History of Class of '34

"Like unto ships far off at sea, Outward or homeward bound, are we." —Longfellow.

In 1931 the Class of '34 began her outward bound voyage with all of her crew full of enthusiasm. During this year we were snobbed by all the members of the upper ships, but despite this fact we had smooth sailing and we brought our ship through successfully on her maiden voyage. There is little to write about during our first year of high school as we spent our time studying and working to enter the senior high fleet the following year.

In September, 1932, we sailed our ship into senior high and joined the other ships of the fleet. At this time we were given Miss Mary Trevor for our sponsor, and she has given her aid and time to the de-

velopment of this class ever since. At the beginning Miss Trevor laid down before us the ship's course telling of the rough and shallow spots, which we had to cross in order to sail in at the head of the fleet, but we were determined to battle the waves and cross the bar in 1934. Within the next few weeks members of the crew met and elected the following officers: Paul Sawyer, captain; Kathleen Watkins, first mate; Galen Lund, purser, and Lois Sawyer, secretary. It was at this time that our ship took a lead in the field of sports. Our baseball and diamond ball teams met and defeated teams from the other ships. In the annual basketball tournament of the fleet, our ship came in second. Two members of our crew received positions on the fleet's basketball team, and William Cates won a place on the all sectional team for his brilliant playing in the district tournament held at Miami. When the call came for singers our ship sent forth a large group who helped the Glee Club win three prizes at the music festival at Tampa. Some of the boys of our ship served as waiters on the world tour given for the departing ship of '32. During the next three months we were given shore leave which made every tired sailor happy.

The next year we came back promoted to the proud position of Juniors which made us rank second highest in the fleet. We were encouraged by again having Miss Trevor for our sponsor. As Ship A-Hoy sounded throughout the ship Paul Sawyer was again appointed captain, while William Cates was given the position of first mate. Galen Lund and Kathleen Watkins held fast to the financial and business records.

It was at this time that the fleet formed an association which put the governing of the fleet's activities in the hands of the different ships. Selma NeSmith was elected as first mate to represent our class and Floyd Dillon was sent as an engineer,

Our ship began at this time putting on boxing matches in the gym in an effort to defray the expenses of the prom which was held on May 19 at the Country Club. As the fleet put down anchors at the Country Club the members were conveyed to a Japanese garden where they were entertained and feasted by Japanese maidens. The entertainment was immensely enjoyed by the departing fleet and our efforts were not in vain.

April the first found the Senior fleet of '33 ready to play their pranks on our crew, but the members of our ship did as they were told and kept the audience in laughter by imitating various radio stars. We fooled the upper ship and ruined the most important part of the program by stealing the conch



which prevented the captain, Kathryn Lightbourn, from saying the long speech which she had kept the midnight oil burning to prepare.

In the fleet's annual basketball tournament of this year we again came in second, losing to the seniors who delighted in burying us with the greatest of sorrow. This did not affect us as we came back the next week and defeated the champion crew by a wide majority. When the fleet sent out an S. O. S. call for basketball players we sent Robert Bethel and William Cates to its aid. We also put forth this year one of the best diamond ball teams throughout the fleet.

Our ship also sailed away with many of the prizes offered by the P.-T. A. of our fleet. The winning of these prizes is due to the sincere efforts of Mrs. Cleveland Dillon, homeroom mother of our ship. We owe her our appreciation and gratitude for her faithful work.

After spending another three months shore leave the crew came back in the autumn of '34 to enter on the homeward lap of our four year journey with the Key West High Fleet. At last we had reached our goal and were now the highest ranking ship of the fleet, Seniors! We hoped to pilot our boat successfully on its homeward journey so that in June of 1934, the fleet would be proud of our ship. Our ship was again piloted by the same officers who piloted her in 1933. We wished to congratulate our officers who have worked cheerfully and hard in an effort to make our journey fruitful.

Soon after getting down to smooth sailing, plans were made for the annual basketball tournament. We at once made up our minds that our ship would win the championship this year. After three weeks of hard playing our boys defeated every other team and won the championship. The team was presented a silver trophy by Coach Huddleston. Our girls' team also won the girl's championship of the fleet which added more glory to our ship's flag.

When the call came for ball players for the fleet's basketball team we readily answered, "Aye, Aye", and sent four players, William Cates, Joe Navarro, Gilmore Parks, and Galen Lund, who proved to be very valuable to the team. The fleet will miss these four when the call is again made in 1935.

The next big event recorded on our ship's log was Conch Day. The calendar had played us a mean trick by having April first on Sunday, but we fooled the Junior ship by sailing in a week in advance, on March 23. The rival ship's crew made two attempts to steal the highly prized conch shell but they could not get the best of us as we were prepared for them. To the strains of a gay song we marched down the aisle attired in conch hats and old clothes. We called the amazed pupils up to the stage and forced them to imitate various movie stars which only portrayed their lack of ability. Our captain then called the captain of the Junior ship and with great eloquence presented the historic shell. The Seniors marched off the stage and left the downhearted pupils to think of a plan for next year when they might enjoy the pleasures of an all day picnic.

In the next few months our ship's decks were turned into a stage where plans were made for the annual play. On May 11, we presented "Skidding", a three act comedy of modern life, which was greatly enjoyed by the large audience in attendance.

On May 18, the Junior ship presented the annual Jr.-Sr. Prom which was given in honor of our departure from the fleet. The Juniors are to be congratulated on their splendid entertainment which was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone.

We are now sailing into our homeport where graduation awaits us. Within the next few days our journey will come to an end. As it comes to its happy ending we hope that the ships of the Key West High Fleet will sail on to greater accomplishments in the years to come. We also wish to thank every one who has had a part in making our voyage a success. Especially do we owe Miss Trevor our thanks, appreciation, and best wishes. As we spend the few short hours left telling friends and teachers goodbye we are also making plans for the future when we must sail forth on larger ships to do greater tasks. I only hope that in their future voyages of life every member of the Class of '34 shall pilot his ship on to greater and nobler success.


At the time of the organization there were thirteen members. Since then five new members have been admitted.
