## History of Class of '35

The first nine months of our duty was accomplished, and we were given our vacation for the next three months.

The call to duty was heard, after threc months of pleasure. We assembled once more to take up our responsibilities, which were becoming more difficult. The crew elected Laudelina Contreras as captain, Beulah Lee Williams as first mate, Margaret Falcon as secretary, and Edna Roberts as purser.

Our ship had to entertain the Senior crew at a farewell party, so we started to work as soon as possible.

The crew held several boxing matches in the gymnasium, which were well attended. They were a success through the efforts of the prominent fighters of our city and our crew. Again our ship came out victorious in the races held by the P. T. A. We were also represented in basketball by our boys and girls.

April found the Senior crew ready to play pranks on us. As April 1 came on a Sunday the Seniors held their entertainment and picnic on March 23. Our sailors were ordered to imitate many of the leading movie stars, which we successfully carried out. Some of our sailors tried to steal the "Conch" from the Seniors, but the Seniors proved too witty for us.

In the next few months we were busy making plans for the JuniorSenior prom. May 18 came and our ship entered the port Country Club, where an old pantation was beautifully decorated. The typical foods of
a plantation were served to our guests, who expressed themselves as having a most enjoyable evening.

Our nine months of duty came to a close, and our sailors were given shore leave, happy to be free from cares and responsibilities.

The next year we came back to our ship "dignified Seniors." Our duties now became greater, but we were encouraged by our managers, Mrs. Ramsey and Professor O'Bryant. Our sailors now elected Curt's Stanton as captain, Charles Smith as first assistant, and Hilda Demeritt and Edna Roberts were elected to take care of the financial and business end of the affairs of the ship.

Our class was new united with the mid-term graduates, many of whom remained in school the second semester.

As the Senicr Class always publishes an Annual, the staff was elected and the work capably completed.

In January our graduation rings were ordered. No doubt these are the best looking ones any class has had.

The boys of our ciass cemposed most of those on the varsity basketball team. Although they didn't win the championsh:p, they were an outstanding team.

The girls also exhibited their skill in basketball by having a strong team.

In the A. A. our class was honored by having Edward Woodson as president.

In March the class decided to select the Senior play. "Huckleberry Finn" was voted the best play and the cast was selected. Practice was immediately begun. On May 3 the play was presented to a very large audience, who greatly enjoyed it.

On March 29 our class held "Conch Day," a privilege given only to Seniors. We fooled the Juniors by not having a program. Although they did try to play a joke on us by kidnaping our president. The crew went to Boca Chica for an all-day picnic, which was greatly enjoyed, although many were sunburned.

On May 10 the Junior Class entertained our class with a large party at the Country Club.

Thus our duty on our little ship has corne to a close. Many of us are to take up heavier and harder duties that the future holds for us. Our ship has made a successful voyage, and we especially owe its success to Mrs. Ramsey and also Miss Gardner. Everyone has tried his best to make some other sailor's task easier, and we only hope that the future holds bright prospects for us.
