Tales of parking tickets

Albert Bitá, recipient of one of 5,032 tickets issued thus far in 1979, feels the Traffic Advisory Board, the committee to whom FIU parking tickets can be appealed, is a farce.

Bitá, an FIU student, received a ticket for parking his motorcycle under a chickee. He thought he should have gotten a warning.

Bitá appealed his ticket to the Traffic Advisory Board. The day of his hearing, he was asked to wait outside the room. The hearings are closed to the public.

When his turn came, Bitá was interviewed by the five-member board. They heard his side.

Bitá insisted the motorcycle parking area, in the visitors parking lot, is confusing.

"I thought it was for visitors on motorcycles, and that students had to park their bikes someplace else."

He parked his bike under a chickee in the OE parking lot. He did not know it was illegal. Bitá was pronounced guilty; his ticket would stick.

Bitá was not satisfied and filed a complaint with Student Affairs.

"The thing is, I knew the minute I walked in to the hearing, I didn't have a chance. These people were not listening to me.

"I had to wait outside the hearing room. When they asked me to step in, I didn't know what to do. Even in court traffic cases you can see what the procedure is. I didn't know what to expect," Bitá said.

Glen Cuttler, SGA senator and

representative on the board, said Bitá's defense was ignorance of the law. "That is no defense. Students have to abide by the University's traffic regulations."

Cuttler does feel there are some problems with parking at FIU.

The Traffic Advisory Board meets every month. At Bitá's meeting, 18 tickets were supposed to be contested. Of the 18, only five persons showed up.

Of those five, all were upheld.

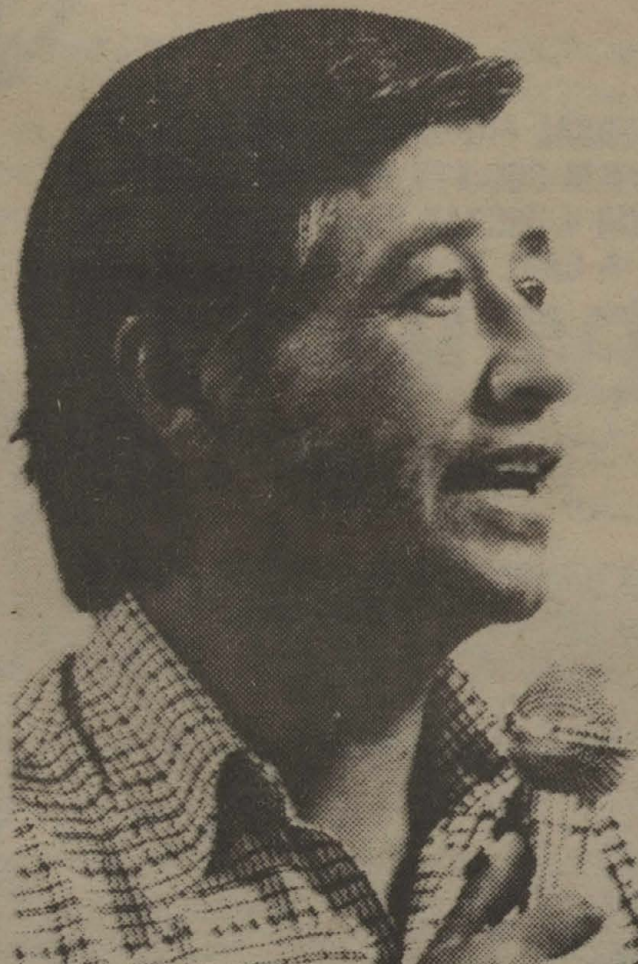
Bill Raimond, public safety officer and board member, said 90 per cent of the tickets contested are upheld.

"In the last two months, one or two tickets were overturned," Raimond said.

Captain William Ball, public safety officer, said 542 tickets were given by public safety officers in November.

Chavez's struggle to organize the nation's migrant workers has won widespread consumer support in recent years.

