Our minds we've shaped for that which is to come, Who knows? Some of us may be Presidents, Others merely beggars.


This step that now before us lies, Will lead us to the stark realities of life. In days not too far distant, We will be sole masters of our destinies.

The first nine months of our duty was accomplished, and we were given our vacation for the next three months.



In the A. A. our class was honored by having Edward Woodson as president.



Class History






Class History




Class History


The history of the Dramatic Club is brief, but very interesting. Since its organization the club, with the help of our sponsor, Miss Peeples, has been able to present many successful performances.


The orchestra this year was fortunate enough to have a director like Miss Smith, who loves the work and has added much to the school life by rendering many musical programs.


