The Social Studies Department courses include: civics, world history, American history and American government. These courses helped the students understand current events and prepare them to meet problems in adult living.

Civics is required of all pupils and is taken in the ninth grade.

In the tenth grade world history is required of pupils in the General Course.

Through this study pupils acquire a knowledge of the past as a means of understanding the present.

The changing civilization in which we live is difficult for us to understand, yet a study of our history, including the great changes that have already taken place, will make our social world more intelligible and help us to understand our present civilization. In order to learn these things American history is required of all pupils.

American government is required of all pupils, and is generally taken in the senior year. This subject emphasizes the dynamic nature of our government—its living, functional character as well as its structural development and growth. This study also provides a clear picture of what government is, how it works, and what it really means to us.


Mathematics

The mathematics curriculum provides for a step-by-step presentation of both general and special phases of mathematics that will contribute to the present and future educational needs of the individual pupils.







Home Economics

Home Economics is a planned program of activities which enables girls to assume some of the responsibilities of homemaking. Every girl must have one credit in Home Economics for graduation. A second credit is required of every girl in the general course.




Commercial

The commercial department of the Key West High School is geared to meet the needs of the community. Most of our commercial curriculum graduates remain in town; therefore, we concentrate on preparing them for work in local offices.

Every commercial major must take bookkeeping, two years of typing, two years of shorthand, business English, and business mathematics. In order to obtain a credit in typing, a student must reach the speed of 50 w.p.m. in the second year, and a speed of 100 w.p.m. in the second year of shorthand in order to receive the shorthand credit.

On Class Night the following awards are made to the outstanding commercial people: A bookkeeping certificate offered by the Southwestern Publishing Company; a pen from the Business & Professional Women's Club of Key West, a Smith-Corona portable typewriter from the Monroe Office Supply Company, and a Royal portable typewriter from the Roberts Office Machines Company.



DCI

Diversified Cooperative Training—usually called DCT—is a program of training offered in the junior and senior years of high school that has been designed to prepare students of employable age for job efficiency in a variety of occupations through utilizing the business and industrial establishments of the community as training agencies.

During the course of the year, employers provided jobs on which student-learners received planned and supervised training over a sufficient period of time to fix the requisite skills, and they cooperated with the school in setting up schedules of related study necessary to bring about the combination of skills and knowledge that makes the difference between a competent employee and the average worker.





Art and crafts is an elective subject open to all students. A main requirement for this course is a sincere interest in art, rather than previous experience.






