Wonderling resigns as athletic director

Tom Wonderling, citing that he is tired of waiting for new athletic facilities to be constructed, has resigned as athletic director and baseball coach at FIU.

"I've done everything I can here without waiting for another three years for the facilities to come along," Wonderling said. "I'm 37 years old now, and I've been looking to get into a football and basketball management situation."

For the past three years, Wonderling has petitioned the Student Government Association for funds to construct a gymnasium and pool, but has been denied denied each time. The SGA promised to make 6.3 million dollars available in three years but Wonderling wanted the facilities sooner.

Although monies were made available for the construction of a baseball diamond and soccer field, Wonderling felt FIU needed additional facilities to improve its athletic program.

"To put the University on par with top programs around the nation, we needed a gymnasium and pool," said Wonderling, FIU's first baseball coach and athletic director since 1975, "I would like to have seen a mens' basketball team here. I think that really could have put FIU on the sports map."

The SGA's reason for not appropriating the funds was that the expense would be too much.

Wonderling will recommend that soccer Coach Bill Nuttall succeed him as athletic director and Nuttall said that he would continue to try and secure funds for new facilities.

"That would certainly be one of my top priorities," Nuttall said. "But I would like to uphold the standard of excellence Wonderling has established in the sports we already have."

Nuttall said he would have applied for the job even if Wonderling hadn't recommended him. "I think I can do a lot of positive things for our athletic program and I would like very much to have the job," he said. "I'm very proud that Tom saw fit to recommend me."

Wonderling decided to leave FIU in favor of California State Polyechnic University-Pomona, near Los Angeles. He will leave the University Jan. 19 and begin his new job two days later.

Wonderling had applied for several AD jobs and was a finalist for that post at the University of Pennsylvania and Cal State Fullerton.

Under Wonderling's guidance, FIU's baseball team has gone 224-139 and has qualified for the NCAA Division II South Regional tournament three of the past four years. Last season was the finest for FIU's baseball program as it had a 45-15 record and finished the season ranked third in the nation.

"I'll miss coaching," Wonderling said, "but if I do the kind of job that needs to be done as an athletic administrator, I'll still be close to the kids."

Wonderling will recommend assistant baseball coach Danny Price to head the baseball program.






Nuttall should receive AD job

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Fourth time is charm for FIU volleyball team

Four times they tried this season and four times they failed.

But when the chips were on the line in the losers bracket of the NCAA Division II national volleyball tournament last month, FIU's women's volleyball team rose to the occasion.

By defeating tournament host Central Florida for the first time in five games and eliminating them from the tournament, the Sunblazers advanced to the semifinals and eventually ended up in second place, the highest finish ever by an FIU athletic team in a national tournament.

The Sunblazers fell to the University of Hawaii at Hilo, 15-9, 15-0. But before losing to the second seeded team, FIU, unseeded, became the cindarella team of the tournament with the numerous upsets they pulled.

After upsetting Central Florida (the No. 1 seed) 9-15, 15-13, 16-14, the

Sunblazers upset two other seeded teams, Lewis (Ill.) College and Northern Colorado, to reach the final.

"We overcame a lot of obstacles this season," said FIU Coach Linda Miskovic. "We have to put a new team together every two or three years while most of the other teams are four-year schools and have time to build.

"I was very proud of the team in the tournament. We weren't expected to do as well as we did. I think the victory over Central Florida was the key. We hadn't beaten them in the three years and after we did, it gave us a lot of confidence."

And was does Miskovic do for an encore?

"Hopefully, with good recruiting, we can go back and repeat our performance," she said.

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Sports Shrift

Mat men take fourth

FIU's wrestling team took fourth place in the Sunblazer Holiday Classic this past weekend. Big 8 power Missouri edged Augustana for the championship. Northern Iowa was third.

The Sunblazers dropped three dual matches last week, falling to Northern lowa, Central Florida and Carson-Newman. The team is racked with injuries as only five wrestlers competed in the dual meets.

Athletics take 30th

FIU's athletic program has been ranked 30th in the nation among the 179 participating Division II schools.

The Sunblazers used top 20 finishes in the nation by the soccer, baseball, tennis and golf teams to achieve the high ranking.

The top-ranked school was Eastern Illinios University. Florida Southern was ranked 13th.

'New era' nears for 'Blazers

It's a "new era" for FIU's women's basketball program, according to first-year coach Mary Ellen Fiske, and she says respectability is the key.

"Our main objective will be to instill an air of respectability into the program and improve with each game," said Fiske, who led Hallandale to two state championships when she coached there.

"We'll rely on the nucleus of three returning seniors, Andrea Roker, Maggie Williams and Hilda Vargus-Vila, plus several junior college players with previous experience," she said. "Hopefully by midseason we'll begin to jell as unit."

That was something FIU could not do last year. The Lady Sunblazers finished with an 0-16 record.

But that could change. Roker, a 5-5 guard from Miami-Dade New World Center, is the top returnee with a 17.4 average last year. Vargus-Villa, a member of FIU's national runnerup volleyball team, can use her 5-10 height effectively and along with 5-7 Cynthia Whithead, from Dade-North, will anchor the front court.

The Lady Sunblazers opened their 22-game schedule last Wednesday at the University of Miami gym, falling to nationally-ranked Lamar (Tx.) University

Ahead for FIU are games against the University of Miami, Florida State, Florida A&M, Central Florida, South Florida, Stetson and the three local junior colleges. Also slated is the Falconette Classic, Feb. 14-16 at Dade-North.

According to Fiske, the secret to winning is hard work, hard work and more hard work. She says that if the team practices diligently and develops good habits, confidnce will be built.

"I think that the team always comes first, not the individual player," she said. "Each player has an important role to fill, whether it's that of a shooter, rebounder, passer or dribbler and everyone has a role on defense.

"The roles are then mended together so that every player poses some kind of threat and each player knows what's expected of her."



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
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
