
MATH DEPARTMENT STUDIES ALL ANGLES

K. W. High School's Mathematics Department is attempting to reorganize its curriculum with special emphasis on its academic program. Recent changes in the world have indicated a need for both, a different arrangement of subject matter and more work in previously neglected areas.


Algebras I and II classes will, whenever possible, at least introduce the set theory of modern algebra and will place even greater emphasis on functional relations, variables, constants, etc., algebraically and graphically.

The geometrics are being integrated into a one year course with an introduction to coordinate geometry. The latter functions particularly well in the area of locus.

Trigonometry still remains a 12th year subject but with correspondingly changed emphasis; more rectors and less right triangle solutions.


D. C. T. DEVELOPS SKILLS ON THE JOB



COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT OFFERS BUSINESS SKILLS



Our department has a double purpose in the school; to give the necessary vocational training which will provide efficient and competent office help, and to provide incentive for those who desire advanced study in business or in business education.





In two large studios the Art Department offers courses in art and in crafts to students on all grade levels. Instruction in the history of design as well as the skills of painting, sculpture, lettering, gem stone cutting, silver and copper jewelry, pottery, plastic fabrication, textile design, and leathercrafts.

A wide variety of power tools aid the student toward rapid completion of his projects, while numerous specialized handtools make possible many different projects with the various materials available.

This course also covers everything necessary to be a good sportsmanlike driver. Many films, charts, and statistics are presented to the student for a more rounded view of driving.






Girls and Boys Physical Education Department at Key West High School is functioning very well at the present time in meeting the needs of the pupils.

LIBRARY PROVIDES STUDY MATERIALS

Providing materials that meet personal and social needs of students, is the main aim of the library. The library also acquaints the students with the aids of the materials provided to assist the faculty in their instructions, offers a pleasant atmosphere for reading and to build good community relationships.

This year the library is adding to its science collection. In the past year additions were made in the areas of professional books for faculty members, career materials for social sciences, and reference materials in all of the various fields.

Library instruction is given to all grade students and other groups which request it. In 1958-59, the library had an average daily circulation of 107 books and an average daily attendance of 440.

Books displays on the bulletin are sponsored by the library board with suggestions coming from faculty members and students.

Industrial arts is open to all boys as an elective course. Students gain experience in operating a variety of hand and power tools, many of which are frequently used in home work shops.

Physical facilities of the lab are excellent. The spaciousness of the lab is second to none. There are more than adequate permanent work stations and the floor space per student is superior. Guards and safety devices are used extensively on all machines whenever possible.

Our instructional material is limited at present but students are building a library with donated materials. Models, teachingaids and other visual aids are being made by students.




LANGUAGE ARTS STATES OBJECTIVES



The Spanish language is one of the heritages of Key West. Geographically, we are favored by being in close proximity to Cuba and other Spanish-speaking countries of the Caribbean.

Key West is truly a bilingual community. About one fourth of the pupils enrolled in our schools speak both Spanish and English. In a community such as this one the opportunities offered a student in Spanish are much greater than are those offered elsewhere.

Key West High makes an effort to bring out the opportunities to be derived from the study of languages by offering two years of Spanish or Latin to all students.

The Foreign Language Department has broadened its scope in the use of tape recordings as an aid to learning. The modern techniques have been used for a number of years but in a limited way. This year we have one well equipped language lab classroom for the Spanish 11 classes. Plans are underway to equip the Spanish I classes as a language lab also.




J.V. CHEERLEADERS INSPIRED TEAM



SENIOR PLAY IS SUCCESS



BAND ENTERTAINED


One of the main assets of Key West High School is their band. Under the leadership of Mr. William Higgins, they presented a thoroughly successful marching and concert season.


Their performances during the football season consisted of pre-game and half-time shows. The band and the Conchettes combined at the half-time to present the spectators with entertaining diversion.


The best demonstration was chosen from each grade level and on Monday night, March 7, the English Fair was presented to the public.


NJHS STATES HIGH STANDARDS







Anyone wishing to join must first have a knowledge of music fundamentals and at least a "C" average.


At the end of each year a key is given to all members who attend 90% of all outside appearances and a Maitland Adams award is given for the most outstanding senior.



Each year the editor is appointed by the sponsor, and the staff is chosen by the editor.



The theme of a yearbook is of the upmost importance and the 1960 Conch's theme is "The sea around us" which is symbolic of the island community in which KWHS is located.




J.V. football, under the leadership of coach Harry Butcher and coach Armando Hendriquez, showed great promise in the past season by winning two games, and losing two games.


