Dear Mr. Olds :

I have yours of August Eth: I am just back from a tendays inspection of the principal Summer Resorts and real estate subdivisions in the East. I am more than ever convinced of the great possibilities of your property at Grosse Isle - but just now I dislike very much to taskle a proposition of this kind alone, and I would be more inclined to be interested in the development of the property without considering your house and the SS-acres farm which is a part of the house grounds, as I understand your letter.

The development which I have in mind would greatly enhance the value of your property, and undestionably my development, if carried thru, would allow you to take as much as \$550,000 out of the acreage around your property and still retain your home. Of course a certain amount would have to spent in dredging and straightening the canals. The blueprint which you have sent me does not give me the information which I would like to have - and on receipt of a letter from you stating if you would be willing to sell me, on reasonable time, that part of your property not including the house and grounds (and under proper restractions so that your property would be pretected) I will send for my engineer in Florida and have him come up and make a survey, particularly making soundings for dredging purposes.

There is one fly in the cintment, and that is whether or not greeces it wild imediately grew back on the dredged portions of the protected inlets. If these grasses continued to grow it would be a serious problem in my mind whether the property would bring the price necessary to obtain to warrant the heavy expanditure in dredging and bulkheading.

Can't you send me a blueprint of the entire lower peninsula of Grosse Ile - all that part which belongs to you marked in red or some distinctive color - and a blueprint drawn to scale so that I can get a better idea of the frontage available?

I am closely in touch with the proper dredge man to do that part of the work at a very reasonable price - we have done so much of this work in Florida.

Dear Mr Fisher .-

On returning to my desk I find your letter of August 20th. It would suit me just as well not to consider the residence property, as it is so beautiful and restful there that I doubt very much whether I would ever care to sell it, but as to the farm property, it is more or less of a bother to try to run a farm of this size and I would be willing to sell this on a moderate payment down and the balance to stand to suit the purchaser. For instance, if he wanted to pay \$50,000.00 down the balance could be spread over a term of years eo that the money would practically come out of the improved property.

Ae to going in with you, I do not know of anyone I would be more willing to take a chance with in an enterprise, but at the same time I am trying to retire as I find that my own business and enterprises take all the time that I wish to devote to business.

I note what you say about growth of grasses in the dredged portions. What dredging I have done here I have found that there was a sandstone rock at a depth of from six to nine feet. All the dredging I have done has been with a dipper dredge which does not clean up the bottom. Notwithetanding this very little grass has shown up in the portion that has been dredged about four years. Any time when I see fit to put in a suction dredge and clean out the two or three feet of mud on the rock I am confident that that would be the end of weeds or grasses. I notice this, too, that the grasses are not plentiful where there is any current. In fact, the dredging that I have done down at the lower end of Grosse Ile is practically free from weeds or grasses.

I note with much pleasure what you say about the southern part of Grosse Ile. I endorse this sentiment, as I feel there is not another location like this anywhere in the United States where we have five to ten miles of clear sailing water in the mouth of the Detroit River for sailing yaohte, we have the inside harbors and free access to the river up and down the flats, and with fast motor boats, as we have at this day, there is no location equal to it.

I am going back to Elhamar tomorrow and will mail you blumprint showing the whole island and will mark around that portion which I own.

I wish you would drop me a line at Grosse Ile just how soon your engineer could look the property over and when you are likely to be in Detroit again. You certainly have the right idea for making a wonderful place out of this.

Dear Mr. Olds :

I would appreciate it very much if you would interest yourself in a couple of Rec Coupes that are coming thru for me at the Factory some time in the next month.

About five years ago you made up a Reo Coupe for Mrs. Picher and I explained to you at the time that I would appreciate it very much if you would have the springs polished before the job was assembled as it made a much easier job. This order was put thru the factory and this particular Coupe is the easiest riding Coupe we have ever had in this district. I think a big art of the success of the riding qualities of this war was due to the fact that the springs were thoroly polished and that they were just a little bit lighter than the usual equipment.

After receiving the Compe hero, it is quite a big job to tear
it down, take the springs off, pelish them and reassemble the car - but it
isn't so much of a job for the factory to do this work before it is
assembled. Personally I think that the manufacturer who pays a little
rore attention to the spring equipment will reap some benefit, as the
rajority of compes ride hard, especially after the springs get rusty.

If you have nover tried this out on your own our I would like to have you do it and you will see that a wonderful difference it makes, to take down your front and rear springs, thoroly polish them, then reassemble with graphite and wrapped with tape - you will find a velvety sensation in the riding of the car that is entirely absent without this treatment.

If not too much trouble, would like to have the springs on these two coupes polished before they leave the factory. We have altogether, here and at Missi, six Reo Coupes, and I am going to get new ones as these are getting pretty old.
