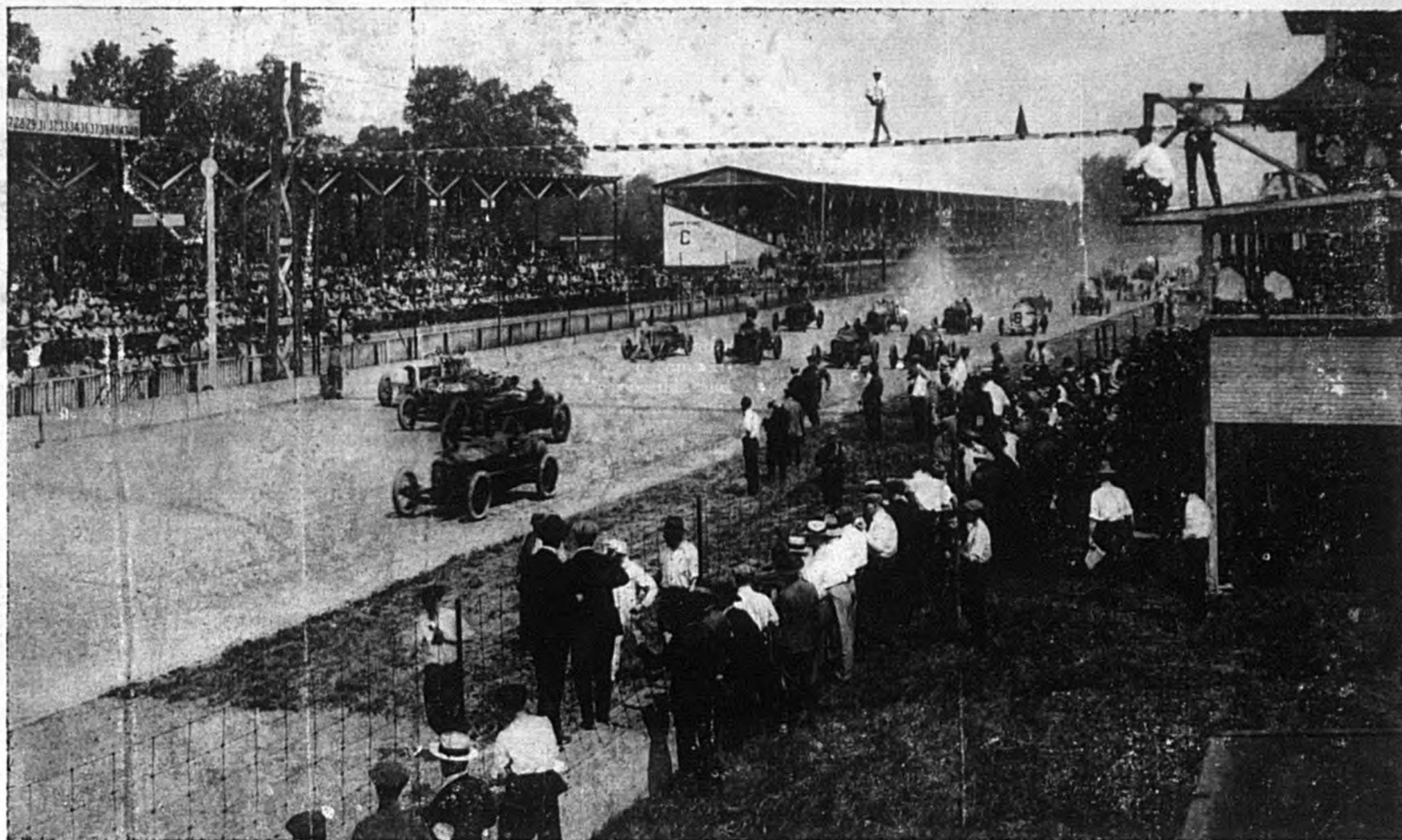

Monday - the 3rd.

