Abbie Hoffman to FIU crowd: Less MTV, more involvement

On Tuesday, November 24, political activist Abbie Hoffman, one of the most visible anti-Establishment

demonstrators in the 1960s, took to the stage at the Ruth Foreman Theatre at the North Miami Campus with the hopes of sparking student activism in

Much like an actor, Hoffman captured his audience with a variety of thoughts about past, present and future. For nearly two and a half hours, he talked with a diversified audience while drinking a special blend of tea -- prepared with honey, lemon and cracked pepper -- made for him each time he speaks.

The turnout was smaller than expected. Most of the crowd was older -- members of the '60s generation. To revive the mood of the livelier past, some dressed the part. There were "make love not war" tshirts, tie-dyed shirts and some individuals who looked as if they never outgrew the fashion.

Hoffman began his lecture with a synopsis of the attitudes of the 1950s, which he said was necessary to understand the generation of the "fluke" 1960s.

But Hoffman didn't just reminisce about his past. There really wasn't a topic he didn't talk about. This brought complaints from some.

"He didn't stick to one subject; he jumped from one topic to another and didn't make one single point about any of them," said George TwumBarimah, SGA's senator for Arts & Sciences.

Hoffman poked fun at the television evangelists, calling popular TV minister Oral Roberts "Anal," which led to a few swipes at the illegality of oral sex in some states. The pope got a few comments from Hoffman, too.

During his visit to the University of Southern California, Hoffman asked students what the pope had told them. Hoffman said the pope told them "not to f---."

'The pope doesn't have to f---," Hoffman said. "He has a big house, a big pension plan he doesn't need to.'


Though Hoffman is Jewish, it didn't deter him from making fun of his own background. He called the Jewish religion "religion

Hoffman's version of how the Jews were able to get out of the desert: They sent Moses to make a deal with God. On Moses' return he told his people, "I've got him down to ten, but he still wants adultery.

Hoffman also joked about his idea of the Jews' position on abortion. "The fetus doesn't achieve life until graduate school and for the Orthodox it's medical school," Hoffman

Besides all his jokes and wisecracks, Hoffman stressed one point throughout -- the importance and need for student activism.

"Generations never make change, nor does the majority," Hoffman said. "Only the "Generations don't minority takes risks - due to make change, nor does them the Jim Crow laws were along away, segregation and apartheid."

> He said he understands that it's tough growing up today, that the world is very complicated and that people are very pessimistic. But he says he can't understand the mentality of the MTV generation kids like his who spend hours watching music videos when there are such issues as censorship to contend with.

> "You have the same roads to choose from as in the '60s,' Hoffman said. "It's a different situation, but with the same choices, and they are yours to



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
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