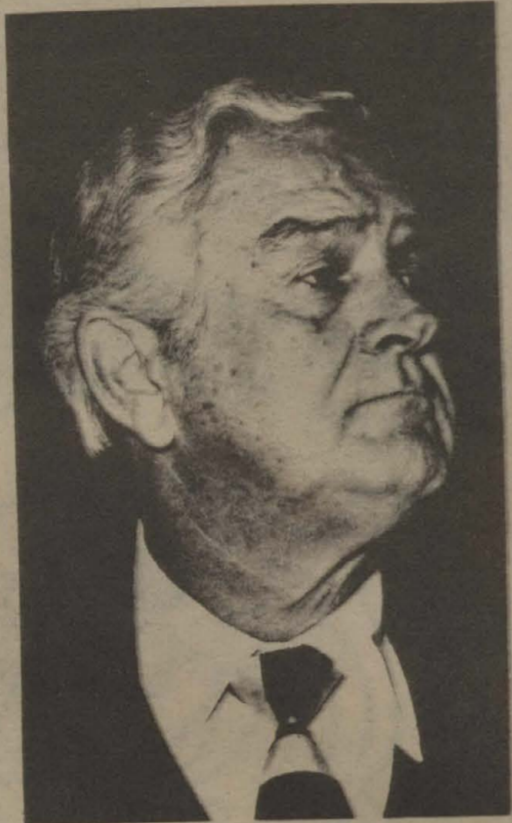
A 1975 nationwide Louis Harris poll showed that 17 million American adults boycotted grapes in support of the United Farm Workers (UFW).

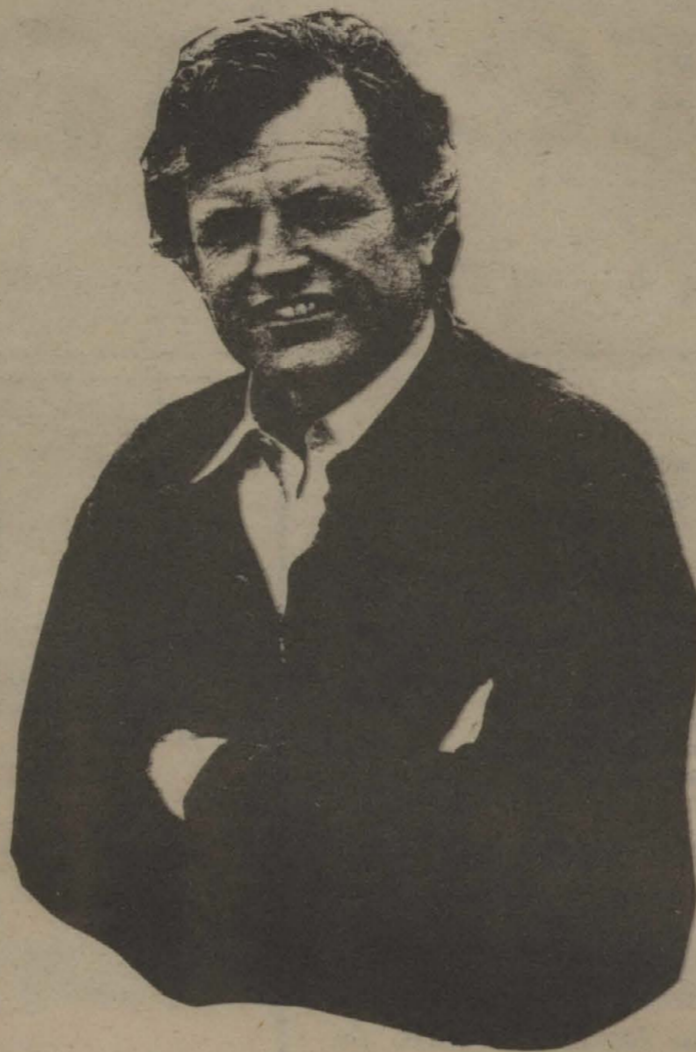

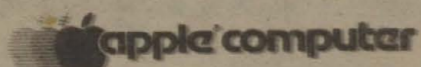

Charges of neglect unfair

This letter is being written in reply to your front page story (Nov.28) of *The International*, concerning the Office of Admission and Records.

The Office of Admissions and Records has many hard working and dedicated employees who are now finding it very difficult to function in a timely and orderly manner because they are constantly besieged by press articles which are not only derogatory to the current employees, but are inaccurate as well.

