Contributors

CANTER BROWN, JR., a native of Polk County, Florida, is a doctoral student in history at the University of Florida. He received his B.A. and J.D. degrees from Florida State University and is the author of numerous scholarly articles on Florida history. He is a recipient of the Florida Historical Society's Governor LeRoy Collins Award and the Southern Jewish Historical Society's B.H. Levy Prize. His book, *Florida's Peace River Frontier*, is published by the University of Central Florida Press. He currently is writing a biography of Ossian Bingley Hart, Florida's loyalist Reconstruction governor.

JOSEPHINE JOHNSON, Ph.D., is professor of speech communication at the University of Miami and is a former chair of the Department of Communication. Her published work includes a biography, *Florence Farr: Bernard Shaw's' New Woman*, chapters in *G.B.S. Fabian Feminist* and *Historical Perspectives of Performance in Literature*. She is also the author of *Powerspeak* and her 1919-1939 British Jazz History is to be published by Bayou Press, England. The *Yeats Annual* and Praeger press will also publish other work in 1992.

NIXON SMILEY, a well known newspaper reporter for the *Miami Herald*, local historian, and environmentalist, died July 29, 1990. Except for a hitch in the Marines during World War II, Smiley worked for the *Herald* from 1940 until he retired in 1973. His *Knights of the Fourth Estate*, one of nine books that he wrote, is the definitive history of the *Miami Herald* and an excellent history of Miami as well.

Long the *Herald's* horticulture expert, Smiley was also acting director at Fairchild Tropical Garden from 1956-63. His interest in tropical plants was a particularly rewarding part of his life.
