



I will have the Indianapolis News sent to you at the St. George Hotel every day. I think you should have it daily, and not once in a while. e, also, have lad some bad weather, about the worst wister I can remember in Florida. However, the city is turning away a good many people, all hotels and houses being full. everything looks very bright for us. I am very much in homes we will clean up your house in another two wooks. From this time on, at least, you can have your own grounds. I am going to plant you some very pretty flowers and trees. Do you need any money? Thank-you very much indeed for the salted peanuts and the candied fruit. They are very good, and it was a sweet thought to send them. They were so nicely packed they arrived in perfect condition. March 18th, 1919.

Dear Mother :

I am up and out again and feeling very well.

I think we had a second touch of the Flu all thru this country. Drinking water here has not been particularly good and we are trying to get some sort of an organisation that will have spring water here for next year.

April and be home about the 18th - and am in hopes you will be home about that time.

We are having a good deal of trouble in getting the houses finished up. Your little house isn't finished yet : we have had so many pole barns, work on the golf course, etc, besides trouble in getting doors, shades, etc, shipped from the North - so we expect it will be another two, possibly four weeks before this house is cleaned up and finished. However, your house is going to be a beauty - the prettiest little thing you ever saw, and I have instructed the Japs to have it planted with flowers and everything ready for you next fall. I think you are going to like it very much.

This has been rather a hard Winter, with a good many troubles and a great deal of work, and i am sort of glad to see it drawing to a close.

Take good care of yourself, don't catch cold, and be careful of the kind of water you use. I think you should buy foland water for your own drinking water, all the time. I wouldn't take any chances on this florida water.

I cannot understand thy you do not receive my letters. You see it takes two or three days to get mail down here from St. Augustine and I have just returned from a two days trip down the Bay with Mr. Vincent of the Packard Company.

I think the weather at home will be very fair. I have wired Galloway and Al Heath that you are soming - so they can have the house all ready.

I am sorry you lose patience and write me as you did
because you know there is no use of doing this, with the telegraph
office within a block of you. When you don't receive prompt mail
there is no reason why you shouldn't go right over to the telegraph
office and send me a wire. You must always know there is something
wrong when you don't receive answers to your letters, because I
always answer them. The mail cituation is terrible all over
the United States. Cometimes we get a letter here that has been
delayed on the read for ten days.



Dear Mother :

I have yours of Sunday. I am really glad that you didn't come down here when we did, because we haven't had good weather this year. It has been sticky and hot and there are a lot of mosquitos. We are trimming up all of the trees and hope to get rid of them - hope a cold wind will drive them away. The big fill we are making is causing these mosquitos to come out into the open.

We have had strikes and a great deal of trouble this year - and while the coal shortage doesn't bother us, there is every other kind of trouble.

Sometimes I think it is a mistake to come down before the middle of December. Last year it was beautiful along the first of November, but we had a hot spell along the latter part of the month.

I don't know whether you have a full set of booklets at Jacksonville or not - so am sending you up a full set.

I would like very much to have you come down here some time before the season is over and at least look the place over. You can stop at the Lincoln if you only went to stay for a short time - which will save you will the cares of housekeeping.