Mr. Fisher :

I went down and looked at the Hudson this morning and found it in the same condition in which it was placed on the second floor. That is, it shows no indications of having been used. They are still asking the price you put on it - \$1750.00. Mr. Cherry reports that a few people have been interested in it but the price was too high.

Called Mr. Mason and he said he tried to get you yesterday - wanted you to stop in his studio and see the drawing. I promised to stop in today and look at it - and will then see that it is shipped down to you for final corrections. Mr. Mason says he has gone about as far as he can on it, without further suggestions from you.

By this time, Galloway has seen you at Louisville and delivered the suit case and hat box. Up until the time I talked to him he hadn't been able to locate Fred.

I was quite ill last night and had to have Dr. Mindemuth. Am going to clear up all that I can here at the office this morning - the mail that was left, etc, - and then go back to Dr. Reese's to have two more teeth extracted that are abscessed and in the same condition as the other. I am about on my last legs this morning; the Doctor asked me to stay in bed for several days, but I will be alright after these other teeth are out - and will be back here in the morning.

I hope the labor situation is going to straighten out so things will keep moving - and hope, also, that you found our property more beautiful than ever.

Please put the head of the dearest thing on earth to me - and tell me if he knew Laddie and how they acted.

In response to your first telegram this morning, I wrote Mr. George Cnau of the Detroit Insurance Agency along the general lines of our letters, sending him the complete set of booklets under separate cover. I went so far as to suggest that if he would care for a personal interview in order to get further information, he might have his secretary advise Miss Rositer, a special representative of the Alton Beach Realty Company, who would be in Detroit two days next week and be glad to call on him.

Unless something unforeseen happens, I expect to spend Saturday and Sunday with my Mother in Detroit, for fear I do not get to see her again before I go South. I gave Mr. Cnau the option of an interview, thinking he must be a special case or you would not have wired regarding him when you would send a letter and booklets yourself from Miami. Trust this is O.K. - if he is keenly interested, he may be glad to have a personal interview.

Thank you for your second telegram of today. I am awaiting the letter with interest.

Dear Mr. Fisher :

Your two letters of Monday just received. Am still expecting word from you in answer to mine regarding the Pittsburg list.

In the next day or so you will probably receive an application by mail from a painter - W. A. Collins - who was in here yesterday to find out something about conditions down there. I referred him to Floyd or Bastian, but he will probably write you direct. My recommendation of people probably isn't worth much but I would suggest that you consider his application favorably - if the contractors still need men. He appeared to be a thoroly competent and reliable man and I liked his looks. He is a painter by trade and inheritance but also does carpentering, upholstering, etc. His address here is 818 N. Wallace. He has a recommendation from Mrs. Henry Campbell who tried to keep him as sort of a 'handy man' after the contract on which he was working on their house was completed.

Am sending a letter on other matters under separate cover.

Please advise me regarding the Pittsburg list. Shall I send the first letter and Playground booklet to those people ?

Friday - January 31st, 1919.

Dear Mr. Fisher :

I left the Hotel this noon and am now installed out in the residence section. Think I shall like it much better, for the time I will be here. I stayed at the Hotel a day longer than necessary, thinking I might possibly get a letter or wire from you - but you have this new address by this time, so I suppose any mail you send will come out here. Have heard nothing from Miami since I left.

Have spent most of this past week fighting the Flu - or possibly just a heavy cold. It made me pretty miserable, but am now feeling alright and will soon become hardened to the cold. Tomorrow I have an appointment, and beginning next week I shall have several people to see, if I can just gain admittance.

The Kisers took me a ride over part of the city this afternoon, and I was astounded to see the wealth in homes. Many of them - the homes - have a million or so invested, and it is easy to believe that the owners are worth up into the hundreds of millions, as Mr. Kiser has assured me. Attached I am sending you a list of about 300 good names, checked by Mr. ~~Fisher~~ Kiser. I am retaining a list of 35 names that I shall attempt to see personally : some of them, of course, will probably not see me at all.

