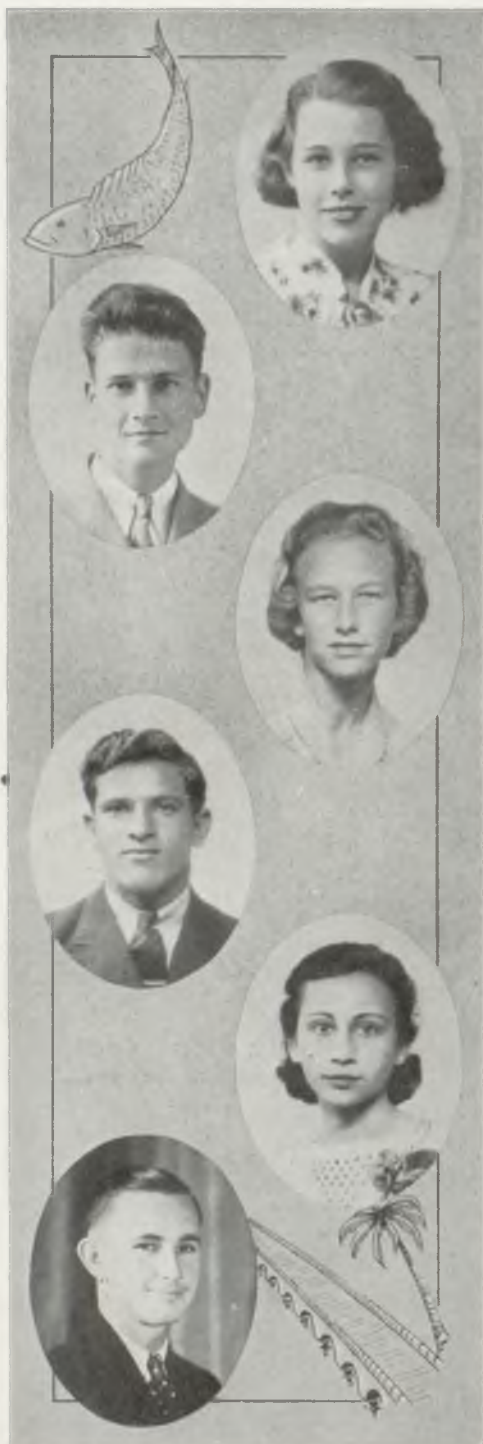

Senior Class History

My Romany children, how well I recall September 10, 1934, when you came to the Freshman Camp. There were seventy, which was a much larger number than you now have. This was a new life to you and you had to adjust yourselves to the customs, language, and habits of the gypsy tribe.

It has always been an old gypsy custom in every camp that the new clansmen must light the camp fire and keep it burning during their stay here. It was hard for you to understand that the fire had to be kindled with sparks of enthusiasm and kept burning by the light of knowledge. Your first duty was to search for fuel. In your ramblings you found some good logs of hard work.

Each day a broth had to be brewed in the gypsy pot. How curious you were over this at first. When you learned that the mixture was knowledge gleaned only by search and study, your amazement began to subside.

The ingredients which you prepared each day for your mental food were fresh dates from the tree of history, leaves of civics, rules of grammar, and problems of algebra. Before long you had learned to chew, digest and assimilate this food.

Your madre, or Alma Mater, had an interest in you far beyond your mental development. In order to give you the best training a group of gypsy leaders were selected to develop your various talents. They were called the faculty.

Your teachers realized that some of you were outstanding in music and placed you under the leadership of Miss Smith, who devoted her time to training your voices and teaching you to play various instruments. My mind reverts to those days when you first became interested in music.

The spring of the year found you ready to break camp and go into another section of the school land.

You successfully passed through the period of adjustment in the Freshman Land and you entered the Sophomore Camp with unlimited power and confidence which caused you to claim your places at once in the camp ground.

You realized quite early that your interest must be protected so you elected George Del Pino as president of your class with Mary Fay McClanahan, Xenia Hoff, Dorothy Bean, and Vance Stirrup as co-workers.

I recall at this time a duet sung by Marjorie Frow and Madge Sands, "Awie, Awie, Awie," from the operetta "Patricia."

This year was so filled with activities, mental, physical and social, that before you realized it the time had come to move on. In accordance with the gypsy custom you soon had to break camp and go into another section.

In September 1936 you had entered the Junior section of the school land. By this time you were beginning to reap the fruits of your previous year's labor. A greater and more genial comradeship had developed among you and you were at peace with the tribe.



You devoted most of your time to study, but you did not neglect your physical development. Great rivalry between class basketball teams had arisen and you were in good condition to accept the challenge to play in the interclass games. Among you were players who were to make the varsity. These were J. V. Woodson, Jack Lopez, Joseph Domenech. The Junior-Senior Prom was the anticipated social function of the year. As true gypsies you were bedecked in the finest of silks, ornaments of gold and silver and ropes of pearls. The beauty of the Junior maids was discussed long afterwards in the camp.