The following points should be made at this times. The situation as reported occurred approximately eight months ago and this problem longer exists.

Ms. deQuesada was the admissions counselor at the time the problem existed. She was the supervisor of the employee opening the mail (not only admissions but the entire mail for the Office of Admissions and Records), therefore, it was her responsibility to see that all mail was opened properly.

Ms. deQuesada was also the supervisor of the person replying to the admissions requests, therefore, it was her responsibility to see that all mail received a timely reponse.

As to Ms. deQuesada's statement that Columbus Posey, University Registrar, would not meet with her, I believe this to be incorrect. She was told that he could not see her at that time because he was on his way to a meeting with the Vice-President for Student Affairs and he was already late. He did not say he would not meet with her, he asked her to see him later when he returned.

This office has at times had to take employees from their assigned duties to help with priority

functions. I am sure that this must happen in many areas of the University. I really don't think we should be degraded for using our employees to serve the University in the best way possible. Things are never routine in the Office of Admissions and Records and each employee should be expected to help in areas other than their assigned areas if that need arises. This does not, and has never, occurred on a regular basis.

It would be most refreshing if this office could, at some time, receive a "pat on the back" for its service to the University, instead of constantly being reprimanded for problems that existed in the past.

One of John F. Kennedy's best friends, Lemoine Billings, said Bob is the most similar of all the Kennedys to his Uncle John; he is a leader.

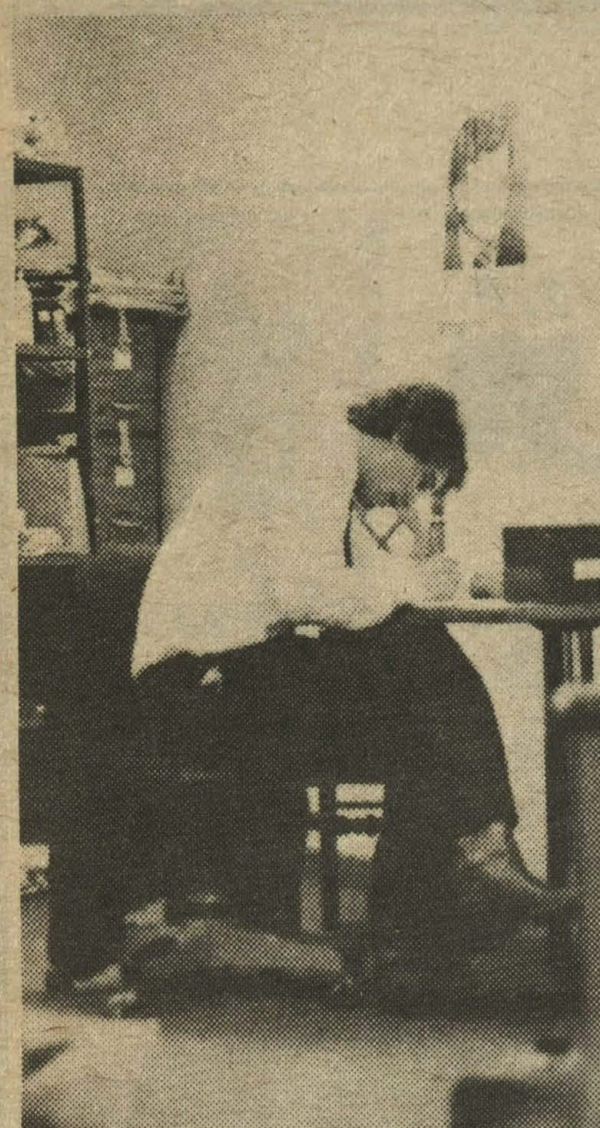
Some people who complain about Ted Kennedy's silence on some issues will be surprised by Bob's outspoken ways.