I saw an odd looking bunker today. Lee Nelson has probably seen them before, but you might ask him. On top of the bunker was planted an evergreen hedge : it was rather barren today, but in Summer I can imagine that it is very pretty. It raised the height of the bunker about 3-feet.

Had such a nice dinner at the Kisers' last evening - then went to the picture show in the evening. Tomorrow night we are going to the Athletic Club, and Sunday I am going there for dinner again. I refused these invitations at first, but they are insistent and Mr. Kiser says that Mrs. Kiser likes me and wants me to come - so I am now accepting. She is a very beautiful woman, isn't she ?

Thus endeth the first week.

Tuesday - February 4th.

Dear Mr. Fisher :

Enclosed are the only pictures I could get at Belleair, on account of the rain. I took them to show the height of those raised greens. One picture shows the end of the new tile swimming pool at Belleair, where Howland is : it shows the corner where the orchestra sits, and the spectators' platform all around.

The other is a picture of the only pretty thing I saw at St. Petersburg - the boat-house on the Thompson place on the Big Bayou, which was the only good looking large home at St. Petersburg. It is quite an attractive boat-house.

I have talked to Mr. E. J. Thompson of the E. J. Thompson Company, whom Mr. Kiser thought would be such a good prospect. He has already bought at Miami Beach - just above Mr. Collins on the Ocean front.

Had rather a hurried but pleasant talk yesterday with Mr. R. H. Boggs of the Boggs & Buhl Company, a big department store here. Mr. Boggs was keeping a meeting waiting there in his office, so we only talked about fifteen minutes. He said they had spent several Winters at Palm Beach and had never bothered to go to Miami. This year they are not going down because he is too busy - but he said they fully intend to go next year - and since looking over the booklets I showed him, particularly the Altonia booklet (which he wanted to take home to Mrs. Boggs) he promised to give Miami a try next year. Said he didn't know it was as attractive down there as the booklets displayed it.

You must be very busy. I have been gone practically two weeks and I haven't heard from you yet. I hope its because we are selling so much property.

I have your letter of January 31, and also a letter from Earl.

The names you sent are dandy, and we will get to them immediately. I am figuring you can get back here about the twentieth of February. I want to find out why William E. English gave up his proposed trip here, and why the Pattersons gave up theirs. We must discover, if possible, why an awakened interest cools off so quickly.

So far, as the result of our advertising campaign, we haven't actually closed a deal. Possibly from the list you send something may turn up. Wherever you get names, try to get the house address. We don't want our advertising matter to go to the man's office.

I enclose you \$100 (one hundred dollars) expense money. I may want you, in a few days, to go Dayton, and from there to call on Mr. English at his home. I am not sure whether he is in Indianapolis or in the little town where he has his summer home. I will write to him and to Mr. Patterson.

There is a great crowd here. The bath house is breaking the records, and also the pools.

If you should learn that Schwab has returned to Pittsburgh from Europe, I should like to have you make an engagement to show him the album. He is the one man in that whole community that I should like to be able to get here. It would be worth while for you to show him some photographs of what we have.

My dear Albertine,

I have yours of the 4th. It isn't necessary to make a nightly report, a weekly summing up of your efforts will give me an idea of what is to be accomplished. I should particularly like to have you take each name that you call on and tell me exactly what they say about Miami.

I should like to know how many of such people have been in Miami and have since lost interest, and how long ago they were here. You can well understand that people who were disgusted with the place six or seven years ago might be wonderfully pleased if they could see it now.

The pictures of the swimming pool and links arrived o. k. We are going to build a new nine-hole golf course in connection with the hotel, and it will have two or three raised greens.

I am glad you had a talk with Mr. Boggs. I don't understand why you have not received my letters and telegrams. I have sent you two telegrams, and this is the third letter. I have written to Earl Kiser as you suggested. We will circularize the names you sent immediately.

The other day I wrote to you to try to be here on the 18th. The weather has been bad, but it is beautiful today.

Monday - February 10th.

