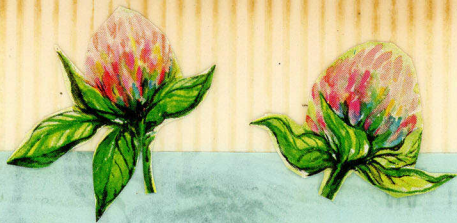
NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK 1982

The two piñatas for the older children, as well as the treats for these and the "tiny tot" piñata, have been donated by the OAKLAND PARK TEEN CLUB. The Teens also provided the prizes for the winners in the piñata games for older children and assisted the library staff with the supervision of these games. The Teen Club operates under the direction of Recreation Leaders BRIAN JAMES and DIANA EUSTICE.

SPECIAL EVENTS FOR APRIL 17

10 a.m. PIÑATAS (limited to youngsters six years and older)

Piñatas are often featured at parties and special celebrations in Spanish-speaking countries, where adults as well as children partake in the fun. The piñata is a hollow object made of clay or papier-mâché which is decorated, filled with treats and then hung from a tree. One by one, players are blindfolded, given a stick and then try to hit and break open the piñata to release all the goodies. To increase the challenge, the piñata is raised and lowered as the players try to hit it. When the piñata is finally broken, all the participants scramble for the treats. The player breaking the piñata is given a prize.

11 a.m. BOOK BALANCING CONTEST (open to children of all ages)

The object of this game is to walk a designated distance in the least amount of time, while balancing a book on the top of one's head. Participants may not use their hands or arms to keep the book from falling off. A prize will be awarded to the winner.

12 noon BOOK STACKING CONTEST (open to children of all ages)

This original game has been a favorite through the years. Players attempt to build the highest possible stack of books in the short time allotted. The difficulty is created by the poor condition of the books provided for this purpose, and by the fact that these books must be carried some distance to the "building site". A prize will be awarded to the winner.

1 p.m. PARTY FOR PRE-SCHOOLERS (open to two- to five-year-olds; two-year-olds must be accompanied by a parent)

This event will feature a very special storyhour and a piñata designed for use with very young children. Instead of hitting the piñata with a stick, the children will pull on ribbons dangling from it, causing the bottom to break open and the goodies to fall out.

2 p.m. MINI MAGICIANS (open to all ages)

The Mini Magicians are members of the International Brotherhood of Magicians, and have performed professionally from coast to coast. They offer a unique, modern magic act featuring dance, doves and a variety of larger illusions.

