

Panther to premiere horror film at AMC Aventura

Jarrod Knowles, a senior information technology major, is hitting the red carpet.

A film that Knowles directed titled "What Lies Beyond... The Beginning" premieres at AMC Aventura 24 on April 10 at 7 p.m. While Jarrod Knowles's background has largely been in computers, he developed an interest in the cinematic arts when he was younger.

"Once, I saw a film, and wasn't impressed. I wanted to prove that I could make something better," he said. "I found myself writing a script that night."

The script eventually resulted in his first film, "Game Over". Internet Movie Data Base describes the film's storyline as a "game of poker [becoming] a game of survival."

"This was my first foray into filmmaking", Knowles said. "It attracted investors throughout the community."

Some of his investors include individuals from the Bahamas, and friends from FIU. Ultimately, Knowles raised \$10,000 for "What Lies Beyond."

Knowles, born in Nassau, Bahamas, moved to Miami to pursue his degree at FIU in 2008.

He described his upcoming film as creating a typical "kids in the woods" style horror movie, as its plot involves "a group of eight college students with a witty chaperone" venturing into the forest, where "all hell breaks loose."

One thing that differentiates "What Lies Beyond" from other films in the genre, according to Knowles, is its diverse cast.

"It isn't just a bunch of white kids or black kids," he said, pointing out the presence of multiple ethnic groups, including Iranians and Brazilians.

Student Media asked Knowles what his inspiration was behind producing horror films, and he cited an economic approach.

"I'm more of a businessman than an artist," Knowles said, mentioning that he "found horror to be easier to produce with less money."

According to Knowles, the reason behind the cheap cost of making a horror movie is due to lack of a need for expensive stars, and more of a demand for thrills.

"When was the last time you saw Will Smith in a horror movie?" he said. "People [just] want to see the horror."

On the Facebook page for the film's opening night, Knowles told attendees that the "hashtag of the night" is "#MiamiOscars." He said he wanted the hashtag to inspire the Miami film community with an event that would be just as appealing as the Oscars.

The aim of the hashtag, according to Knowles, was to "come up with a way to get people excited."

"There's going to be lots of press, even mainstream press, at the red carpet event," he said, later mentioning that its premiere at AMC, and the formal dress of the event, would also be important factors.

Knowles also hopes that his story will "show people that dreams are real."

"You need to find time to make your dream come true," said Knowles. "It can't be a hobby."

Knowles plans on continuing in the film business once budgetary funds are available. He described his next film as being "Punisher meets Colombiana", and will be called "Tried."

"A girl gets fired from her job, comes home to find her husband cheating on her, then finds out that her family has been killed," said Knowles, saying that these events would cause the protagonist to set out on a journey of revenge.

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Chairman proposes changes to red-light camera laws

More than 1 million citations were issued for red-light camera violations statewide last year -- more than 15 times the number of tickets issued by law enforcement.

Whether or not this is a good thing, however, is debated.

The Senate held a committee hearing to discuss some heavily controversial bills on the cameras on March 27 where Senate Transportation Chairman Jeff Brandes, who previously opposed red-light cameras altogether, simply proposed some modi-

fications to the current law. Suggestions included: allowing motorists to employ a "rolling stop" at speeds up to 15 mph when taking a right-on-red turn when no pedestrians were in the crosswalk, and that owners of vehicles caught on camera going through traffic signals 0.5 seconds after the colors changed from yellow to red can only be issued a warning.

Every amendment proposed by the chairman was either rejected or postponed.

"Changes like that just make common sense," said Vinesh Kanusing, senior marketing major. "When motorcycles have to stop and start, it ruins their engine. Anybody who knows about motorcycles I'd rather a police officer tell me what I had done right then and there so that I can know not to do it again.

would know that, and you'd think that the Transportation Committee would pass something like that earlier."

Other students oppose red-light cameras

altogether, like Sofia Schlossman, a senior biomedical engineering student.

"A human should be making those decisions, since every situation is different," she said. "I'd rather a police officer tell me what I had done right then and there so that I can know not to do it again."

But the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles found in a January 2013 analysis that a total of 44 percent of community police departments saw a reduction in side-impact crashes, 41 percent experienced a reduction in rear-end crashes and 56 percent reported a

'Cuban Twitter' heads to hearings in congress

The head of the U.S. government agency that secretly created a "Cuban Twitter" communications network designed to undermine the communist government in Cuba is expected to testify next week before a senator who thinks the whole idea was "dumb, dumb, dumb." The congressional hearing could resolve key questions around the clandestine program, including whether the Obama administration adequately informed lawmakers about its plans. Administration officials on Thursday defended the program, saying it had been "debated" by Congress and wasn't a covert operation that required White House approval. But two senior Democrats on congressional intelligence and judiciary committees said they had known nothing about the effort.

