Practical English is given in the fourth year of general curriculum students, Business English to commercial students, and College Preparatory English to those planning to enter college.

The aim of the Spanish Department is primarily to develop a speaking knowledge of the language. In addition, an attempt is made to acquaint students with the background, customs, and history of the Latin-American countries. Two years of Spanish are offered, including grammatical principles, as well as some Spanish drama, literature, and poetry.

Latin is offered principally for the college preparatory students. It is given for the purpose of developing a basic knowledge and understanding of the English language. Two years of this course is also offered.





The Key Club, sponsored by the Kiwanis, was founded in 1950. It requires of its limited membership a "C" average, good character, and leadership ability.