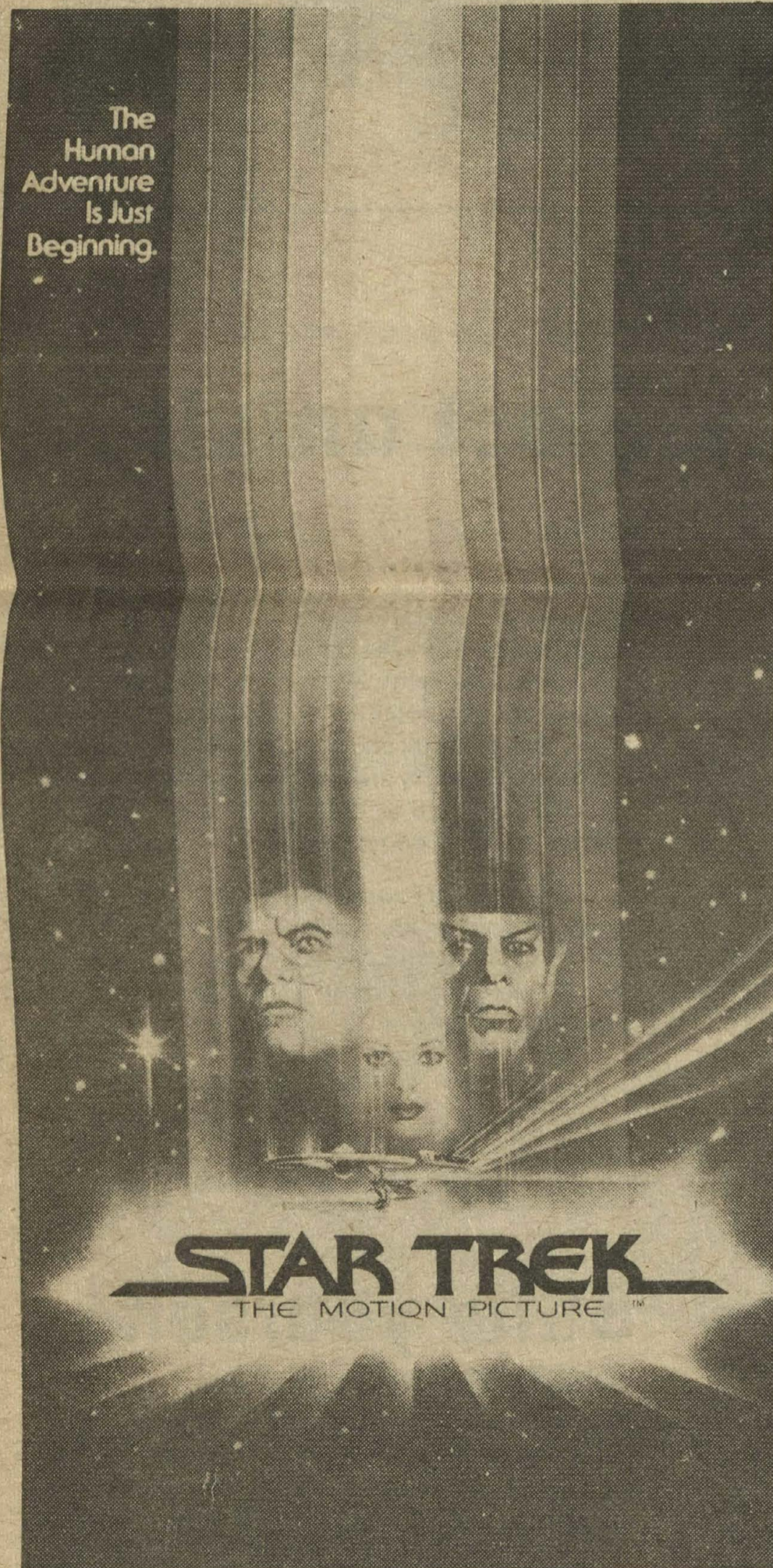

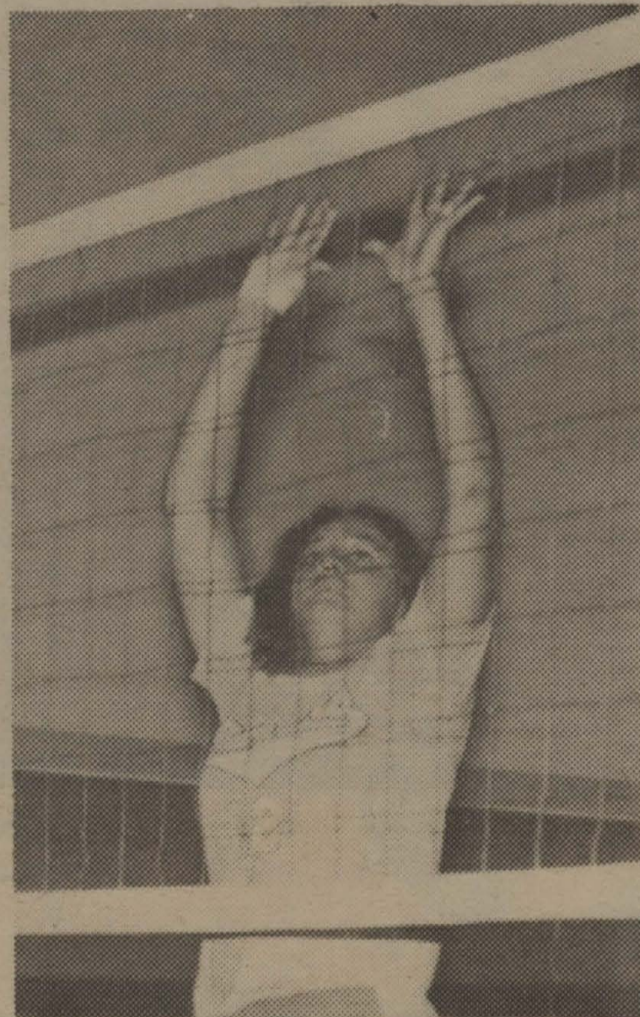

FIU will enter pool play in the double-elimination tournament with Cal. State-Bakersfield, Cal. State Northridge and Texas Lutheran. Bakersfield and Lutheran are regional champions and are seeded fourth and fifth respectively.

The top teams in each of the four pools advance into the double-elimination playoffs.

"In my opinion, the Texas and California regions are the two toughest in the country," Miskovic said. "Our work is cut out for us, but win or lose, knowing we ended the season as one of the top-16 teams in the country is something we all can be proud of."

Crotty and company will attempt to make their coach even more proud starting Thursday.

Nuttall named soccer coach of the year

FIU soccer Coach Bill Nuttall has been named South Region coach of the year by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Nuttall, who led the 1979 Sunblazers to a 13-2 record and a Division II ranking of fifth in the nation, outdistanced Coach Salah Yousif of national champion Alabama A & M.

"I wish I could take all the credit for this honor," Nuttall said, "but a lot if it belongs to my assistant coach Gary Pollack and our fine players who helped insure another outstanding season."

Since beginning his coaching career at FIU in 1975, Nuttall has compiled a 56-18-1 record for a .747 winning percentage, the highest of any team sport at FIU.

