Almost Crucified on the Altar of Stupidity

NEVER before was the stupidity of city employes more clearly shown than when they tried to crucify W. A. Means, apparently the only efficient operative in the city finance department, on a charge of em-bezzling \$23,000 of city funds while he was city cashier.

Of course Means was acquitted. He probably would have been acquitted without the testimony of his former co-workers but their statements helped the defense more than if they had been defense witnesses. And, was upon testimony and accusations of these same city employes that a charge of embezzlement was placed against Means when he returned from his vacation last July.

If the entire city of Miami is run by employes such as testi-fied at the Means trial we are alarmed for fear the actual shortage at the city hall is far greater than the alleged \$23,000. If we are to go by figures compiled by the testifying city employes it ought to take between 18 and 20 years to discover any further shortages.

The rank injustice of city administrations, past and present, is shown in his complete vindication, not only technically but in the public mind. Testimony of other city employes sent to trial and sought to convict a man who, if comparison of witnessbox demeanor means anything, stood head and shoulders above

More About Employment

ONE of the dirtiest tricks pulled on the poor employe who is looking for a job is to make him register at one of the employment bureaus before he gets the position. This is done in one, at least, of the downtown hotels. A negro got a job there and was told to go and register at a nearby bureau. On Saturday he got his wages-\$10 for the week-minus \$6 that the bureau collected. From all accounts the management of several hotels take a cut on all the employes' first week's wages. That's why no employe is kept more than two or three weeks. Another one is engaged and he is stung for anything from \$6 to \$10. It is a piece of the cheapest graft ever perpetrated. Managers of apartment houses will only allow laundries and grocery stores to deliver at their houses if they are given a cut-in on the deal. Miami is fast becoming a city of petty

Convention Fuss Looms Over Elks' Budget

THE City Commissioners of Miami and the Convention Committee of the B. P. O. E. seem to have drifted into a clinch and the outcome is problemati-

It seems that the Elks got up budget totaling some \$80,600, for the forthcoming national convention, the purposes of which fund were for entertainment, decorations, and the little whatnots which go to make for a good time was had by all.

The city commissioners, having inherited a practically empty treasury, and finding ready money not easy to get, have been on a sort of economy basis, trying to stretch a dollar where four or five went before. When informed that Miami could have two great conventions this year, the commissioners appropriated \$50,000 each for the Shriners and

The Shriners accepted the appropriation and then set up about seeing the boys in Coral Gables and Miami Beach, and were successful getting promises for monetary aid from both places. But the Elks figured Miami as the convention place and believed that the city should come through with the amount the budget called for. And so on Monday afternoon two meetings will be held. The convention committee of the Elks will meet and decide whether they will accept the \$50,000, or whether they should hold out for the total of \$80,600 or nothing, while the city commissioners will endeavor to smooth things out by explaining

He, and he alone, never failed while on the stand, to find and explain clearly any figure sought from the city's books during the trial.

It was evident that he was innocent. Any one of half a dozen city employes might have taken the money. And if they did, he was close on their trail, because he knew from the books that something was queer, and he suspected some of his fellows. His trial, therefore, appeared to be necessary. It was their ignorance that caused the shortage; but whether it was the ignorance of danger that emboldened, or just a succession of stupid errors on their part that jeopardized Means' liberty we may never know.

Among some of the outstand ing testimony of the trial Chief Clerk Frink, who said he was directly under the director of finance, stated that he had given Means instructions as to how to handle cash and take care of his Further testimony showed that Means was working as city cashier before Frink entered the

He also admitted that he, himself, had borrowed something over \$500 about the time Means was arrested and charged with theft. Nichols further testified that Means was instructed to redeem worthless checks that had gone to various banks and that sometimes these checks ran into thousands of dollars. The checks, he said, were to be redeemed from the petty cash box, which, testified, contained only

Testimony in the case showed that as high as \$300,000 was left in unlocked cash boxes in an unlocked vault during working hours and that as high as 60 employes had access to that vault. It was also shown that the vault could be reached from six outside entrances and that a stranger would have no trouble walking into the vault and help ing himself to whatever his fancy directed him to choose.