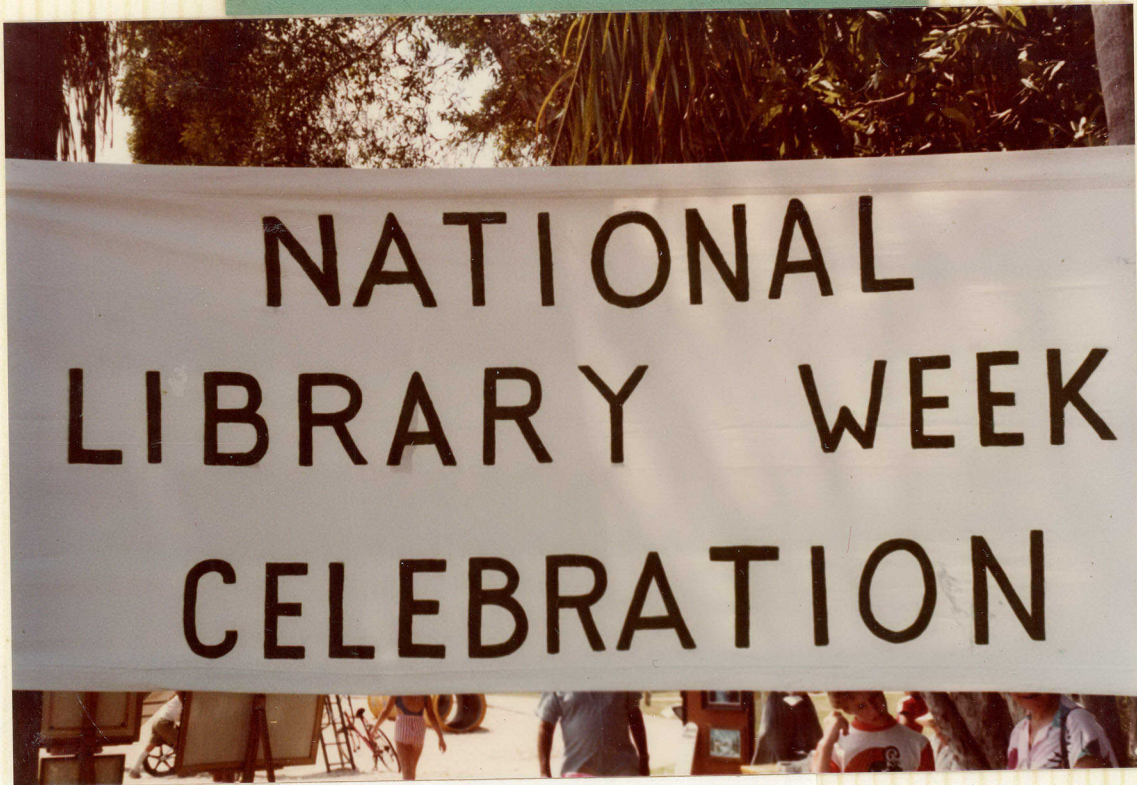
3 p.m. AWARDS CEREMONY

At this time, awards will be presented for the winning entries in the sidewalk art show, and the drawing among the artists for the gift certificate from Frame Factory will take place. In addition, awards will be presented to the winners of each of the contests and games scheduled throughout the day. Last, but not least, the winner of the "Baby Librarian Contest" will be announced and will be awarded a prize.

OUR M A P DEPICTING THE LOCATION OF ARTISTS, PROGRAMS AND FESTIVITIES THROUGH THE DAY.

