History '46

On September 17th, 1942, we, a group of eager and anxious "bobby-soxers" assembled at the depot awaiting the arrival of the "Camp Frosh Special." Our induction papers showed that we had all passed the rigid mental and physical examination and were qualified to serve as soldiers of Key West's Army of Future Citizens.

At Camp Frosh we were placed under the command of "Top Kicks" Wellons and Owens. Here we jumped into the swing of basic training in the use of the weapons of English, Social Science and Algebra. We hit the obstacle courses with alacrity but a few of our buddies lagged behind and were transferred to limited service.

To assist our able "Top Kicks" the following wore the temporary chevrons of President, Marion Solano; Vice-President, Joan Doughtry; Secretary and Treasurer, Joe Alonso. Detailed to Jr. High Student Council were Fred Miller as Safety Director and Marion Solano, Secretary.

Basic training completed, we were now regaining some of our old self confidence and agreed one and all that there should be some changes made in this man's army. After many weeks of work and preparation we presented the first Freshman Prom. So successful was this, that it has become a school tradition. (We were greatly rewarded for our earnest efforts.)

On June 1st we were given ninety day furloughs with orders to report to Camp Soph for further training, reporting in September. Capt. H. O'Bryant gave us an orientation lecture on the intensified training prepared for us and then we were ordered to Milner and Gardner. Anita Aguilar was ordered to take over the secretarial correspondence of Sr. High Student Council and Joyce Mulberg was placed in command of the Recreational Department. Here something new was added to Camp life—the Annex.

At the end of the year we were ready for the next stop in our training program. We were ordered to Camp Juniors with Top Sergeants Stark and Brown in command. Joe Alonso, President; Kenneth Kerr, Vice-President; Herman Cerezo, Secretary; and Marion Solano, Treasurer; assisted the Top Sergeants (during this period of our training), Joyce Mulberg took over the duties of Student Council Treasurer and Doris Thompson those of Corresponding Secretary.

Betty Boza edited the camp paper the Snapper that year with the help of her staff composed of Assistant Editor, Doreen Cruz: Features, Amparo Ovide; Assistant Features, Barbara Warren: News Editor, Dorothy Hobbs; Sports Editor, Fred Miller.

It is an old army custom for the yardbirds to stage a formal dance each year in honor of those who are completing their training.

Many dog faces were detailed as K. P.'s and with the able assistance of the sergeants, we presented the Jr.-Sr. Prom on May 4th, 1945.

On September 17th we were ordered to Camp Seniority to complete our training. In Command was Sgt. Thompson, to see us through the last lap. Several of our unit were immediately assigned special duty on the Annual Staff. These were Editor-in-Chief, Fred Miller; Sales Manager, Doreen Cruz; Secretary, Cathy Jeffers; Treasurer, Caroline Morgan; Feature Editor, Billy Ladd. The Top Sergeant's new assistants were President, John Monsalvatge; Vice-President, Joyce Mulberg; Secretary, Dorothy Hobbs; Treasurer, Caroline Morgan. Betty Boza retained the command of the Snapper; Doreen Cruz, Assistant Editor; Caroline Morgan became News Editor; Pat Goehring, Assistant News Editor and Features; Amparo Ovide and Gloria Acevedo and Fred Miller covering Sports.

The outstanding social events of the year were the Halloween Carnival and the Students Jamboree, both proving successful, financially as well as socially.

During the last days of our training we broke all army rules of discipline. February found us anxiously awaiting our class rings and pins. March was a month of great worry with everyone turning slightly gray at the temples over placement tests. Conch Day passed swiftly, leaving the Juniors greatly humbled and the Seniors untouchable with severe sunburn. The Senior Play and Junior-Senior Prom followed in quick succession with the Rotary Luncheon and Class Night at their heels.

We have now completed our training which has not only given us both mental and physical skills but also many moments of fun and laughter. Now the time has come to receive the certificates which promote us to the rank of PFC—Private Citizen First Class—Graduates.







The Student Council is divided into three different divisions, they are the Executive, Judicial, and Advisory. In the Executive the President is responsible for all of the Student Council, he also leads all Student Council The Vice President assists the meetings. President and acts as chairman in the President's absence. The Safety Director has charge of all the traffic in the halls, and he has charge of all fire drills. The Secretary keeps the minutes of all the meetings and does any other secretarial work that has to be done. The Treasurer of course takes care of the Student Council's money. He collects the money in Court and pays for the many bills.

The Judicial Department is made up of the Higher and the Lower Courts. The Higher Court is for any serious offenses. The Lower Court, which is in session every week, is for trying violaters of the traffic laws. The Lower Court follows as much as possible the procedure in any court. There is a Judge and a Clerk and the students may bring witnesses if they wish. The Advisory Department is composed of our advisors, Mrs. Wellons and Mr. O'Bryant, who guide and advise the Student Council when there is a need.

Elections are held every eighteen weeks so it is difficult for the Student Council to have experienced officers and representatives. Before the elections each year the Student Council holds a rally at which time the candidates make speeches outlining their platforms. The voting is done by the Australian ballot.

The newly-elected officers are administered the oath of office at the first Jr. High Assembly of the new semester.

Each homeroom has a duly elected representative as member of the Student Council. The Student Council is further ably assisted in its task by a corps of monitors who help enforce the traffic rules, and maintain order in the halls at all times. The Safety Director has the responsibility of appointing monitors and supervising their work.

During the past year the Student Council conducted a Victory Bond Drive in which they sold over \$800 worth of Bonds and Stamps. A Red Cross Drive and a March of Dimes Drive were also held. Four fire drills were held during the first semester. The Student Council also directed work of sending gifts to service men in local military hospitals at Christmas time.

The Student Council supervises all student school activities and runs the Annex; provides chapel programs, monitor system, fire drills, student governed study halls, conducts flag salutes, and sells defense stamps. In 1945 student governed study halls were begun in Key West High. One student acting as a monitor is appointed to each study hall. To encourage student extra-curricular activity the council awards school letters. A pupil is al-


lowed a specified number of points for each of the many activities he may participate in or offices he holds. The chairman of the point system keeps a record of each student's activity points.

BOYS' BASKETBALL

This year the Varsity Basketball team, under the direction of Coach Fred L. Hoffmeister, has had an unspectacular, regular season. But in the District Tournament the team began to click.

We were made a "C" Class team this year because of the small number of boys in the upper grades. We played 2 games against "C" teams, 3 games against "B" teams, and 2 games against an "A" team, Miami Beach.

We lost to Homestead. Vero Beach. Fort Lauderdale. Fort Pierce, and Miami Beach on road trips. Our only home game was against Miami Beach. We came within 8 points of winning that game, which was very close to come to Miami Beach this year.

Our lone victory of the regular season was against Redland. We beat the "Diamondbacks," 33 to 32.

In the 8th District Tournament we won the title of runner-up and also the right to go to the State Tournament at Mt. Dora. In our first game at the Tournament, which was held at Redland, we defeated Technical High of Miami, 39 to 33. In the semi-final game we defeated Homestead, 36 to 33. In the Championship game we were defeated by Pompano, 40 to 37.

This is the first time since about 1939 that Key West has beaten Homestead, and the first time in many years that the Conchs have qualified for a state tournament.
