The presidential and vice presidential candidates are running on tickets this year, meaning that a voter must decide on two candidates with one vote.

The tickets are present SGA comptroller Tim Benjamin and education senator Nazaria Ramallo; Engineering senator Fred Jorgenson and Arts and Sciences senator Natalie Butto; Lower Division senators Alex Fernandez and Lourdes Lopez and Education senator Joel Montgomery and Business senator Randall Crutchfield.

Fellowships available for black graduate students

Black students who have been accepted or who anticipate being accepted into a graduate program here for Fall semester may apply for a Delores A. Auzenne Fellowship.

The program, named in honor of the late Delores A. Auzenne, who served as director of equal employment opportunity programs for the Board of Regents for nine years until her death in 1984, will award eight \$5,000 full one-year fellowships to FIU students.

Although all applications will be forwarded to the chancellor's office for final selection, a committee appointed by University President Modesto "Mitch" Maidique will review applications and submit a list of the eight applicants whom they feel the fellowships will be awarded.

The fellowships are designed to encourage blacks to pursue graduate study for professions in high demand in which the percentage of blacks now working is low, such as architecture, business, engineering, law, dentistry, medicine and veterinary medicine.

Applications must be submitted no later than May 4. Applications may be obtained by contacting Bennie Osbourne, University affirmative action coordinator at 554-2785 Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays and at 940-5545 on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Hispanic radio stations raise money in marathon

It began at 6 a.m. and when it ended at midnight, the radio marathon that was simulcalst stations had raised enough money to give 130 needy hispanic students a full-year scholarship.

"Frankly, I was very surprised that we had such a tremendous response," said Julio Mendez, operations manager at WQBA. "We've done marathons for different causes. but this was fantastic."

The other stations involved in the broadcast marathon were WRHC and Radio Mambi. Two FM stations, Radio Suave and FM 92, participated by making periodic announcements about the marathon throughout the day. Volunteers from the University staff, the community and students helped man the 30 telephones to take pledges.

Lincoln Diaz-Balart, state representative from district 110, encouraged people to from three hispanic AM radio pledge money and the hispanic tions," he said. staff from FIU told listeners about the various programs.

> "People projected that we may not have much luck," University President Modesto "Mitch" Maidique said. "But we had about. 2,000 contributors."

The radio stations offered to help the school raise money and Maidique came up with the idea for the marathon.

"It's important to try and find projects that are of interest to the donor," Maidique said. "This assures their support in the future."

Maidique said that this is just one of 30 or 40 different ways of raising funds for the University.

"This method probably wouldn't do well in the anglo FM market, but we are trying to set up something similar with local black radio sta-

Maidique explained that raising money for hispanic students helps other minorities by freeing up other scholarship money that would have previously gone to hispanics.

A committee is being set up to decide which students will get the scholarships. Distribution will begin in the Fall.

Because of the success of the marathon, it may become an annual event.

"I think if we did this again," Mendez said, "we could easily raise \$150,000 for

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



A: This is a tough question. By your answer employers will get a feeling as to your level of ambition, realism and maturity. Here are some hints:

Q: I am a Bay Vista senior.

employer asking about my

salary expectations?

•Be Prepared-- I can't emphasize enough the importance of this. This means doing your homework. Research what a competative salary is in your chosen field and identify a range that takes into account your academic discipline and

think it is possible in the first six months.

·Aim high-- Aim within a realistic range and sharpen your negotiating skills.

·Look at yourself-- How are your grades? Often, the higher your GPA, the higher the salary. Are you willing to relocate? Depending on your career, relocation could be profitable. Do you have related work experience? In fields such as MIS and computers, experience is vital.

·Develop a personal budget-- This may help you identify if you are financially able to take an offer. You must, however, be realistic.

Q: I will be graduating at the end of this semester, can you identify some "pitfalls" to avoid?

A: Absolutely. "Business Week" interviewed a number of Human Resources officials and here are their suggestions of pitfalls to avoid:

•Playing Games-- Be yourself. Avoid being someone you are not.