I will repeat for you on this occasion the dance I gave that night.

As you began your Senior year you assumed an air of seriousness not heretofore noted. You realized that your madre, or Alma Mater, could not follow you on the open road and that you must go alone. Preparations began early in September for a new experience called graduation. The Senior clan had to have leaders so after grave consideration you chose George Del Pino for president. Other officers were Andrew Elwood, vice-president; Orvis Kemp, secretary, and Dorothy Mae Dungan treasurer. Then there arose the selection of a motto suitable for this illustrious class. Very wisely you chose "I am master of my fate; I am captain of my soul." You chose the red carnation as the class flower and crimson and gray as class colors.

Eventually came the annual Conch Day Picnic which was considered one of the best carried out of Conch Day Picnics. The Junior-Senior Prom was enjoyed by everyone. Tomorrow you will be guests of the Rotary Club at a luncheon. Then will come your graduation exercises and Senior dance.

All these details have been wisely settled and as you are gathered here tonight you are realizing the fulfillment of the above mentioned plans. I command you each and everyone for the part each has taken in making life in the gypsy school land so constructive, so profitable and so happy. You do honor tonight to your parents, your Alma Mater, your class leaders, the faculty, and most of all, to yourselves.

May the gleaming light from this campfire guide you as you enter the open road.

To Mrs. Ramsey, our linguistic Latin teacher, we give the magnificent collection of translations we have so laboriously written into all the school Latin books. Her future classes will seem smarter with less effort than we expected, and we do doubt their ability to expend more effort.

To Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. Salis, teachers of history, we bequeath the Civil War, Alexander the Great, and the Tower of Babylon. History may repeat itself, but in matters of discipline, they did not repeat themselves. We always heard them the first time.

To Mrs. Eagan, instructor of English, we endow our liberal supply of slang. With it we offer the free advice that such picturesque slang is only appropriate when accompanied by a whole stick of chewing gum. May she master both arts during the coming years.

To Mrs. Russell, teacher of commercial subjects, we leave our typewriter erasers and hope that the next class will be able to use them more successfully than we were.

Sophomore A Class History

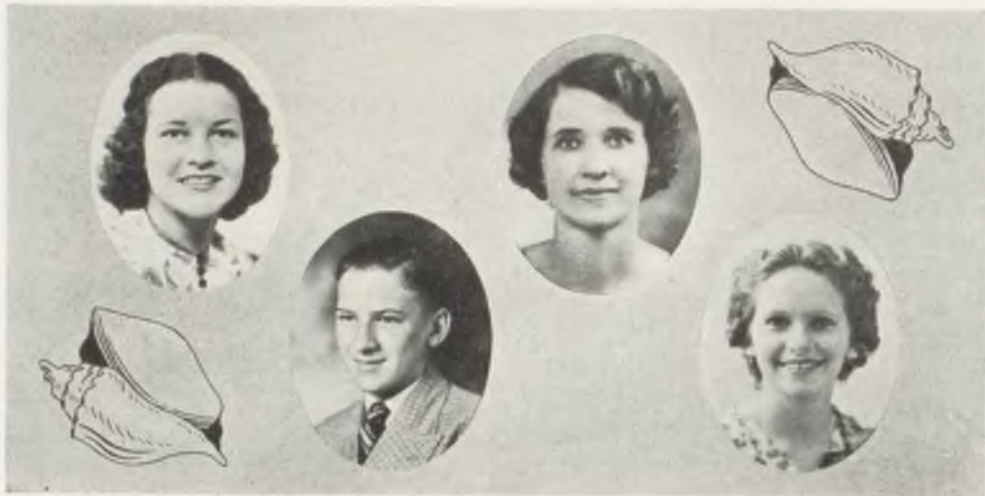
Our first three years in High School passed very smoothly.