Kerry: US reconsiders role in Middle East peace talks

The Obama administration will reevaluate its role in foundering Middle East peace talks following actions by both Israel and the Palestinians that have brought the negotiations to virtual collapse, U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry said Friday.

A visibly downbeat Kerry, who has spent the better part of his 14-month tenure as America's top diplomat trying to cajole the parties into talks, stopped short of declaring the peace process dead. But in his most pessimistic assessment of the situation since talks began last summer with an end-of-April target for a deal, Kerry made clear his patience was near exhausted. He said it was time for a `reality check."

Pollard talks latest twist in long legal US saga

The arrest of Jonathan Pollard nearly 30 years ago set off an emotional legal saga that has confronted American presidents and Israeli prime ministers, wound through the courts and divided those who say the convicted spy has paid his debt to society and those who contend the damage he caused was incalculable. News that the Obama administration was considering releasing Pollard early from prison revived the familiar wedge between his supporters and detractors and focused new attention on the sensational espionage case of a U.S Navy intelligence analyst who got caught spying for Israel, only to become a key figure in a high-stakes diplomatic bid to rescue sagging Middle East peace talks. By Friday, however, the Mideast peace talks were on the verge of collapse, along with Pollard's latest prospect for freedom.

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Florida Prepaid becomes too expensive for some

The number of people investing in Florida Prepaid dropped 30 percent during this season's open-enrollment

What once gave peace of mind to parents who could ensure a college education for their child has now become increasingly more expensive with rising tuition, thus making it

"The Prepaid plan was very cheap when I started paying for it in 1992 when my son was born and same for my daughter in 1996," said FIU parent, Diego Jones. "But I do not know what I would have done back then if the rates were what they are today."

Indeed, the price of tuition has skyrocketed and so has the price of the Florida Prepaid program, leaving parents scrambling. It costs \$350.35 a

newborn in a four-year university plan. Parents who previously wished to lock in a lower price of college education for their kids are finally drawing the line as the plan becomes unaffordable for many people.

"There is no way I am paying for the Florida Prepaid plan," said Cristina Martinez, an alumna who is looking for ways to save for her year-old son's future education.

"I have talked to all my friends who have kids and we all agree that the plan is just unrealistic now," she said. "One of them has a son who is 9 and a daughter who is 4. The plan was still affordable when her son was born but by the time her daughter was born they just could not do it."

As an alternative, Martinez is investing in the Florida 529 Savings

month for more than 18 years to enroll a created by the Florida Prepaid College Board offers much more flexibility, giving many options as to how much is paid and where the money goes. As stated on the Board's official website, "Even if you can't save for your child's entire college education, starting something is always better than doing nothing."

Thus, state groups such as the Florida League of Cities oppose the chairman's proposals.

"Florida's red light safety camera program is a proven law-enforcement tool that reduces dangerous T-bone crashes and changes the behaviors of those drivers who choose to run red lights," the league states on its website.

A Foster Folly News analysis

cited, "Although most jurisdictions reported a decrease in crashes at intersections with red light cameras, the crash data maintained by the Department indicates that crashes at traffic control signal intersections typically increased, both statewide and in the surveyed jurisdictions."

Meanwhile, Schlossman wants to see a change at least near FIU's Engineering Center.

"There's a red-light camera right on 107th and Flagler, and it goes off every time someone makes a right turn at a red light," she said. "Even though the turn is totally legal, I always have to wait so much longer because the people at the front of the line to make that right turn are scared stiff by the camera. It's annoying, and it happens every day. Either remove it, or do something about it."

The Department of Parking and Transportation was unavailable for comment.


RE: STUDENT DISCRIMINATION

Maleficent is a highly celebrated Disney villain for a number of reasons. Marking her film debut in 1959 as the uninvited fairy who bestows the curse of death on the newborn Princess Aurora, as an act of vengeance against the king and queen; her evil has captivated audiences for generations. When the first conceptual images of actress Angelina Jolie began circulating online as early as 2009, some believed it was a fan-made image.

Later, in 2012, it was confirmed that original director Tim Burton had left the project but that Disney would move forward with the film despite the setback. Maleficent fans everywhere

Maleficent holds a unique place among Disney villains. Few have actually frightened large numbers of children quite as she has.

Her icy toned voice,

affinity for demons, ability to transform into a fire-breathing dragon at will, and constant melancholy, make her actions of intense hatred and revenge all the more terrifying.