·Talking too much--Stich to the subject at hand. Don't ramble.

·Boasting-- You must sell yourself; however, avoid exaggerating or embellishing previous responsibilities. Be results oriented. This will show the interviewer that you have had proven successes.

•Not listening- You must pay attention to the recruiter's questions or you will not give complete answers. There is nothing wrong with taking a few seconds to formulate a clear. concise answer.

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

Look out Dr. Ruth

FIU's Dr. Harold publishes how to love and be loved

Do you want to be happy? Do you want love? Do you want to escape loneliness and heartache and begin living a richer more rewarding life today? For many of us, Dr. Harold Rosenberg of FIU's School of Education has the answers to these and other questions of the heart in his book "How to Form a Lasting Love Relationship". It is co-authored by two other prominent South Florida psychologists: Dr. Lowell D. Rossman and Dr. Samuel A. Feldman.

The topic is a very timely one, in Dr. Rosenberg's opinion, because of the societal problems evident in the high divorce rates. It is also timely, however, for our students because most are single. Those who are married, though, will find the book just as useful.

The book itself is a short direct analysis of the problems people have in selecting mates and sustaining relationships. It is a must-read for any couple planning to be married.

This, in turn, can guide you in finding a person who is a "good fit". Rosenberg says this will improve the chances of having a good longterm relationship.

Children, who while they were infants, have had good relationships with adults, establish a bond. For example the bonds of a mother and child. If the mother or father touched and played with the baby a bond develops over a period of time. The infant usually grows up to have a bondable personality: a key ingredient of the ideal mate.

Therefore, in establishing a relationship, Dr. Rosenberg recommends spending a lot of time together in order for a bond to develop. He also suggests spending some of that time together for meals. This reinforces the nurturing bond between mother and child.

Dr. Rosenberg also believes that in a potential long-term relationships sex shold be postponed for 15 to 20 dates in order to allow the relationship to develop. The number, he stresses, is not the important thing; getting to know the other person on an intellectual and emotional level first, is.

Choosing the best mate is a problem for many people. Many seem to only be attracted to those people who are not good for them. In other words, they are trying to bond with someone who is incapable of bonding or simply does not want to. These people often become frustrated because they keep hooking up with selfcentered, non-bondable types and give up altogether, accepting loneliness.

This continued desire to be with non-bonding types, the book says, can be linked to the fact that the parent of the opposite sex was a non-nuturing, non-bonding rejecting parent. This child now as an adult identifies with the same sex parent and unknowingly seeks those who are non-nuturing like the opposite sex parent. The self-help ideas in his book will help this person break this cycle of heartache and despair and help them find an ideal

Rosenberg says that he and his co-authors wrote the book because, "We do have control over our lives and our relationships". He believes that most people can help themselves through a book like this



The men's baseball team is Division I, and has been for five years. It has consistently been a winner. Coach Danny Price says attendance has increased every year. He doesn't want to admit you can count that figure on one hand.

Once again UM and FIU will meet as baseball rivals this weekend. Perhaps this will lure some more students out to cheer on their school, continuing this promising rivalry. But FIU students should not look forward to one game out of an entire season, but anticipate the season itself.

## Baseball team beats Michigan State

Danny Price's fear of poor hitting has become a reality, and the baseball Sunblazers couldn't have picked a worse time. A time which second baseman Hector Fernandez. said would get FIU ranked nationally, has become a slump. And what few victories the team has earned can be attributed to great pitching and defense.

"We haven't been hitting the ball the way we were at the beginning of the year, but our pitching and defense has been solid," Price said.

Denny Wiseman said the team has only averaged 2.8 runs a game since the series with Central Florida. That was February 28th. Since setting a blistering pace of 16-2, the Sunblazers have reached reality at 29-11.

The slump, however, appears to be ending with victories over Michigan State. In the first of the three game series with the Spartans, pitcher Ken Deal won in a fierce battle with ace pitcher Doug Gogolewski. The game lasted five and a half hours, with FIU prevailing, 2-1, in 17 innings. Zach Valade hit a single scoring Victor Rivera.
