*The Democratic party of to-day claims lineal descent from the first Republican party and President Jefferson as its founder.

†Political parties were disorganized at the time of the election of John Quincy Adams. He claimed to be a Republican, but his doctrines were decidedly federalistic. The opposition to his administration took the name of democrats and elected Jackson President.

THE PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION

In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the President and Vice-President, then the Secretary of State shall act as President until the disability of the President or Vice-President is removed or a President is elected. If there be no Secretary of State, then the Secretary of the Treasury will act, and the remainder of the order of succession is: The Secretary of War, Attorney-General, Postmaster General, Secretary of the Navy and Secretary of the Interior. The acting President must, upon taking office, convene Congress, (if not at the time in session) in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice.

FAMILIAR FACTS

To find circumference of a circle multiply diameter by 3.1416.

To find diameter of a circle multiply circumference by .31831.

To find area of a circle multiply square of diameter by .7854.

To find area of a triangle multiply base by $\frac{1}{2}$ perpendicular height.

To find surface of a ball multiply square of diameter by 3.1416.

To find solidity of a sphere multiply cube of diameter by .5236.

To find side of an equal square multiply diameter by .8862.

To find cubic inches in a ball multiply cube of diameter by .5236.

Doubling the diameter of a pipe increases its capacity four times.

A gallon of water (U. S. standard) weighs 8 lbs. $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and contains 231 cubic inches.

A cubic foot of water contains 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ gallons, 1,728 cubic inches, and weighs 62 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds.

To find the pressure in pounds per square inch of a column of water multiply the height of the column in feet by .434.

Steam rising from water at its boiling point (212 degrees) has a pressure equal to the atmosphere (14.7 pounds to the square inch.)

A standard horse power: The evaporation of 30 pounds of water per hour from a feed water temperature of 100 degrees F. into steam at 70 pounds gauge pressure.

To find capacity of tanks any size; given dimensions of a cylinder in inches, to find its capacity in U. S. gallons. Square the diameter, multiply by the length and by .0034.

To ascertain heating surface in tubular boilers multiply $\frac{2}{3}$ the circumference of boiler by length of boiler in inches and add to it the area of all the tubes.

One-sixth of tensile strength of plate multiplied by thickness of plate and divided by one-half the diameter of boiler gives safe working pressure for tubular boilers. For marine boilers add 20 per cent. for drilled holes.

