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### Obtaining Issues

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*Boca Grande 42 Ft. Two boats square when N and Lovers 1 boats E. Make short point bear E N E distant 3 miles and keep on till N and Gasparilla bears S E. Don't stop for that point due N E. When inside and near Gasparilla, stop N E by E to anchorage.*

*Captive Pass 8 Ft. Approach from South distant 4 mile from land and cross the bar sailing due N then bear N E to and through the pass with plenty water inside N end of Captive Island.*

*Sanibel Pass 10 Ft. perhaps 10 Ft. Approach from S and bring Pointe Boca to bear S W distant 21 miles, and round point of Sanibel 1 to deep anchorage.*
