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You Can't DODGE a Hurricane!

OST OF THE appalling loss of life and property in last September's hurricane was caused by failure of the newspapers and other agencies supposed to know everything to inform the public properly. Up to that time the word "hurricane" brought a "Hush!" from your bootblacks, brokers, grocers, realtors, editors, and bankers.

The newspapers simply didn't believe in hurricanes. Developers of these 30 or 40-mile waterfronts swore they couldn't cross the gulf stream. Fatuous boosters pointed to the shoals of the Bahamas and insisted they would keep 'em away. Every once and a while, in private conversation, scientists would point to the peculiar shape of Florida and claim any hurricane headed for Miami would be deflected.

But the Rah-Rah boys couldn't keep that blow in September from taking a toll of 600 or more lives and \$200,000,000 in property damage—and goodness knows how much more in business.

Had the public been educated on hurricanes the loss of life and property would have been negligible, even though we went through the hardest wind any community ever went through—and lived.

Miami's public should have been educated—and by the way, it isn't educated yet—to the fact that there are hundreds of hurricanes in waters hereabouts every year; that they are likely any time from July 1 to late October; that any one of them can hit Miami—just as any cyclone in the midwest can hit Chicago or Omaha or St. Louis. Starting early in summer every newspaper should constantly remind the people of hurricanes. And tell them what to do when they hit.

Hurricanes cannot be avoided. But damage can. Weatherman Gray, one of the best authorities on hurricanes we've ever met, in spite of his wrangle RACES—NEXT WINTER!

ALMOST everybody in Miami wants to know whether we'll have racing this winter. The verdict should be known this afternoon, for the powers-that-be are meeting in Saratoga today to decide the fate of the Sport of Kings.

We're not so far away from the summer racing centers that rumors don't reach us. And we hear that the directors of the Jockey Club are going to announce a 60-day meet (much longer than last year's), with sufficient purses to draw the big stables, and, mind you, a system of pari-mutuel betting!

Joe Smoot, the congenial president of the Jockey Club, is reported to have devised a form of certificate betting that is foolproof, court-proof, sheriff-proof, and Jim Carson-proof. And it will fill the bill, to the satisfaction of all the bettors who will congregate here this winter.

The dope is that there will be no oral betting, as predicted. And this because the race track crowd at the Miami track is of such a transient nature that it wouldn't be profitable to the bookies

If sentiment against some of the officers of the Jockey Club, that we are hearing so often, doesn't crystalize, we might see the nation's finest horses running around the Hialeah oval again. And we'll once more be able to gamble in public—within the law!

with the newspapers last September (in which, by the way, he was right and the newspapers wrong), says any substantially built building will stand up in the worst hurricane there ever was. He has told us repeatedly, in private conversation, that Miami has nothing to fear from a hurricane, provided ordinary precautions are taken.

But will they ever be taken if everybody joins in this conspiracy of silence that the realty men, chamber of commerce secretaries, certain newspapers, and the boosters are seemingly trying to inflict on us?

The knowledge that we are in a hurricane area will not keep people from living here or investing here. Every marine tropical city is in a hurricane

area. And yet some of the largest, happiest, most prosperous cities in the world are marine tropical cities.

They consider hurricanes just about like Alabama lightning, or a Georgia cloudburst, or a Kansas cyclone, or a Mississippi flood, or a Montana snowdrift, or a Hudson river gale, or a California earthquake. And no more.

Reminds us of a couple during the October blow—the blow, you remember, that headed straight here and got discouraged and drowned? Scared to distraction, they hastily packed up their car and burned up the roads northward. They had just reached Georgia and started breathing easy when a bolt of lightning killed them.

Right now, while we're in the midst of the hurricane months, it might be well to learn more about hurricanes. The Daily News got some razzing because it "played up" this week's hurricane, but we doff our hat to the editor for his judgment in performing what we think was a distinct public service. His stories caused a lot of Pollyannas who have happily insisted we'd not see another blow for years to use another few pounds of nails and a little heavier glass in the apartments they were building, and we noticed several sign-hangers using extra-heavy struts. Building supply men noticed a considerable spurt in business.

This hurricane, by the way, which caused so many people here to worry, proceeded on its way and killed many people in the Province of Nova Scotia, Canada—some two thousand miles away.

If we use only ordinary precautions, we can sit at home in the next blow, with our family around us and plenty of food in the larder, grin as we hear the wind howl—and shake up another drink!