The Disney villainess has made appearances since Sleeping Beauty in other Disney projects including Mickey's Magical Christmas, Snowed In At the House of Mouse, Mickey's House of Villains, Timon and Pumba, House of Mouse, Once Upon a Time, Sofia the First (she is only mentioned in this children's show), Once Upon a Time In Wonderland, the Kingdom Hearts video game series, Fantasmic, Sorcerors of the Magic Kingdom, Mickey's Boo-to You Halloween Parade, and more.

Quite memorable is her appearance in the Disney studios stunt show, Fantasmic.

In the show, Maleficent once more transforms into her dragon form, lighting the lake up in flames as she and a host of other Disney villains attempt to turn Mickey's dreams into a nightmare.

Originally conceived as a being of pure evil, Maleficent held sway over demonic minions, had a creepy raven named Diablo, whom she

trusted with the task of finding the princess when the minions had failed, and had the self-proclaimed ability to summon "all the powers of Hell."

She has no problem ordering the death of a baby or trying to kill Prince Phillip as he attempts to rescue Aurora with the spell, "A forest of thorns shall be his tomb! Borne through the skies on a fog of doom! Now go with the curse, and serve me well! 'Round Stefan's castle, cast

If the chance was given, one final time, to put your dreams within reach, I would not believe you if you said that you wouldn't work the hardest you have in your life to achieve it.

This was definitely the case for several, now former, football players from FIU.

Cornerback Sam Miller weighed in at 183 pounds and measured up at 5-foot-8.7 tall but that didn't stop him from stealing the show on Thursday, April 3 in a final performance on Alfonso Field at FIU Stadium and in the weightroom on the first floor of the Kirk R. Landon

It was common knowledge that the two main interests of the 20 some odd scouts that attended were members of the defensive line.

Those being Isame Faciane and Greg Hickman, who did put up some good numbers themselves. Hickman put up 21 reps on the bench with 225 pounds while Faciane was second on the day with 19.

Miller was spectacular, and in my opinion,

through his work, just went from possible rookie free agent signing to having his name announced in a late round in next month's draft.

The native Miamian had a 38 inch vertical jump and a leap of 10-foot-2.5 in the broad jump.

The vertical number is comparable to former teammate - and Pro Day guest - Johnathan Cyprien who jumped 38.5 inches at the NFL Combine in 2013.

I will admit though, that one fault I did see from Miller was his footwork in some situations.

I am not sure if it was due to rust of being on the field or pressure, but he did have some slip-ups in the on-field drills.

While inside the Landon Fieldhouse, I did realize something for these young men who are trying to fulfill their dreams. It was that last time that these young men will come together as members of the same program in total.

Yes, I do know that they will still be cheering for each other individually but, it is hard for those first few reps to line up against someone who you were basically family with for the previous four years, such as I am sure, the Philadelphia Eagles will feel when they play Desean Jackson and the Washington Redskins.

As I mentioned earlier, former safety Cyprien showed up to watch some of his former teammates try and extend their playing careers.

He was not the only one ;however, as linebacker Tourek Williams of the San Diego Chargers was also on the scene. Cyprien suited up for the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2013.

Both players watched intently and even cheered on their former teammates, who they may very well team up again throughout the day.

It was a strange sight for me to see all of the scouts in one place, with some teams missing. Noticeable no-shows to me were the Eagles, New England Patriots, and Seattle Seahawks.

The Seahawks, who did win the Super Bowl this past season, have former offensive lineman Caylin Hauptmann on their roster. Yes, he is the first player to win a Super Bowl after playing collegiately at FIU.

Not only did some of the elder former players of the participants come out to support but so did some of the athletes that they are leaving behind in the current players for FIU, who had their first scrimmage of Spring ball on Friday, April 4.

In my sideline conversations with some of them, interest for future pro days became very

One of the current participants put it perfectly

"It is the biggest job interview of my life,"

"If you mess up on this day," defensive lineman Giovani Francois said. "It is all but over and you need to go to plan B. No one wants to go to plan B."

Francois is one of the guys who I expect to be on a lot of NFL team's big boards going into this time next season, barring injury of course.

He had 16 tackles, three tackles-for-loss and two sacks in eight games last season. In my opinion, the defense this coming season hinges on the play of three players, Francois, defensive back Justin Halley, and Linebacker Luis Rosado.

Overall though, my thoughts on draft stock, based on what I saw, is that Hickman will go in either round five or six, Miller will go in round six or seven, and Faciane will go either in round seven or as an undrafted free agent.

The rest of the participants that were there, such as Jarius Williams, Junior Delpe and Markeith Russell, might have chances at being undrafted rookie free agents as well.