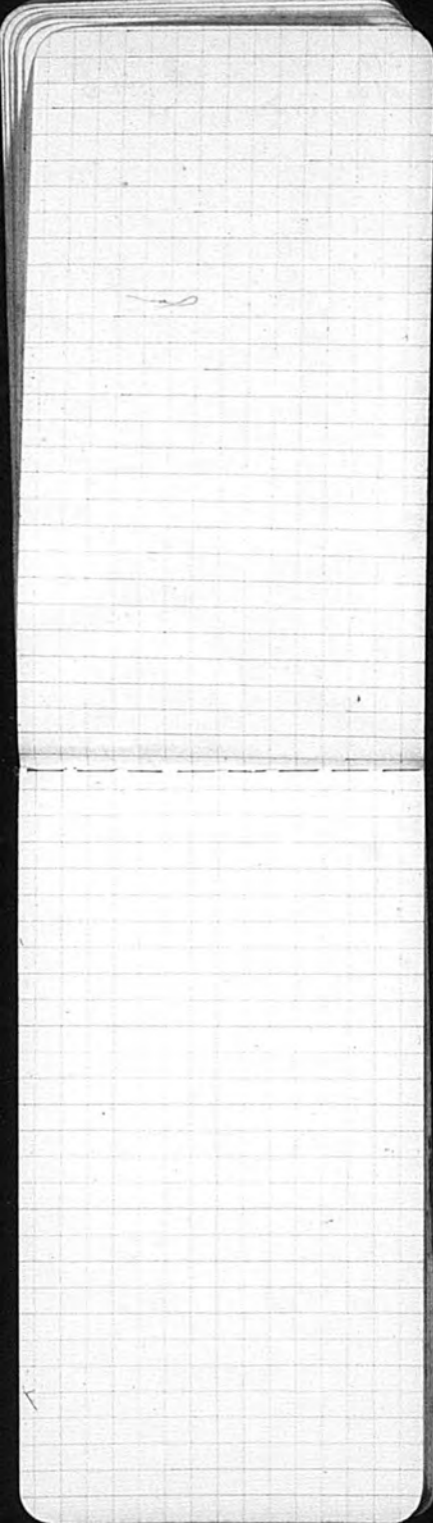

HELP IN CASE OF ACCIDENTS

Drowning.—1. Loosen Clothing, if any. 2. Empty lungs of water by laying body on its stomach and lifting it by the middle so that the head hangs down. Jerk the body a few times. 3. Pull tongue forward, using handkerchief, or pin with string, if necessary. 4. Imitate motion of respiration by alternately compressing and expanding the lower ribs, about twenty times a minute. Alternately raising and lowering the arms from the sides up above the head will stimulate the action of the lungs. Let it be done gently but persistently. 5. Apply warmth and friction to extremities. 6. By holding tongue forward, closing the nostrils and pressing the "Adams apple" back (so as to close entrance to stomach), direct inflation can be tried. Take a deep breath and breathe it forcibly into the mouth of patient, compress the chest to expel the air and repeat the operation. 7. **DON'T GIVE UP!** People have been saved after HOURS of patient, vigorous effort. 8. When breathing begins, get patient into warm bed, give WARM drinks, or spirits in teaspoonfuls, fresh air and quiet.

Burns and Scalds.—Cover with Cooking Soda and lay wet cloths over it. Whites of Eggs and Olive Oil. Olive or Linseed Oil, plain, or mixed with Chalk and Whiting.

Lightning.—Dash cold water over a person struck.

Sunstroke.—Loosen clothing. Get patient into shade, and apply ice-cold water to head.

Mad Dog or Snake Bite.—Tie cord tight above wound. Suck the wound and cauterize with caustic or white hot iron at once, or cut out adjoining parts with a sharp knife.

Venomous Insect Stings, Etc.—Apply weak Ammonia, Oil, Salt Water, or Iodine.

Fainting.—Place flat on back; allow fresh air, and sprinkle with water.

Tests of Death.—Hold mirror to mouth. If living, moisture will gather. Push pin into flesh. If dead the hole will remain, if alive it will close up.

Cinders in the Eye.—Roll soft paper up like a lamp lighter and wet the tip to remove, or use a medicine dropper to draw it out. Rub the other eye.

ANTIDOTES FOR POISONS

First.—Send for a physician.

Second.—Induce vomiting, by tickling throat with feather or finger; drinking hot water or strong mustard and water. Swallow sweet oil or whites of eggs.

Acids are antidotes for Alkalies, and vice versa.

SPECIAL POISONS AND ANTIDOTES

Acids.—Muratic, Oxalic, Acetic, Sulphuric (Oil of Vitriol), Nitric (Aqua Fortis) { Soap-suds, magnesia, lime-water.

Prussic Acid. { Ammonia in water. Dash water in face.

Carbolic Acid. { Flour and water, mucilaginous drinks.

Alkalies.—Potash, Lye, Hartshorn, Ammonia, { Vinegar or Lemon juice in water.

Arsenic.—Rat Poison, Paris Green. { Milk, raw eggs, sweet oil, lime-water, flour and water.

Bug Poison.—Lead, Saltpetre, Corrosive Sublimate, Sugar of Lead, Blue Vitriol. { Whites of eggs, or milk in large doses.

Chloroform.—Chloral. Ether. { Dash cold water on head and chest. Artificial respiration.

Carbonate of Soda.—Copperas, Cobalt. { Soap-suds and mucilaginous drinks.

Iodine.—Antimony. Tartar Emetic. { Starch and water asstringent infusions. Strong tea.

Mercury and its Salts. { Whites of eggs, milk, mucilages.

Opium.—Morphine Laudanum, Paregoric, Soothing Powders or Syrups. { Strong coffee, hot bath. Keep awake and moving at any cost.

RATES OF POSTAGE

Postal Cards 1 cent each, go without further charge to all parts of the United States and Canada. Cards for foreign countries (within the Postal Union) 2 cents each. Postal cards are unmailable with any writing or printing on the address side, except the direction, or with anything pasted upon or attached to them.

Local, or "Drop" Letters, that are for the city or town where deposited, 2 cents where the carrier system is adopted, and 1 cent where there is no carrier system.

Letters to all parts of the United States, Cuba, Porto Rico, the Philippines, Canada and Mexico, 2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof.

First Class.—Letters and all other written matter, whether sealed or unsealed, and all other matter, sealed, nailed, sewed or fastened in any manner so that it cannot be easily examined, 2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof.

Second Class.—Only for publishers and news agents, 1 cent per pound.

NEWSPAPERS and Periodicals (regular publications) can be mailed by the public at the rate of 1 cent for each 4 ounces or fraction thereof.

Third Class.—Printed matter in unsealed wrappers only (all matter enclosed in notched envelopes must pay letter rates), 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, which must be fully prepaid. This includes books, circulars, chromos, engravings, handbills, lithographs, music, pamphlets, proof-sheets and manuscript accompanying the same, reproductions by the electric pen, hectograph, metallograph, papyrograph, and, in short, any reproduction upon paper, by any process except handwriting, the copying press, typewriter and the neostyle process. Limit of weight 4 lbs., except for a single book, which may weigh more.

