FIU's Nuttall named coach of the year

Florida International University's Head Soccer Coach Bill Nuttall, expanding on a successful season, has been named the South Region Coach of the Year.

Nuttall, 29, who came to F.I.U. in 1974 and has been Head Coach for three years, was nominated by his coaching peers for leading the Sunblazers to their best record in the school's history, 17-2-1.

"I would never have been able to accomplish this without good players,"

said Nuttall.

Coach Nuttall is now in contention with seven other regional winners for Coach of the Year honors. The victor will be presented the award at the National Coaches Convention in mid-January in Boston, Mass.

"I think we had a very successful season," said Nuttall. "established pride and tradition here a. F.I.U. and the south Florida area. This year we went to the NCAA Playoffs, next year we'll win!"

Recent poll shows

Students satisfied with FIU

Florida International University students are generally satisfied with the school, according to a survey taken by two sociology students.

Carol Ann Hakanson and Carmen E. Horn polled 125 full-time and parttime students during fall quarter, asking them questions about topics ranging from registration procedures to campus security.

Fifty-one students (40 per cent of those polled) rated FIU overall as good, while 42 students (33.6 per cent) judged the university as "fair". Other choices, in order of preference were: "Needs improvement (11 per cent), "No response" (8.8 per cent), "excellent" (3.2 per cent), and "poor" (2.4 per cent).

Some students explained that they were new at FIU, or that they thought the school would improve with time. One student said that "many things that are taken for granted on larger campuses are almost non-existent due to the newness and size of this university. It is a commuter university. In the future

maybe its social appeal and on-campus activity will increase with dorms and larger on-campus student life."

No FIU topic received more "good" ratings than the bookstore. Fifty-eight people (46.4 per cent) rated it "good", with another eleven (8.8 per cent) calling the store "excellent." However, students do not like the bookstore's prices and buy-back policies. The largest group of students said that both needed improvement.

Some of the questions asked, particularly those concerning athletics and student activities drew no response from large numbers of students. Sixty-six out of 125 (52.8 per cent of the total) had no response to the question on FIU's athletic facilities. Apparently, many students had never used the facilities and could not rate them.

The chart accompanying this story shows some of the results of the survey. Complete results, including information on the make-up of the questioned students (as to race, sex, age, etc.) are available in the International office (room UH 212A).

BOR member to speak

Murray Dubbin of Miami, the newest member of the Board of Regents, will be on the Tamiami campus of Florida International University campus on Thursday, Jan. 19 to answer questions about the workings of the BOR and the State University System.

According to Mark Badia, Annex Director for the Student Government Association, the title of Dubbin's lecture will be "Everything you have ever wanted to know about the BOR, but were afraid to ask". The lecture will be in UH 150 at 12:30 p.m. and is being sponsored by the SGA.

Badia said the talk would be a prime opportunity for students to ask questions about their concerns with the university system. He said it would also give Dubbin a chance to see that FIU students are knowledgeable and concerned about the quality of their education.

Badia pointed to an article from the Oct. 25 issue of The Chronicle for

Higher Education, which placed Florida 40th among the 50 states in appropriations for higher education on a per capita basis, with an amount of \$58.14 per capita. In expenditure of per \$1000 income, Florida ranks 39th, with a figure of \$9.66.

In comparison, the states of Mississippi and Alabama rank third and fourth in per capita appropriations for higher education, with figures of \$17.50 and \$16.62 per capita respectively.

Badia also referred to the November issue of United Action, a publication of the United Faculty of Florida, in which it stated that the BOR will spend approximately \$3,300,251 on administrative salaries this year, more than is spent on faculty salaries at the University of North Florida.

"Students should realize that the BOR has to answer to those statistics," Badia said. He said that student responsiveness to lectures such as that of Dubbin will inform the BOR and the Legistature that they are accountable to students.

'Nazi Drawings' portrays era of degradation

An exhibition of "The Nazi Drawings of Mauricio Lasansky' opened at Florida International University January 6. The drawings are on loan from the University of Iowa and will remain on view in the Visual Arts Gallery through January 28. Professor Lasansky will lecture at FIU on Jan. 11 at 8 p.m. in University House 140.

