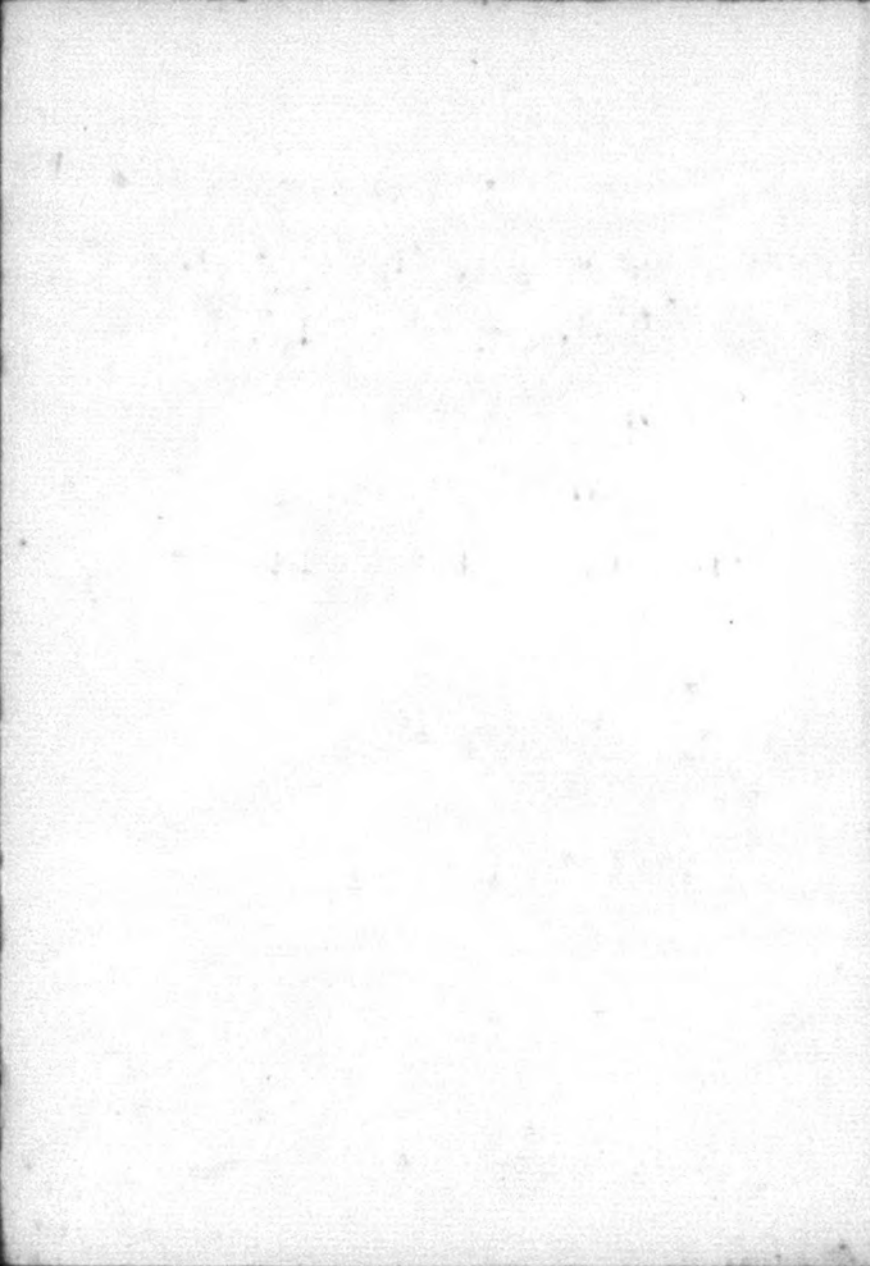

I am glad you have located your friends, and are having a good time. I think if you go to Atlanta the Cookseys may sue you for a commission on the house. If they get service on you in Atlanta, you will have to stay there and defend the suit, or go back and forth. Rather than go back and forth for a long time, you would be forced to pay them a commission, and I don't put it past Cooksey a bit to do it.

It is up to you, I have already paid one commission on the property, and I feel that is all I ought to be forced to pay. I told Cooksey he could have all over \$9000 he could get for the property, and because he couldn't get any more is no fault of mine.

So if I were you, I would stay away from Atlanta.

Dear Mother :

I have yours of the 26th : I was thinking of you yesterday and the day before.

We have had some very poor weather here this year - in fact, it is the worst winter I have ever seen in Florida for damp weather and sticky days.

I haven't been very well for a couple of days - just have a bad cold. Think I will be alright tomorrow or next day.

Labor conditions here are still poor. Your house is finally all painted and completed except for the floors and doors. The doors were lost for over two months on the railroad.

Sales are opening up some and I think we will get away from here with a very fair business - but not what we expected.

I don't believe I would hesitate, if I were you, on going to Charleston. The weather there is undoubtedly better than it is here. Let me know if you decide to leave.

Dear Mother,

I have yours written on a rainy day, also the flower. It was a little bit out of shape, but it still gives some perfume.

I notice that you are very busy with your matinees, etc. We have had a good many labor troubles here, and your house is a little slow in coming along.

I will have the Indianapolis News sent to you at the St. George Hotel every day. I think you should have it daily, and not once in a while. We, also, have had some bad weather, about the worst winter I can remember in Florida.