Fourth Class.—All mailable matter not included in the three preceding classes which is so prepared for mailing as to be easily withdrawn from the wrapper and examined, 1 cent per ounce or fraction thereof. Limit of weight 4 lbs. Full prepayment compulsory.

REGISTRATION

All kinds of postal matter, EXCEPT SECOND CLASS MATTER, can be registered at the rate of EIGHT CENTS FOR EACH PACKAGE, in addition to the regular rates of postage, to be fully prepaid by stamps. Each package must bear the name and address of the sender, and a receipt will be returned from the person to whom addressed. Mail matter can be registered at all post offices in the United States.

Experience has proven that the registration of a letter or parcel is one of the safest means known for the transmission of valuable articles, there having been a total loss during the past year of but 333 articles, out of a total of sixteen million letters and parcels registered, and if the article is prepaid at first class rates, the government will pay to the sender or owner, in case of its loss, full value, not exceeding Ten Dollars in any one case.

FREE DELIVERY

The free delivery of mail matter at the residences of the people desiring it is required by law in every city of 50,000 or more population, and may be established at every place containing not less than 5,000 inhabitants.

FOREIGN POSTAGE

The rates for letters are for the half ounce or fraction thereof and those for newspapers for 2 ounces or fraction thereof:—

To Great Britain and Ireland, France, Spain, all parts of Germany, including Austria, Denmark, Switzerland, Italy, Russia, Norway, Sweden, Turkey, (European and Asiatic), Egypt, Australia (all parts); letters, 5 cents; newspapers, 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

China: letters via San Francisco, 5 cents; via Brindisi, 15 cents; 4 cents for each paper not weighing over four ounces. British India, Italian mail: letters, 5 cents; newspapers, 1 cent for two ounces. Japan: letters, via San Francisco, 5 cents; newspapers, 1 cent for two ounces.

November — THANKSGIVING DAY (usually the fourth Thursday in November): Is observed in all the States and in the District of Columbia. Arizona and New Mexico, though in some States it is not a statutory holiday.

December 25. CHRISTMAS DAY: In all the States and in the District of Columbia, Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Sundays and Fast Days are legal holidays in all the States which designate them as such.

There are no statutory holidays in Mississippi, but by common consent the Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas are observed as holidays. In

LEGAL HOLIDAYS—CONTINUED

Kansas, Decoration Day, Labor Day and Washington's Birthday are the only legal holidays by legislative enactment; other legal holidays are so only by common consent. In New Mexico, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Labor Day, Flag Day (June 14), and Arbor Day are holidays when so designated by the Governor.

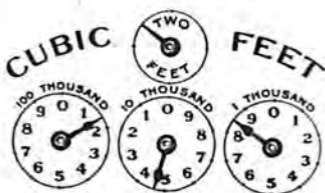
ARBOR DAY is a legal holiday in Arizona, Maine, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Dakota, Wisconsin and Wyoming, the day being set by the Governor; in Texas, February 22; Nebraska, April 22; Utah, April 15; Rhode Island, May 11; Montana, second Tuesday in May; Florida, first Friday in February; Georgia, first Friday in December; Colorado (school holiday only), third Friday in April.

Every Saturday after 12 o'clock noon is a legal holiday in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Tennessee, Virginia and the city of New Orleans, and in Newcastle County, Del., except in St. George's Hundred; in Louisiana and Missouri in cities of 100,000 or more inhabitants; in Ohio in cities of 50,000 or more inhabitants; and June 1 to August 31, in Denver, Col. In the District of Columbia for all purposes respecting the presentation for payment or acceptance or the protesting of all commercial paper whatsoever. In Connecticut, Maine and West Virginia banks close at 12 noon on Saturdays.

There is no national holiday, not even the Fourth of July. Congress has at various times appointed special holidays. In the second session of the Fifty-third Congress it passed an act making Labor Day a public holiday in the District of Columbia, and it has recognized the existence of certain days as holidays for commercial purposes, but, with the exception named, there is no general statute on the subject. The proclamation of the President designating a day of Thanksgiving only makes it a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the Territories and in those States which provide by law for it.

LEARN TO READ YOUR GAS METER

KEEP TAB ON YOUR CONSUMPTION OF GAS FROM TIME TO TIME DURING THE MONTH AND THUS VERIFY THE CORRECTNESS OF YOUR GAS BILLS



The three lower dials register the gas consumed. The right hand dial shows hundreds, the middle thousands and the left tens of thousands. To read the meter, read the left hand dial first, setting down the smaller of the two figures between which the hand appears, then set down the readings of the middle and right hand dials, and add two ciphers. Deducting the previous reading from this one shows the quantity of gas that has passed through the meter since the previous reading. (The dial marked "Two feet" is used for testing the house piping.)