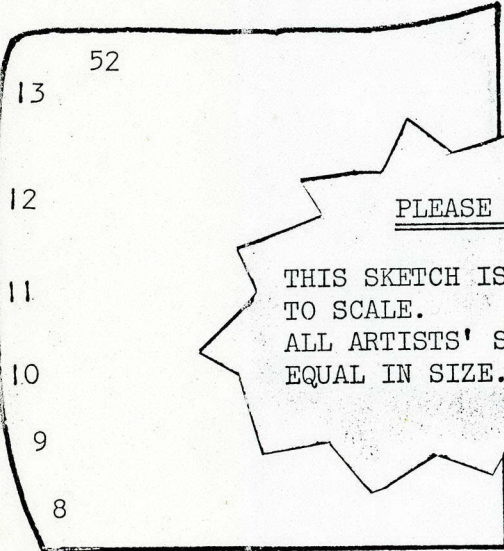
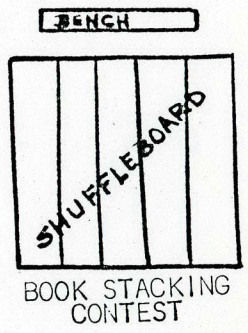
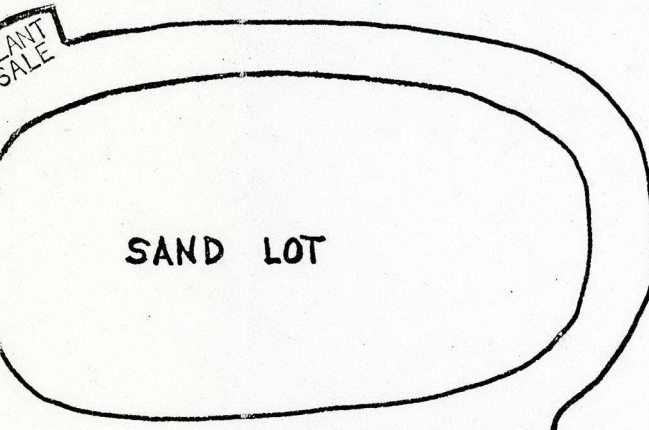
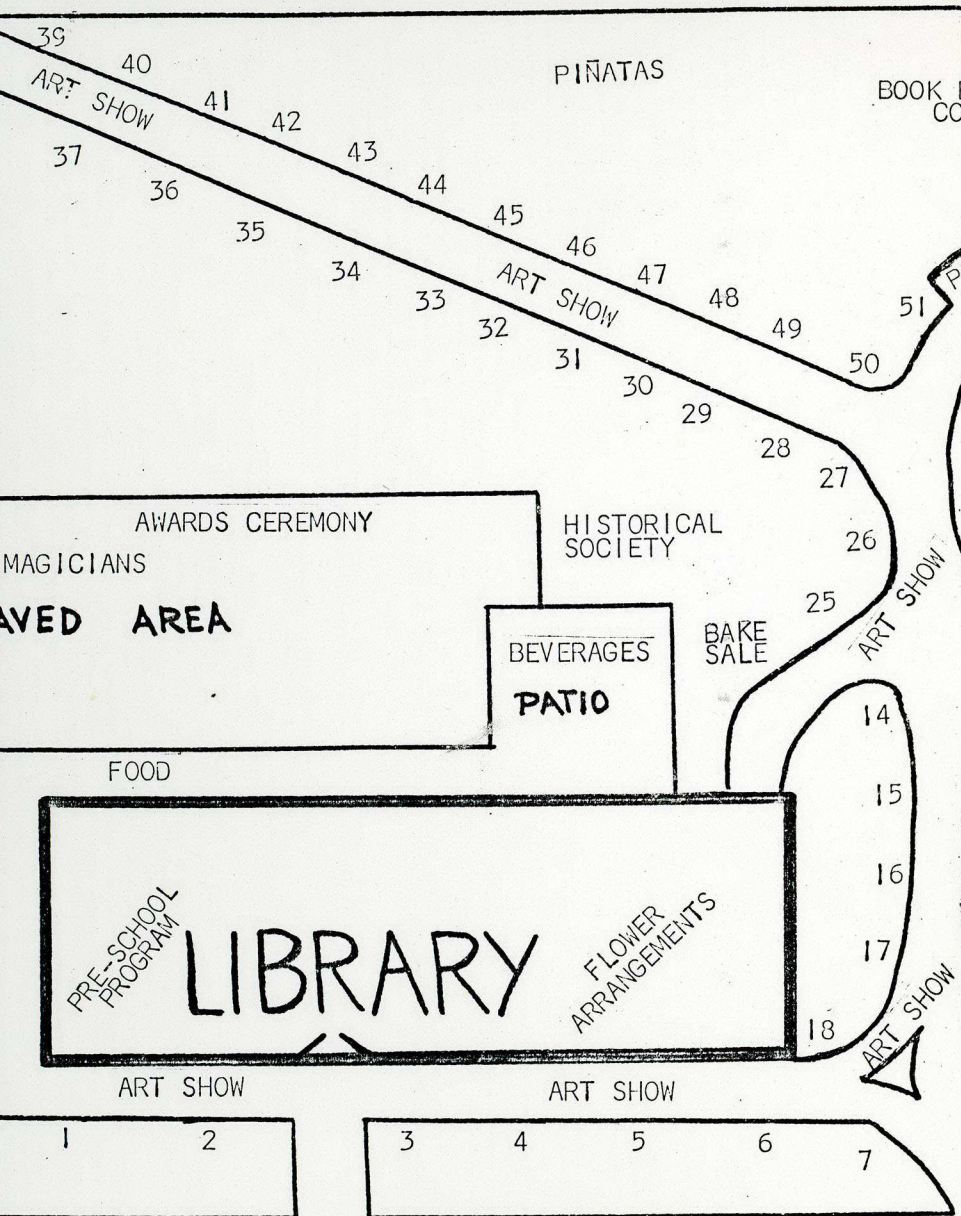