In five seasons, the 31-year-old Pennsylvanian has had five consecutive winning seasons, three-straight appearances in NCAA post-season competition, one All-American, seven All-South performers, 17 All-State players and five players who have signed professional contracts.

For Nuttall, it marks the second time in the last three years he has won this award. He first received the honor in 1977, after the Sunblazers went 17-2-1 and qualified for an NCAA tournament bid for the first time in the school's history.

Soccer team breaks records

The Sunblazer soccer team set 30 school records this year. There were 71 goals on the season with only 14 goals allowed to the opposition.

For the third year in a row, the FIU men were extended a bid to the NCAA national tour, and for the third year in a row Alabama A & M knocked FIU out of the nationals.

The Sunblazers have always been

known for their defense. This year, they added much depth to their offense. George Moyssidis, a junior, scored 21 goals on the season and a total of 47 points.

He moved into fourth place on the books as all-time school leading scorer. Al Njie tops that list to date.

Preparation for next year has already started. There will be eight men returning to the team next year.

Coach Bill Nuttall said, "Every year

I lose half my team. I have to recruit about fifteen players, hoping to get about nine quality players. Most four-year schools only have to look for one or two."

Nuttall is proud of the team's 13-2 record which is the best winning record for the school in two years.

"This year the team was more unified. Our success was a total team effort. We had a strong junior nucleus," Nuttall said.
