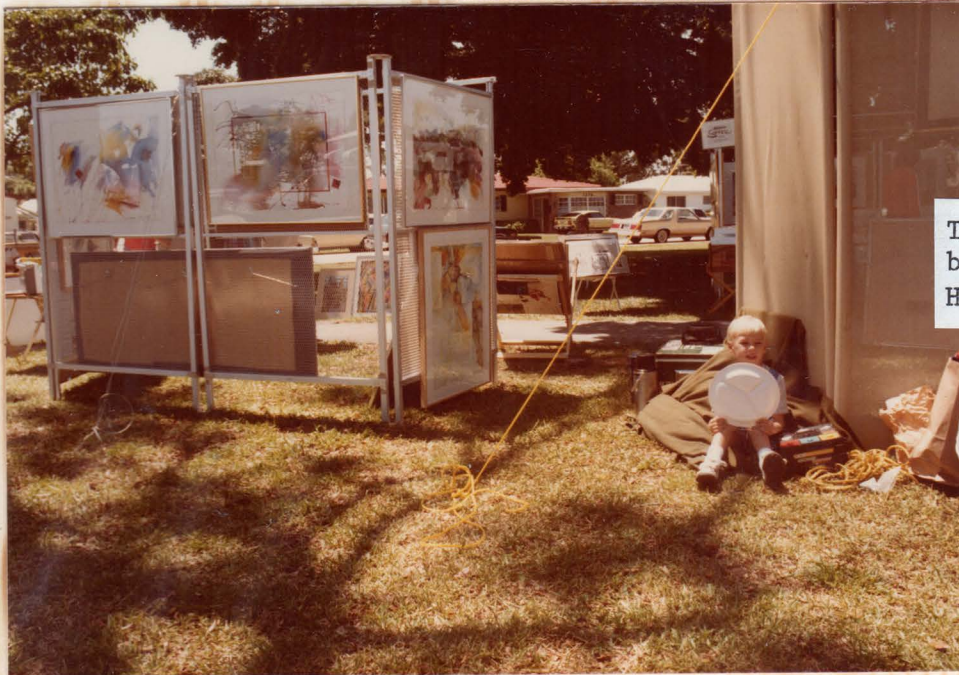

# Voter's Registration

## Voting for books hit with children

OAKLAND PARK — Despite having no funds and little traditional political support, Winnie the Pooh captured Saturday's bearily contested election.

The balloting by children at the library's eighth annual Sidewalk Art Show wasn't exactly Super Tuesday, but the electoral process was a make-believe version of the real thing.

The cuddly bear who has been a childhood favorite for six decades had no trouble capturing the voters' hearts. Walter Mondale, Gary Hart, and Jesse Jackson didn't stand a chance when children picked their favorite storybook characters.

"Winnie the Pooh won hands down [in early returns] and *Bambi* was the most favorite book," said Mike Grossman, Broward County's deputy supervisor of elections.

Grossman supervised the day-long balloting — done by youngsters with actual voting machines — outside the library.

The election was arranged by the library's staff in conjunction with Supervisor of Elections Jane Carroll to encourage young people to vote by teaching them about the process.

And the best way to do that, of course, is to show them how it's done.

"I like Winnie the Pooh," said Shane Wessell, 12, a student at Rickards Middle School. "I think he has more interesting stories."

Since no office was actually at stake Saturday, political observers were calling the race a "popularity contest."

About 50 youngsters voted, and early returns had Winnie leading all his opponents with 15 votes. Brown captured five votes. Quimby and Bear received one vote each.

In the favorite book category, *Bambi* was leading *Cat in the Hat*, 10 to 6.

In the vote for "Favorite Activity," youngsters had the option of selecting either "parents, own, story hour" or "visiting public library."

Early returns showed "visiting public library" slightly ahead of "own," 8 to 6. "Parents," with 4 votes, could not be reached for comment.