The San Diego Chargers went 10-8 in the 2013-2014 season including a win in the Wild Card round of the playoffs over the Cincinnati Bengals.

Linebacker Tourek Williams, formerly a defensive lineman for the FIU Panthers, played in his rookie season for those Chargers. There was a hard part for Williams in the transition but it was not on the field.

"I would say the meetings," Williams said. "NFL Meetings are all day, they go all day long and in camp they are all night long. You are over at the facility all day long. They have everything at your convenience so you don't have to leave the building. It is just an all day process. You have to build up a stamina just for meetings, just for being around all day and getting work done."

Even though the weather is similar in San Diego, Williams believes that the city in general is similar to Miami.

'San Diego is cool. It is a nice cool, calm city. The people there are great and I love the fans. They are always excited and always show their support at the games," Williams said. "It is a very welcoming city, like if you go out somewhere they don't bother you. Everyone is welcoming if they know who you are they'll embrace you and ask for autographs."

Williams made a name for himself in his rookie season which included his first sack-fumble against Denver Broncos quarterback Peyton Manning. It was a change in system though from FIU to the NFL.

"I like the system that [defensive coordinator] Coach [John] Pagano runs out there. Installing the program and my position coach, [linebackers] Coach [Joe] Barry does a good job of telling us what to do and explaining us the packages. It is a really good system and I am starting to do completely linebacker stuff and getting my hips right, catching the ball and some of the other stuff that I didn't do in college. I'm much more comfortable and I feel like this year will be a much better year for me," Williams said.

'That sack-fumble is some individual stuff whereas the team playoff victory is forever," Williams added. "I will think about the sack if I am just sitting around by myself but in regards to my team going into the playoffs and moving forward, that is a bigger thing to me."

Cyprien was present at the Pro Day for the Panthers that are trying to get to the league.



Badia Spice Challenge winner has a full plate

From winning the Badia Spice Challenge, to passing out her original spice rub at the South Beach Wine and Food Festival, Jenifer Bound is taking on more challenges after she graduates from the University.

She's jumping into the world of food science and new environmentally friendly alternatives for what we grow, produce and live off of.

With a major in hospitality management, one of the senior pastry chef's greatest challenges so far has been exploring a new sustainable plant that can change everything from what we eat to what we wear. I'm talking, of course, about hemp.

"Part of going for my masters' is specifically to try to change the food industry, to try to change the amount of plastic being used and hopefully to start using more sustainable and natural polymers," said Bound, who will be pursuing a degree in Environmental and Occupational Health at FIU's School of Public Health. "I really think the wave of future is going to be plastic made out of hemp."

For ages, hemp material has been an

excellent alternative to cotton and other plants as material for clothing, rope, canvases, jewelry, books and even fuel--all without damaging the natural soil around it

According to Bound, the hemp plant's fibers can be broken down into natural polymers that can replicate plastic, as opposed to regular plastic that is made from synthetic polymers in a laboratory.

"Right now a lot of our sustainable packaging comes from corn and practically all of our corn is [genetically modified] corn," said Bound, who believes making bio-degradable plastic from genetically modified products is not such a good idea. "Hemp doesn't need to be genetically modified," Bound said. "It's naturally a pest-free plant."

She believes the industry could help blue-collar workers, factory workers and farmers, all while bridging the gap between the upper- and lower-class.

"If [the American government] were to industrialize it, it could create a lot of jobs for people who might not have education," said Bound.

She said that especially in America, where the middle-class is the most prominent, creating new jobs for more people is essential to the growth of the economy.

When not changing the future of the world's plastic industry, Bound is working on a coalition to help the students of John A. Ferguson Senior High School who are farming and procuring goat's milk in the Hospitality and Tourism and Culinary Arts programs.

"Raising goats is much better for the environment," said Bound. "They don't use up as much land as cows and don't use as much grazing pasture.

While cows have to specifically graze on grass, Bound said that goats can feed

on anything.

"Especially if you're growing vegetables, you can feed them dried shrubs or rotting vegetables," she said.

So far, Bound and other collaborators of the project have applied for an FDA Community Grant to help get the project going.

"It creates more of an entrepreneurial project because they're going to be selling us goats' milk and we'll be working with that product to make cheese," Bound said. "There's so few people raising goats these days, even though it's a lot easier."

Bound also said most large cheese farms in the country must import goats' milk because they cannot keep up with the demand themselves.

"It's like a collaborative effort so that both the high schoolers and the college students who are involved in this project can understand business better, especially in the agricultural sector," Bound said. "We need to support the little guy."

Although she had big plans ahead, Bound said will take some time off after she graduates to do some travelling and and visit her family before she starts the next stage of life.
