

## Let's Be Asses Again—to Be Consistent!

N NEXT TUESDAY we are going to select three out of our six candidates for the city commission. Just to be consistent let's elect the worst possible trio to manipulate our \$500,000,000 corporation, float staggering bond issues, and sign impossible contracts with our favorite utility monopoly.

Somewhere among those six candidates are three men who can be depended on to be as asinine as men we've elected in the past. Let's find them. Our Little Nell, for instance, has made so many concessions in the last few days that she must not have more than a few paltry millions in the bank—and undoubtedly wants to continue "necking" congenial city dads.

Maybe we can find some men who can accomodate her.

After all, we have very little at stake—outside of our wives and mothers and fathers, and some babies who'll have to pay these bond issues after they grow up; perhaps a frame bungalow that cost \$90,000 during the Big Boom; and the highest taxes in the country. Representative Joe Dillon is said to have added a comment as follows: "I am not only opposed to golf, the Miami Jockey Club, and bridge after 9 p. m., but we must abolish all water troughs, barns and white wings in the Miami area because they contribute some way. just how I don't know, to the well-being of horses." They added, however, that for the time being they would permit church euchres. Real estate speculation will also be permitted until they sell off their

They, of course, don't represent the sentiments of the voters of Dade county, but it's our own fault —that is, the fault of you voters, because, personally, we didn't vote for any of the three. Let's elect candidates who'll bankrupt us. Then we won't have to worry about contracts and paved streets and mortgages and bonded debts. We can once more live on coconuts and barracuda meat.

#### RIGHT now it looks like the favored combination for city commissioners is: Reeder, No. 1;

Sewell, No. 2; Jimmy Donn, No. 3. However, interesting things are going to happen between now and Tuesday, and the lineup may be changed slightly.







#### Let's Stop Hoping and Start Helping

There is a note of extreme pessimism in business conversation around Miami of late that is going to result in immeasurable harm around Miami of late that is going to result in immeasurable harm to all of us who have money invested in Biscayne sunshine, unless all days and the causeway is crowded of us stiffen up our spines and begin to smile.

Miami Life, with the rest of the papers in Miami, has been trying for weeks to ignore the actual situation; but recent failures, receiverships, foreclosures and suits demand frankness. It is about time to look the situation in the face.

Pessimism, somehow, doesn't jibe with Miami. We, who have spent our lives here know that no place in the United States can compare with Miami. Pessimism never made a Miamian a five-cent piece. Optimism of the Flaglers and the Tuttles and the Brickels made

Miami. Until now optimism has been the predominating note. But somehow things have changed. Because \$15 a week sodu clerks can't clean up \$1,000 a week in real estate commissions there seems to be something wrong—in the opinion of the soda jerkers.

And my, what a quantity of \$15 a week men there are in Miami. There is nothing basically wrong with Miami. Our main crop got two bits for a dime sandwich has steadily improved from year to year and will improve during the next season over that of the last one. That is the tourist crop—or as the soft-spoken and dignified Herald would prefer to call it, the store it was different, of course. winter visitor crop.

Our sunshine is as bright as it ever was. That is what our tourists want. New Yorkers, Chicagoans, and persons from the middling cities do not come to Miami to gaze in awe at the Olympia building or Fountania or the repair work on N. E. Second avenue. They are, just as Kenneth L. Roberts said they were, Sun-Hunters, pure and simple. They are seeking horse races, jai-alai yames, surf, hot sand, and a modicum of alcohol. As long as Miami continues to furnish these as usual, our principal crop will thrive and we will reap our make sales. Grocery stores are regular harvest, plus the natural increment that we have seen every since Henry M. Fleden first make sales. Most things year since Henry M. Flagler first ran his choo-choo cars down from Palm Beach.

This depression, although it is cruelly real, is only temporary. It is merely a manifestation of the truth of the proposition that what goes up must come down. But Miami need not worry too hard until the climate changes and the beaches disappear and the amusement enterprises vanish
