WILTON MANORS COUNCIL NOTES

At the last regular meeting of the Wilton Manors Village Council, held on July 21 at the Village Hall, it was decided that Ray Coleman set up books for the village and that all matters pertaining to the village be kept in file and a record kept of anyone borrowing such data.

W. J. Robinson stated that the Twin Lakes Heights Water Co., will go ahead with their plans of supplying the village with water.

A contract postal station for money orders, registered letters to be mailed etc., is being taken up by Scrimgeour's of Wilton Manors. A letter to the Interstate Commerce Commission has been sent requesting that express and freight be delivered to the Village, as well as a letter to Postmaster Shand requesting that the village be included on the postal map.

A fifteen minute radio program has been okayed for the opening of Broward County's new radio station WBRD on Saturday, August 5.

A celebration to commemorate the establishment of the village is planned for sometime in November or December by the civic association.

A. Hagan requested a letter be written to Trailer Haven Trailer Park regarding the opening of the street on the right-of-way as it is dedicated to public use. He also appointed Mr. Chabot, Mr. Brown and Mr. Leaver as a committee to investigate the number of street signs to be made and the proper positions for same.

A permit was refused the Orange State Oil company to build a gas station at the corner of Wilton Dr., and 21st Street.

An investigation for street lights is to be made by that committee upon the request of such a light at 24th street by Mr. Miller.

SAFETY COOPERATION

Broward County Agent B. E. Lawton announces that his department is calling on all Broward county farmers to participate in the National Safety Council's program for farm safety.

Many of the 17,000 fatalities and a million and a half disabling injuries each year can be eliminated with care.

A ten per cent rate of reduction in accidents would save nearly two thousand lives a year.

RED CROSS INCLUDES SAIL BOATS

The Broward County Red Cross Chapter has taken the sailing of boats into their wide program of water safety and the first class of the summer will have a graduation "regatta" today.

Boats are furnished by Sam Barrett from his "Rainbow Fleet" at Bahia Mar. Boys and girls receive their instructions from Mr. and Mrs. John Komp, both of whom are certified small craft instructors. Mr. Komp is Red Cross executive secretary.

Classes are held every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, beginning at 8 a. m. for a two hour period, working out in a fleet of eight boats. The students must be between the ages of 12 and 18 and are to have completed the Red Cross Junior and Senior life saving course. Each session runs for a period of two weeks, the third and last for this summer, will begin August 14 and at the end of the season a huge regatta will be staged for all students participating in all three sessions.







WBRD Set To Go On Air

August 5 a new radio station in Broward County will fill the air waves with news, music and other interesting programs that the listening public has chosen. WBRD will operate on a frequency of 1580 kilocycles and a power of 250 watts from sunrise to sunset.

The station is compiling its own library so that lovers of music will be assured of continued programs of the type they prefer at specific times. The programs will be arranged according to a previouslyconducted survey by the station.

General manager of the station is Robert Standart who has been in radio work since 1938, when he started in Detroit. During the past six months, Mr. Standart, a graduate of Wayne University, has been associated with WTVJ, Miami's television station. Prior to that he was general manager of WFTL-WGOR-fm in Fort Lauderdale.

Standart has been a resident of this city for about two years and is active in the Rotary Club, Junior Chamber of Commerce, and the Naval Reserve as well as being on the board of directors of the Broward County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The basic aim of the station is to give a complete news coverage every hour five minutes before the hour and Miami Herald local news every morning. News editor for WBRD is Bert Wills, formerly of Pittsburgh, where he was associated with the advertising firm "of Bond and Starr, Inc., as assistant to the production manager. Mr. Wills is the nephew of T. R. Starr, of Gateway Properties and makes his home in Fort Lauderdale with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Starr.

Frank Hainey, formerly of WFTL is program director and merchandising manager. Sue Hainey is Traffic and Music Director. Chief Engineer of WBRD is Jack Miller.

President of the newly formed Broward Broadcasting Company is L. C. Judd, local realtor, George D. Gartland, of Johnstown, Pa., radio and theater executive, is vice-president. George W. English is secretary and treasurer. Dick Richardson of the Richardson Construction Company is a member of the board of directors.

The studio and transmitter are situated on Riverland Road, south of West Broward Boulevard. The 195 foot tower insures good reception with the least possible interference throughout the county.



"Expression" will be one of the subjects at the next meeting to be held Tuesday, August 1. Kay Fries a former professional radio and stage actress, will be the instructress.


D OF A PLANS RALLY

The camp, which is the American Youth Foundation Leadership Training Camp, is one of the most beautiful in the world and covers an area of 200 acres on Lake Michigan and Stoney Lake. Experienced leaders give guidance for individual development, for character, development and leadership training.

Barbara Jean, the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Dame of Deerfield Beach, is the president of the Broward County 4-H Club.

The Deerfield Beach Lions club and the Home Demonstration office are providing the funds for Barbara's transportation.

An outstanding member of the 4-H club in Broward county for the past seven years, Barbara has top honors in leadership and activities. She holds 86 blue ribbons for her achievements in clothing, nutrition, health, home improvement, gardening, canning, poultry, child care, safety, and fire prevntion. She has won four scholarships to State 4-H Club Short Course at Tallahassee, and was elected this year to the State 4-H Club council secretary for the coming year.