Kneeland McNulty, curator of prints and drawings at the Philadelphia Museum of Art states: "This series of drawings prepared over five years, was completed in 1966. No comparable artistic indictment of that period of recorded history exists of the Nazi era. The degradation of all mankind by its brutality and avarice, unmercifully exposed in life-sized figures, has here been translated into a dance of death culminating in man's self-destruction."

Amendments to be discussed at University Forum Jan. 20

Students will be able to put SGA Constitutional amendments on the April ballot at the University Forum meeting on Friday, Jan. 20. The meeting will begin at 12:30 p.m. in the UH Forum

No matter how many students show up at the January meeting, the number will be sufficient to pass legislation. The by-law which required 100 students to attend was declared contrary to the SGA Constitution in November, and is no longer in effect.

Two proposed amendments are set to be discussed at the Forum. The first, modeled after a provision in Florida's Constitution, would allow 500 students to place proposed changes on the ballot through petitions without approval by the SGA or the Forum. The second would change the SGA "Chairman" title to "Chairperson."

Both amendments were approved unanimously by the SGA Senate. Should two-thirds of those voting at the Forum also approve either of them, it will go on the SGA election ballot for approval by the student body. The next SGA election (in which students will also elect a new Chairman and other officers) will be the third week of the Spring quarter.

Students at the upcoming Forum will be the first with the opportunity to place amendments on the ballot. No proposal has been passed by the Senate and Forum in the five-year history of FIU's SGA.

Only students with valid Winter (cream-colored) FIU identification cards will be allowed to vote at the Forum.

SGA offers classes in speed reading

For students who can't read all those textbooks fast enough, the Student Government Association, cooperation with Reading Development, will offer a speed reading course to 20 students at a reduced price.

According to Earl Wallace of Reading Development, his program differs from the Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics program in that students will be instructed in the books that they normally read, such as textbooks, instead of utilizing light novels and standardized material.

Wallace stated that the costs of the programs differ greatly. The Evelyn Wood course normally costs \$425, while the Reading Development costs \$225. However, when offered on an academic campus, Wallace said his program only costs \$100.

The SGA will subsidize half of the cost of the Reading Development program for 20 students so that the students will only pay \$50. Students are offered a full money-back guarantee if they do not triple their reading speed with at least the same comprehension, providing they attend all lessons and practice at least one hour per day.

Classes will begin as soon as 20 students sign up. The format of instruction — days, time, and place — will be determined by the availability of the students in the class.

Letters South Florida gets

educational shaft

To the Editor:

As you may or may not know, Florida International University had a unique nursing program, begun in 1972, created to provide highly trained professional nurses for the pressing health care needs of the south Florida populous. I say had, because on December 2, 1977 in an unprecedented move, the Board of Regents voted to disband this school of nursing as of June 1979. The reasons they gave were: indifferent administration, insufficient funding, buffeted and uneven leadership, curriculum changes, faculty dissension, lack of autonomy and failure to gain National League of Nursing accreditation on their initial review.

As a senior student in that program and an already functioning RN in the Miami community, I was shocked to hear the BOR's decision from Interim Vice President of Academic Affairs Ricardo Arias on December 5, 1977. Never in my academic career have I heard of such a power play by the BOR without a probation period or any forewarning. Again, south Florida gets the educational shaft.

All a person needs to do is look in the newspaper classified ads to see the crying need for highly skilled, professional nurses in the Miami area.

The FIU nursing program was created to address this shortage. It was a unique and innovative program unlike any in the country. It was designed to create career mobility for the large number of junior college and diploma school RNs, as well as supply the community's need for skilled nursing professionals trained in leadership, research, physical and psycho-social assessment, decision making and preventive health care promotion. This abrupt decision by the BOR dooms these dedicated nurses of our area to stagnation on their career ladders, and denies south Florida to the quality of health care professionals it so urgently needs.

Speaking personally, I can honestly state that my experience in the FIU nursing program has been stimulating, enriching and benificial to myself and my clients. I feel a great sense of outrage for myself, for all those involved in the program, but mostly for the community, that will suffer the most in the long run.

I am writing to you to ask for your support in reversing the BOR decision to disband the nursing program at FIU, thus insuring the much needed baccalaureate level nursing education in south Florida.