More and Better Inspection

WHILE we have nothing against the city health department, either in the personnel or in the work it is doing, it is almost a perfect waste of time, as far as checking up on our food supply is concerned. In the first place it is far too small. There should be at least eight inspectors to keep anything like a check on the merchants who are willing to sell anything in the food line-clean or otherwise. One of the worst things in the city today is the five-cent sandwich. This nickle article of food is all right where it is made right on the premises and sold from a rack that is replenished every few minutes. But, when it is sold as a five-cent sandwich at drug stores and lunch wagons, it is not all right. The manufacture has to turn the sandwiches out at 35 cents a dozen. Figure it out for yourself. Can a sandwich be made for less than three cents? It can't! There is one five-cent sandwich factory in North Miami that is a disgrace. The toilet is leaking and running over and the women who make the sandwiches have to stand on boards to keep their feet out of the filth. Not one of them has a health card from the city. Another sandwich-maker on West Flagler carries his wares about in a basket in anything but a sanitary manner. The health department has ruled that fresh meat, pork, veal and roast beef shall not be used in wrapped sandwiches. How many makers are obeying this ruling? Not very many of them. Every week an individual buys up a lot of meat from the wholesalers—meat that has to be boiled in salt and soda before you can stand the smell of it—and a lot of this goes into sandwiches and restaurant stews. He carts it about in an open car, without covering or ice. If we are going to have a health department let's have one that is thorough. More inspectors and more inspection is

The new institution will be known as the Miami Beach Hospital, Inc., and will open on October 1. It will be fully equipped and will have at least twenty beds. The Southern Hospital, which was opened one year ago, has been popular ever since it began business. Efforts are being made to have the city business transferred to this new hospital at Miami Beach.

AN AUDITORIUM is a large building in which conventions can conevene. It is always large enough to hold twice as many delegates as ever attend the convention.

It is ever a dead loss, finan-

cially, to the city.

It is always hot and stuffy and has no conveniences. It is always in some out of the way place where the noise of street cars and railway trains disturb

It never pays, in hard cash.

The bigger the convention half
the more the city can boast about
it. And the more money it loses

on the proposition.

Miami is in the threes of a

convention hall complex.

It can spend several million dollars on rental and half a million on the building—and certain people will be satisfied.

And Miami will lose money on

the deal.

If somebody gives Miami the land; if somebody donates the building; if it could be built on

city land; then it might pay.

It certainly would prove a drawing card for the city. If it had a cooling system it would draw conventions in the summer time. It would be an asset to

the city.

But there is a diversity of opinion as to where the auditorium should be built. There is a diversity of opinion as to building it at all. Before it does so, Miami should take good care to look into all the pros and cons—and then think twice before spending real cash on the proposition.

Miami needs an auditorium. But it does not need several million dollars tied up in a hall that may not bring in a tenth of that amount.

If someone can figure out a way whereby Miami can secure an auditorium free, then it would be worth while to look into the matter.

It is no use having one that we cannot boast of as being the biggest and best in the world.

Miami needs some things more than it needs an auditorium.

Can't We Be Sensible?

HUNDREDS, yes, actually hundreds of people have called up Miami Life to tell us about rentals for this winter season that is almost on us. Almost all of the callers tell us exactly the same story.

No one is able to make any arrangement to rent a house or apartment beyond the mythical November first. No landlord can think beyond this imaginary limit. It just seems as though the date of November first has become the beginning of the period of getting it while the getting is good.

Miami landlords have followed this will-o'-thewisp for two years now. Last year they figured, by all the laws of averages, that they would be recompensed for building apartments at one dollar a brick. The man who paid one hundred thousand dollars for a fifty-thousand-dollar apartment house must take his loss. He cannot expect the winter visitors to pull him out of the hole.

It is not fair to invite tourists to our fair city and then overcharge them in the matter of rentals. It is not fair to make the resident of this city pay twice as much rent as the apartment or house is worth—just because it is winter time.

How many blows does it take to make the landlord discover that he is barking up the wrong tree? How many times must the apartment house be empty before the owner comes to his sane self? Why be asinine about this rental business?

One more blow at the tourist's pocketbook and we might as well fold up our city and die in the most glorious climate in the world. Be reasonable. A full apartment house at a low, or at least a reasonable rental, is better than empty suites all winter—and summer as well.

Let us have reasonable rentals.




