History of the Class of '32

The history of the class of 1932 is not one of phenomenal rises or fallings, but rather it is one of a long series of calm, unruffled happenings covering a period of three years. Upon our entrance into High School in 1929 we were fifty-nine (59) in number. This group was divided into two distinct sections, one under Mrs. Addah J. Ramsey and the other under Miss Jeanne Smith, and both supervised by Mr. Carter, our principal. The class was characterized by its excellent showing of co-operation and class spirit. Our officers, headed by Anibal Armayor, president, were very efficient in the discharge of their duties. Our basket ball team made an excellent showing, considering our lack of experience and the size of our opponents. The latter months of this term, our first in High School, rolled swiftly by and before we realized it our Junior year was near at hand.

This term found the class united under the supervision of Miss Doris Long, with Mr. Everett as our new principal. The untimely and sad death of Miss Long temporarily disorganized us but with the arrival of Miss Lorace Peeples, our new teacher, conditions bettered and again the routine of school life went on uninterrupted. Our class officers for this year were Anibal Armayor, president; Fred Knight, vice-president; and Clara Lankford, secretary-treasurer. The class won many of the awards offered by the Parent-Teacher Association for having the largest number of parents present at the regular monthly meetings.

April 1st, Conch Day, found us nervous and apprehensive as to the nature of the pranks to be played on us by the Seniors, as is the custom on this day. President Armayor received the historic shell and replied in a most witty and complimentary manner to President Dopp's speech of presentation. Our class was honored at this time by the selection of two of our class-mates, Lorraine Caviness and Fred Knight, for the honor of being Monroe County's "Best Citizens" on Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen's "Second Patriotic Pilgrimage to Washington."

On May 8th the class presented the Seniors with a banquet, as is the annual custom. The "Hawaiian" motif was successfully carried out in the decorations and the costumes of the waitresses. The Seniors and all the other guests present were unanimous in their praise and thanks for the enjoyable evening that had been arranged for their entertainment. The remaining months of the term passed uneventfully, and soon we were enjoying our hard-earned vacation.

September, 1931, found us back in school again and Seniors at last! Once more we were divided. This time Mr. Edwin Phillips headed one section and Miss Lorace Peeples the other, with Mr. Everett as our principal as before. This division lasted until February, 1932, when the class was combined under the supervision of Miss Peeples. Our class

elected Anibal Armayor as president for the third time; Joseph Lopez, vice-president; Gerry Steadman, secretary, and Clara Lankford, treasurer. When an Athletic Association was organized we furnished the president and vice-president, Alvin Smith and Joe Lopez, respectively. We had three players on the boys' basket ball team and five on the girls' team. The majority of the cast of the Glee Club operetta, "The Gypsy Rover," was drawn from among the members of the Senior class. The annual play presented by the Senior class ably displayed our histrionic ability. Miss Peeples' efficient and painstaking direction and supervision were responsible for the extraordinary success attained by the production. The play, "Applesauce," was a comedy of American life and was presented in three acts. For the second time the cast of a Glee Club entertainment was composed mainly of Seniors. This time it was in the minstrel, "Land o' Cotton."

April 1st gave us the opportunity for wreaking vengeance on the Juniors. President Armayor cleverly presented the "Conch" to President Lightbourne, of the Juniors. He told of the remarkable scholastic record established by their superiors and said that he doubted their ability to uphold such a record. President Lightbourne made a reply that was typical of all Juniors—she attempted to "talk back" to a Senior! We feel sure that the Juniors will never forget the program that followed the presentation of the old shell.

Immediately after the program was completed the Seniors left for Pine Key for an all-day picnic. Pajamas were the style with the girls and old clothes were favored by the boys. Fourteen of our class-mates embarked for the State Music Festival at Tampa with the Glee Club. Three officers of the Glee Club are members of the Class of '32. They are Joe Lopez, president; Anibal Armayor, vice-president, and Rosemary Lopez, secretary-treasurer. The club, of course, stood high in the ranks of the competitors. A cup for second prize and one for third prize were brought back as evidence of the club's ability.

For a second time our class was honored by the selection of two of its members, Anna Perez and Howard England, as delegates on Mrs. Owen's "Third Patriotic Pilgrimage to Washington." Out of a total of six delegates in three years the class had the honor of furnishing the two for the second and two for the third. Joe Lopez and William Demeritt represented Monroe County in the state interscholastic golf tournament at Gainesville during he latter part of April. The boys came close to winning the championship, and though they were defeated we know that they fought hard all the way.

Our valedictorian and salutatorian are Howard England and Lorraine Caviness, respectively. The class published an annual very successfully under the direction of a well-chosen staff headed by Howard England.

The Senior Class of 1932 is the second largest class to graduate from Key West High School. The Class of 1929 was the largest.

We leave the old school sadly, knowing that we have formed many friendships that must be left behind as we go out to find our place in the scheme of life.







The Golf Team


