Practical English is given in the fourth year of general curriculum sfudents, Business English to commercial students, and College Preparatory English to those planning to enter college.
The aim of the Spanish Department is primarily to develop a speaking knowledge of the language. In addition, an aftempt is made to acquaint students with the background, customs, and history of the Latin-American countries. Two years of Spanish are offered, including grammatical principles, as well as some Spanish drama, literature, and poetry. Latin is offered principally for the college preparatory students. It is given for the purpose of developing a basic knowledge and understanding of the English language. Two years of this course is also offered.