Dear Mr. Fisher :

I am this afternoon in receipt of your letters of February 1st, 6th and 7th - and information noted. Also enclosures received.

There are at least three people in Pittsburgh that I wish to see yet. One - Mr. Mabeth of Mabeth-Evans Company - has been ill for over a month with Influenza. I want to catch him the first chance possible, as he ought to welcome a trip South right now, particularly since it has turned very cold here. They claim their real Winter is now starting.

One reason it has been so hard to interest people, I think, is because for Pittsburgh the weather has been very mild and people were comfortable at home. At least several have talked along that line.

By Thursday of this week I will write you at length and report on Mr. Patterson and Mr. English. I am going to Cincinnati tonight and returning here for two more days before starting South, for this reason - I was able today to get a partial line on Mr. Schwab, and there is a possibility of an interview the latter part of the week. I don't want to leave until I get in touch with him if it is possible to do so. 



I have certainly had the Miami Beach Blues all season and now your note makes me more homesick than ever. Funny how a fellow never quite gets Florida out of his system - particularly if any one part of it ever meant as much as that little peninsula meant to me ! And as I wrote Margaret on a Christmas card I sent, you are getting some wonderful publicity up here this year - better than ever before. Aside from advertisement, every Pittsburgh paper, and daily too, carries all sorts of sports items, news items and social. I hope it means you are having a great season and things are coming back. I still 'talk' Miami Beach - but this particular nest of bloated plutocrats are no longer bloated. In fact they have completely caved in, most of them.

I am so sorry about Margaret but hope by the time you have this letter she is out and O.K. - ready for a good New Year. Owen is in bed. He has had a bronchial throat and tonsillitis for about three weeks - got out of bed to conduct Christmas Services, against the doctor's and my orders, and has been back ever since. Today his temperatur and voice are both normal so he is surely on the upgrade. Betty and Sally accuse him of trying to prolong his indisposition so the Church will have to suggest that he take a month off and get some Florida sunshine.

A Christmas card from Frankie said they had leased their house and also had moved - into the 51st Street Apartments. My Miami Beach news is scarce, except from the papers, but I get letters written only about once in six months so can't expect much response.

We didn't bother much about Christmas except for the Welfare Work I have been doing and the many poor families to be taken care of - but what do you think Sally and Owen Jr. gave me? Of course you will sniff, being Airedale addicted, as I still am myself, but I have an eight weeks old Cocker Spaniel that is the smartest little trick you ever saw. After Rowdy had to go and Rough was run over I said I never wanted another dog - it is too heart-breaking when anything happens to them. After nearly three years, however, I couldn't stand the house any longer without a dog around, so have been harping on the subject all Fall.

If you could hear the hilarity downstairs right now you wouldn't think I needed a pup to cheer me up. A crowd of Betty's and Sally's friends are being gay just talking over Holiday parties. One of them just came up to tell me a new joke - funny or not, depending upon one's sense of humor. Three men went into a lunch room, sat down and ordered: one ordered hamburger, another griddle cakes and the third hot dogs. Which one was the sailor? The answer being, after no-one can guess - "The one in the sailor hat."

My mind has been centered on the matter of a Community Church for Montauk Beach. I have also carried on some investigations, at your suggestion. Several facts have emerged, one of which I write about now : the others can wait until I see you.

The one that is most important is in regard to a Church that covers the entire religious needs of a community. Picking up the Miami Herald of recent date, I see the Catholics are to build at Miami Beach, the Episcopalians are planning an organization and a Church, and the Methodists have one already - all of which means that the Community Church on Alton Road, while eminently successful, is not in a final sense a Community Church.