However, the city is turning away a good many people, all hotels and houses being full. Everything looks very bright for us. I am very much in hope we will clean up your house in another two weeks. From this time on, at least, you can have your own grounds. I am going to plant you some very pretty flowers and trees.

Do you need any money?

Thank-you very much indeed for the salted peanuts and the candied fruit. They are very good, and it was a sweet thought to send them. They were so nicely packed they arrived in perfect condition.

March 18th, 1919.

Dear Mother :

I am up and out again and feeling very well. I think we had a second touch of the Flu all thru this country. Drinking water here has not been particularly good and we are trying to get some sort of an organization that will have spring water here for next year.

I expect to leave here about the 15th or 16th of April and be home about the 18th - and am in hopes you will be home about that time.

We are having a good deal of trouble in getting the houses finished up. Your little house isn't finished yet : we have had so many pole barns, work on the golf course, etc, besides trouble in getting doors, shades, etc, shipped from the North - so we expect it will be another two, possibly four weeks before this house is cleaned up and finished. However, your house is going to be a beauty - the prettiest little thing you ever saw, and I have instructed the Japs to have it planted with flowers and everything ready for you next fall. I think you are going to like it very much.

This has been rather a hard winter, with a good many troubles and a great deal of work, and I am sort of glad to see it drawing to a close.

Take good care of yourself, don't catch cold, and be careful of the kind of water you use. I think you should buy Poland water for your own drinking water, all the time. I wouldn't take any chances on this "Florida water."

I have just wired you as follows : "Have written you a half dozen letters to the St. George Hotel at St. Augustine. Your check was mailed to the St. George at St. Augustine on Monday. Remain at the Hotel Seminole until you receive your check. I will wire the St. George to forward your check and mail today. I cannot understand why you don't receive my letters if you have been at the St. George. Wire me at once advising if you receive this telegram. Am writing. Love."

I cannot understand why you do not receive my letters. You see it takes two or three days to get mail down here from St. Augustine and I have just returned from a two days trip down the Bay with Mr. Vincent of the Packard Company.

I think the weather at home will be very fair. I have wired Galloway and Al Heath that you are coming - so they can have the house all ready.

I am sorry you lose patience and write me as you did because you know there is no use of doing this, with the telegraph office within a block of you. When you don't receive prompt mail there is no reason why you shouldn't go right over to the telegraph office and send me a wire. You must always know there is something wrong when you don't receive answers to your letters, because I always answer them. The mail situation is terrible all over the United States. Sometimes we get a letter here that has been delayed on the road for ten days.

Sometimes I think it is a mistake to come down before the middle of December. Last year it was beautiful along the first of November, but we had a hot spell along the latter part of the month.

I don't know whether you have a full set of booklets at Jacksonville or not - so am sending you up a full set.

I would like very much to have you come down here some time before the season is over and at least look the place over. You can stop at the Lincoln if you only want to stay for a short time - which will save you all the cares of housekeeping.

I am sending your letter over to Jane as she has been anxious to hear from you.

I thot I saw the car as I came home, flashing by on Meridian Street, turning a corner on two wheels - and I asked for the Police to look for the car and the driver. The Chief of Police notified all of his outstanding men over town to bring in the car and driver - but some way or other, Garret managed to evade them. I waited for him until after 1:30 and he hadn't returned yet ; he came in some time in the early morning. The car was covered with dirt and it was necessary to change one tire. I don't know where he had been.

Besides giving him a hell-of-a-cussing, I fired him and told him I never wanted to see him around my place again. This brings up a point I want to make to you - that if you ever fire anybody from your employ as being unsatisfactory, it is the most foolish thing in the world to ever hire them over again. Replying to yours of the 24th : I am returning the Northrup letter. I think your suggestion is good. Lets give Northrup one lot, take the others back, write him a nice letter, and possibly we will save him his investment or he will still be a friend of the Company.

I wired you today to ship one Ten-Thousand Dollar Kentucky Rock Asphalt cert. direct to the Fletcher American Bank in order to clean up a lot of little bills that have accumulated here I got a loan on the Continental Realty Company today for ninety days, as my own account there is up to the limit, and I gave them this bond as collateral. I will probably have two or three thousand dollars of this sum left. I am paying interest on the notes up here and for instance, yesterday paid Rosenberg \$800 interest on his \$10,000 loan. The interest on this \$6500 note brings the deposit down to \$6376.82.

I am expecting within the next ten or fifteen days that Wood will take the Kentucky Rock Asphalt stock at par, which will give us \$116,000.00, but only about \$35,000 or \$40,000 cash.

Mother has been sick and we have had the Doctor - and just now I am not dead sure that I will be able to get away by the 5th. In the meantime, look out for Mr. Hurley and sell him the garage for \$30,000 and don't offer to let him have it for any less than this, but if he should offer \$28,000 cash, I would take it.

I would like to have a statement of all of our companies gotten up to date and I want to send a copy of this statement to the Fletcher American Bank. They asked me for a statement about six months ago and I forgot it and they never said anything more about it - but they should have a statement - it is due them and I would like to have it gotten out at once.

Let Mrs. Deagan go in the Post house and we will let Cooly use that this winter.