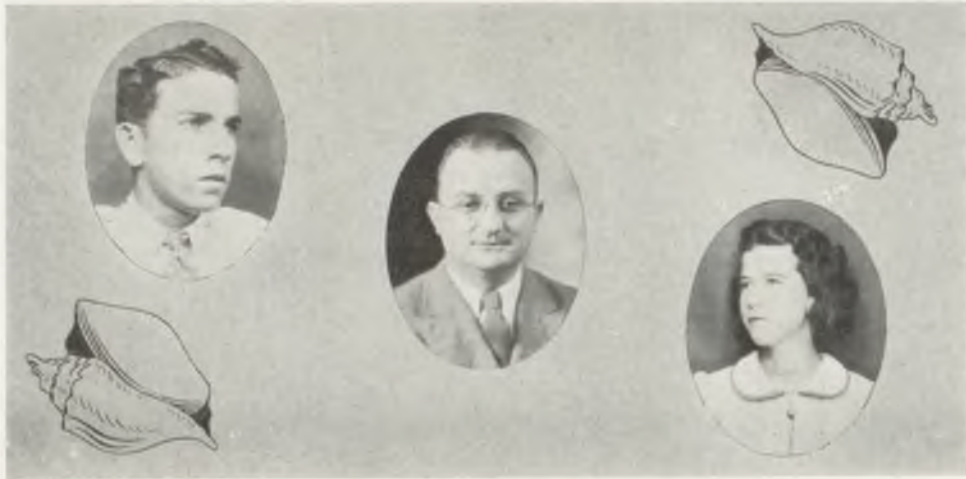


Sophomore B-1 Class History

The librarian and the staff try to make the library attractive for every pupil. They feel that the library is one of the main centers for school activities, and they cooperate in every way they are able.



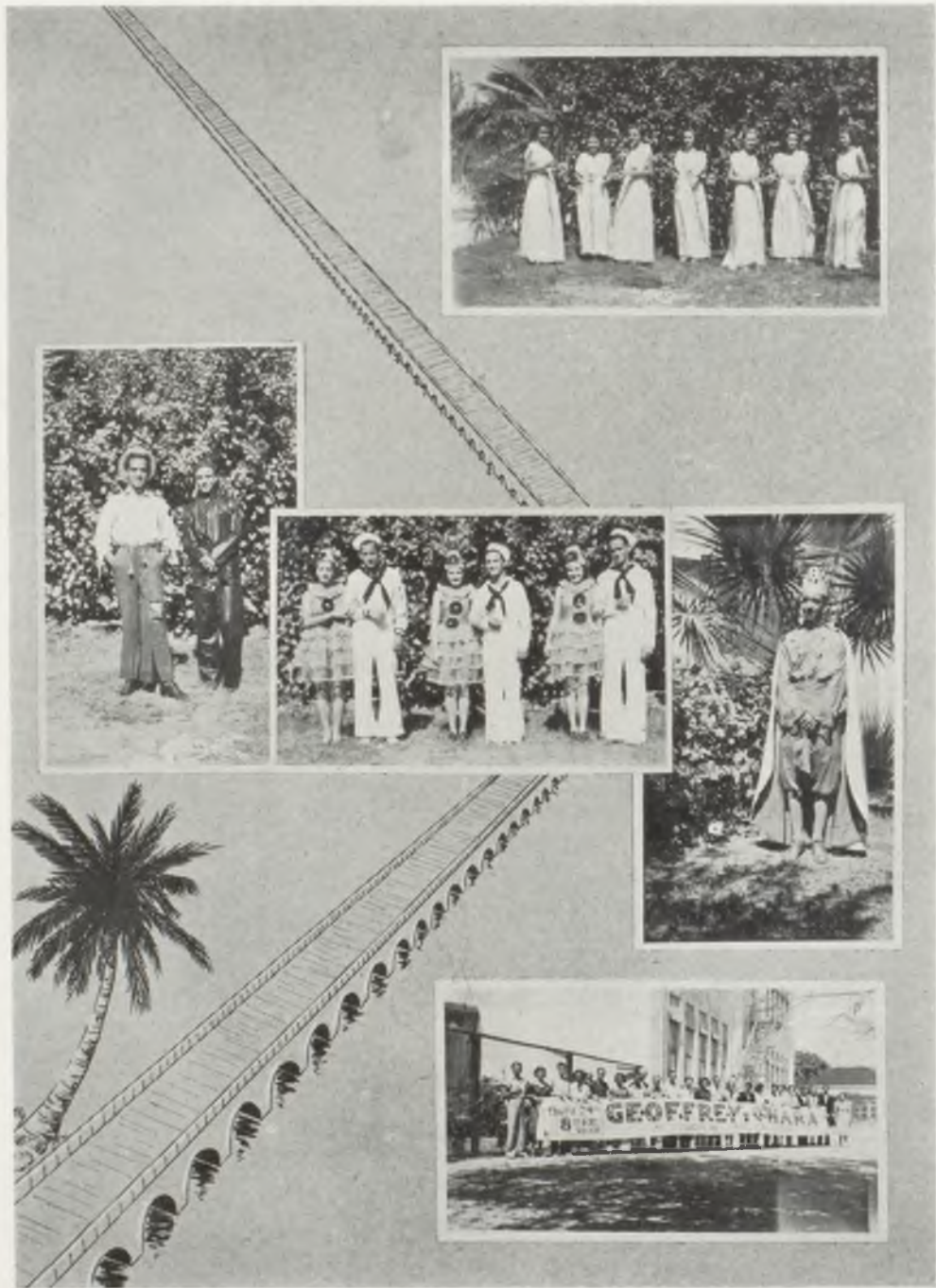
