facility at Biscayne Bay Campus.

"Public-private partnerships such as this one are essential to the vitality of our university and our community. This is win-win for our students and for Royal Caribbean," said president Mark B. Rosenberg in a press release.

"Through this innovative relationship with industry leader Royal Caribbean, our students are going to gain access to this fantastic facility and internship opportunities with some of the best talent in the business."

In September 2012, the University published an invitation to negotiate with the company to build and operate a production, rehearsal and performance facility at BBC. The 130,000-square-foot, \$20 million facility is expected to open in January 2015.

It is unclear how this will affect student housing life at the Biscayne Bay Campus.

According to a powerpoint presentation obtained by

Student Media, Royal Caribbean will invest \$6.5 million into renovating the current Bay Vista facilities to provide housing for RCL employees.

In 2008, Architects and Engineers conducted an assess-

ment of Bay Vista and reported \$12.5 million in and building deficiencies. They also noted \$2.5 million in amenity improvements, along with a recommendation that the investment could not be justified.

The project may displace Bay Vista residents for at

least a year, but the University and its new partner remain

"Royal Caribbean considers South Florida home, and what better way to give back to the community than to be able to enrich the education of FIU students," said Richard Fain, chairman and chief executive officer of Royal

The new facility is expected to feature a state-of-the-art rigging system, a 300-seat black box theater and 20,000 square feet dedicated to costume creation and storage.

The partnership provides Royal Caribbean with the opportunity to help train FIU students in other areas of the business through internships in operations and management, according to a press release.

The partnership will open extraordinary opportunities for students and faculty in the College of Architecture and the Arts and the Chaplin School of Hospitality and Tourism Management including 20 internships (corporate and shipboard), access to the unique training facility and access to data and other proprietary information to be used for research purposes, according to the press release.