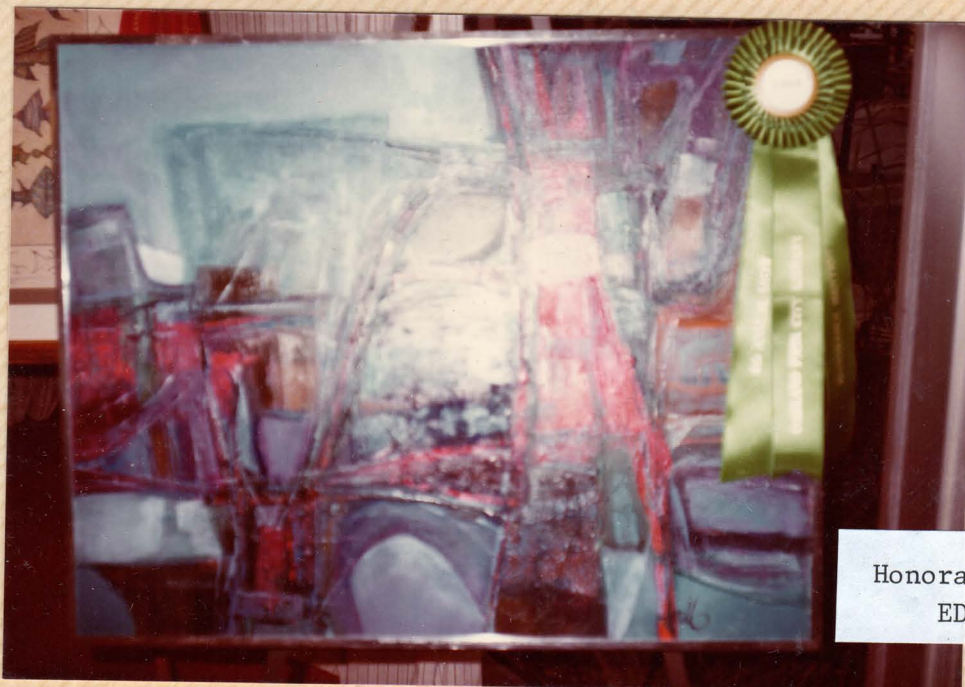

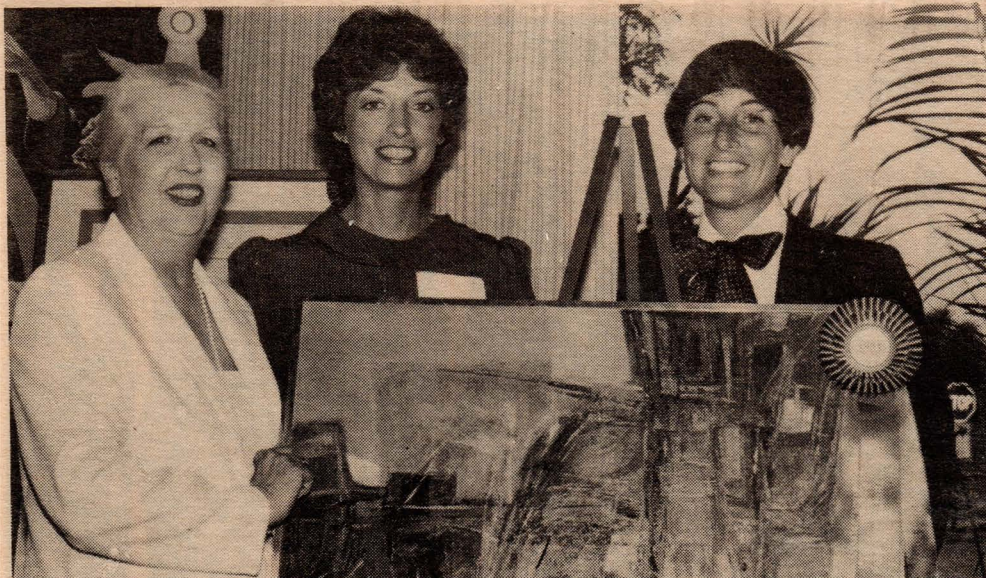
