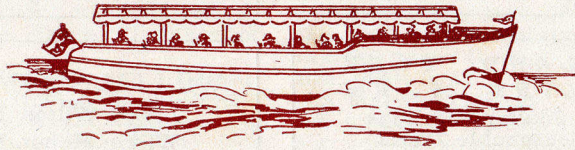

NEW COMPANY BEING FORMED

Lyle Weaver, secretary of the Pompano Beach Chamber of Commerce has informed us that a new organization is being formed which will be known as the Hillsboro Inlet Improvement Commission and will be incorporated. Everyone in this area should be interested in this new organization as it will have to do with the flood control effecting Oakland Park and Wilton Manor as well as the area to the north.

Roland Hardy is chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee on the Inlet, and states that approximately 2500 sand bags have been placed at the jetties as a temporary set-up until the U. S. Army Engineers can see fit to build permanent jetties at the Inlet. This is a point much under discussion at the present time and it is desired to get the inlet open to navigation. This project will also be a protection from the erosion of the beach area.
