New directions, goals set by SGA

This past year was an exciting one for the Student Government Association, the governing body for FIU students.
he April 1977 Presiding Board elections saw a record turnout (almost 1000 voters) and much ontroversy, as incumbent Chairman lose Eiriz sought an unprecendented second term. He lost, but contested the election, causing the SGA to examine its structure seriously.

Out of self examination came changes: the apparent end of expensive retreats, several constitutional amendments, and a move toward representation for the new North Miami Campus.

This year also saw almost $\$ 1$ million from students' tuition allocated by the SGA Senate for everything from athletics to movies.

Progress is keynote of this year

This has been a very good year. We have done a lot with our physical facilities, have upgraded the campus here at Tamiami and opened another building, Owa Ewan. We have done a lot of landscaping, a lot of work on handicap access and solved some of our parking problems. At the North Miami Campus, we got a favorable bid on Academic I and the building is going up rapidly. The legislature has funded Academic II. So from a facilities standpoint, it has been an outstanding year.
'I think the university has achieved remarkable progress considering it's only five years old. During that time we've built a physical plant approaching $\$ 40$ million on Tamiami and we have funds allocated in excess of $\$ 15$ million for North Miami. We are number four in enrollment in the State University System and are growing faster than any other institution in the system.'

Awareness of FIU's role is concern
"We have made every person in the university aware that the international role of FIU is a concern of ours - not only a concern, a part of our destiny. I think each person that is responsible for either delivering a program or participating in a program has to have the international as a primary oncern. I think that's the beginning of making ourselves truly international - certainly with Student Affairs.