My investigations show that such a Church is not only possible but in two instances is in successful operation - at Watch Hill and Rolling Rock. Of course the project of building such a Church requires care in construction and

tact in handling the enterprize in its early stages. I know it can be done and should be done. DIRECTOR

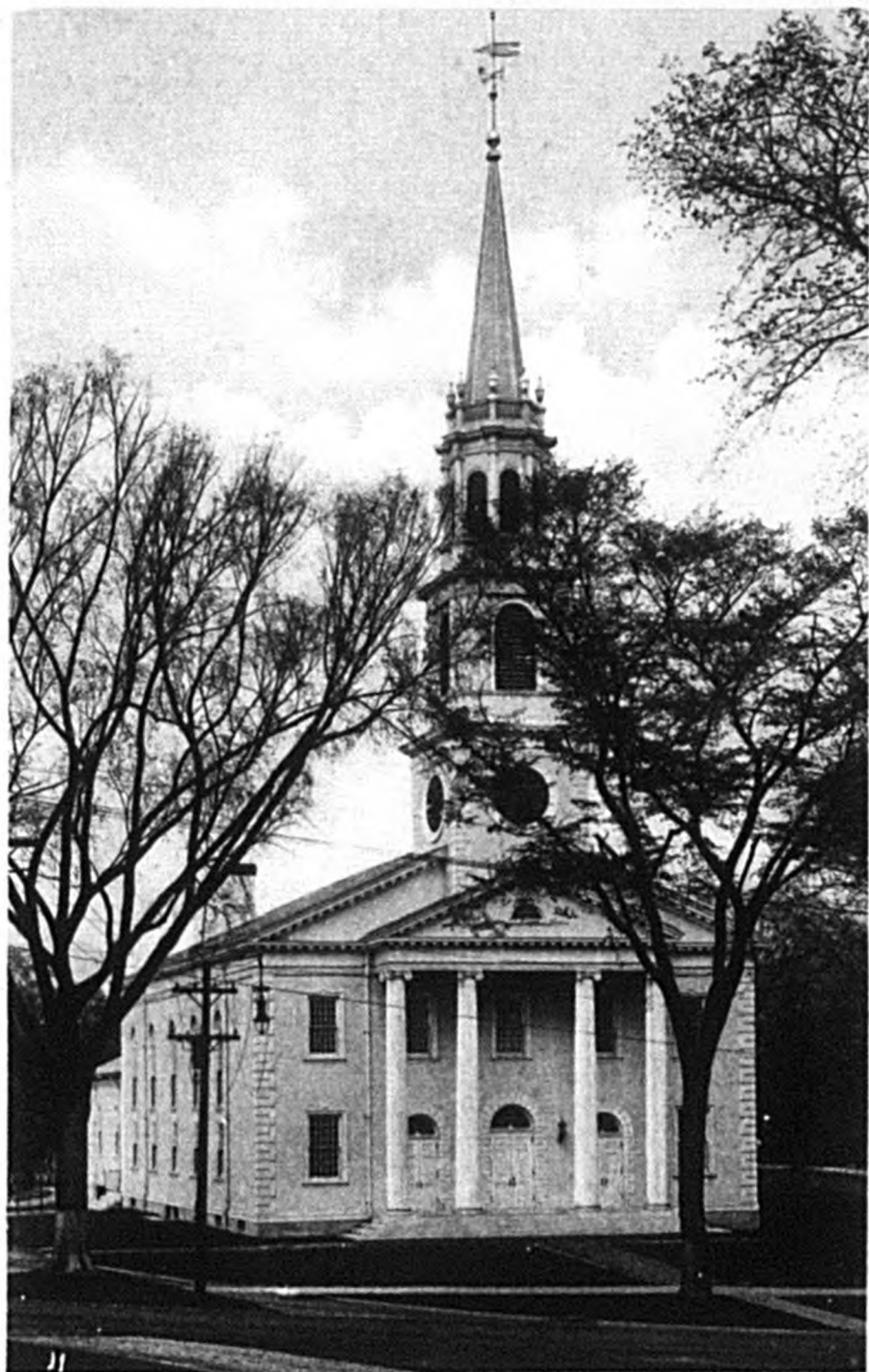
The Trustees, as soon as feasible, to engage a Director - broadminded, tolerant and agreeable - to direct the enterprise without favoritism for the whole community.