EXAMPLE:

The above reads,	-	-	-	14,800 feet,
If previous reading was	-	-	-	12,200 "
The amount consumed is	-	-	-	2,600 "

- With five or more, lead.
- Return partner's lead at once.
- With few trumps, don't lead, unless opponent is strong.
- With more than three trumps, if second player, do not trump doubtful tricks.
- With less than three, trump.

SECOND HAND

- Generally play your lowest.
- With King, Ace, or King, Queen, play either one.

THIRD HAND

- Play best card, but with Ace, Queen; play Queen, Ace.

SECOND, THIRD, OR FOURTH HAND

- With a sequence, play lowest.

DISCARDING

- Discard from smallest suit, but if trumps are against you, from best suit.

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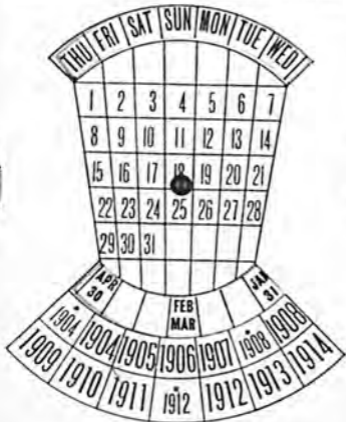

Sir:--

I am directed by the Quartermaster-General of the Army to forward by registered mail, to the address given below, a bronze medal, numbered #584, which was authorized by the Act of Congress approved June 29, 1906, to be presented to those men of the volunteers and certain of the regular troops of the Army of the Philippines who were enrolled and enlisted for the War with Spain, and who served beyond the term of their enlistments to help suppress the Philippine Insurrection.

In a cablegram dated July 1, 1899, to General Otis at Manila, the President of the United States conveyed the following expressions of appreciation for the military service thus rendered.

"The President desires to express, in the most public manner, his appreciation of the lofty patriotism shown by the volunteers and regulars of the 8th Army Corps, in performing willing service through severe campaigns and battles against the insurgents in Luzon, when, under the terms of their enlistments, they would have been entitled to discharge upon the ratification of the treaty with Spain. This action on their part was noble and heroic. It will stand forth as an example of the self-sacrifice and public consecration which have ever characterized the American soldier."

"In recognition thereof I shall recommend to Congress that a special medal of honor be given to the officers and soldiers of the 8th Army Corps who performed this great duty voluntarily and enthusiastically for their country."—William McKinley.

My dear Claire:

I have yours of the 29th - I see no reason why a thousand dollars would not fit out the place, in fact, I think Mr. Gioscio can do a very nice job of painting for \$350. He can give you some very good border effects and some very good colors. A good looking sign with the name THE LONSDALE SHOP, on the front window would probably cost you another fifty dollars. This will leave you considerable for extras inside.

You can get the list of hotel guests from Mr. Krom, Essex & Sussex, Spring Lake, New Jersey. I don't suppose you would care to work on last year's list, although come to think about it, a big percentage of last year's people will be with us this year.

If Tilden, Johnson and Rickard would get together, I see no reason why they shouldn't branch out as professionals and form a new organization. There are certainly a great many clubs in the south that would like to have exhibitions and while they are young it is a good opportunity for them to lay by something for their old age. Morris McLaughlin had a chance to lay by probably \$100,000 in his prime but it is now too late for Morris, just the same as it will be too late for Tilden and Rickard in a few more years.

I notice that the people who make their profits on selling tennis balls and racquets are not classed as professionals, neither are the officers of the association who get fat salaries. It is the silliest twaddle in the world to keep men like Tilden, Johnson & Rickard from earning a respectable livelihood by giving exhibitions for cash. The greatest sporting man in the world is known for racing horses for cash. The greatest football players in the world have coached for cash - and - there is so much more to be said on the subject that it cannot be handled in this letter. There must be hundreds of places in the United States where they would like to see high grade tennis for at least one afternoon and under the present system, there is very little opportunity for tennis fans to see real tennis.

I have a lot of other troubles and if Tilden and the rest of them want to come, say, for themselves, I don't know what more I can do. I am willing to put them on at Miami Beach and start them off with a guaranteed exhibition of at least \$2,500 and I think they could even do better in Havana, and probably just as well at Palm Beach.

If they go at it right, they could soon make the present association come to terms and acknowledge them as a separate part of tennis that must be considered.

Jane and the baby are doing all right.

My mother goes to the hospital tonight for an operation. She may be out in six or eight days and if so I will leave about the 10th or 11th for Miami Beach. It might be necessary to stay until the 12th.
