Now Coral Gables Won't Let You Rent Room In Own Home

It is always something to show how government is reaching out in the United States to control the citizens, who are no longer free Americans.

The latest is the announcement that Coral Gables will prosecute private home owners who dare rent a room to somebody else. Imagine that!

It has been the custom from time immemorial in this area and elsewhere for householders to cke out income so they may pay taxes and expenses by occasionally renting a room, or half a house, or the whole house during the season.

But now, it seems, that the apartment and hotel interests have become sufficiently powerful in Coral Gables to halt this horrible practice, because they—the apartments and hotels—have vacant rooms and apartments to rent themselves after the orgy of construction, which still continues needlessly.

Coral Gables City Manager W. T. McIlwain has authorized City Attorney E. L. Semple, it is reported in the press, to proceed against offenders where neighbors object. It is a violation of the zoning ordinance to rent rooms in single family districts.

Even the University of Miami will be asked to cooperate, and to shoo out the students who prefer private homes to apartments.

Probably the next step that Coral Gables takes will be to issue an order regulating the size of families in single family homes—no more than two kids to a couple—or they must go to jail.

In fact, they know that more babies are adopted through the private arrangements that lawyers and doctors supervise than through social agencies—and further they know that the histories of these adoptions generally prove that all concerned are much better off through such procedure . . . one of the main reasons being that, in such cases, the adopting parents are better satisfied and are completely shielded from any possible future annoyance from parents who might be tempted, later, to attempt extortion or blackmail.

And these doctors and lawyers have long sickened of the Herald's professional (and nearly always insincere) Good-Doing. They feel that the Herald is no more to be trusted as this community's social and religious dictator than it is to be trusted as our political boss.

Now, truth to tell, there are few, very few instances of baby adoption through the agencies set up for that purpose, where a fee or contribution to that agency has not been forthcoming.

This includes, of course, the Catholic charity organization that has spearheaded the local movement and whose New York branch preferred charges against the alleged baby racketeer, Irwin Slater.

Herald Wants Monopoly On Devices Of Adoption!

REVIEWING the Herald's outburst for the last several days, one thing stands out, and that is the fact that the Herald (and its favorite agencies) wants to create a monopoly on this business of separating the mother and her unwanted child—for a fee.

The truth of the case is that they are rarely able to provide as well for the child and mother as privateers have been—but they ignore that altogether!

We all know that if baby adoption were left up exclusively to these Herald-picked agencies, we'd simply have an untold number of illegitimate children being raised in orphan asylums—under the very same conditions as "honor-convicts" populate prison farms! . . . there under military rules, strictest discipline, wearing uniform clothes, regimented at every breath, their individualism hopelessly stifled.

These babies, mind you, would be denied parents who would cater to their needs and whims and help develop their personalities to the fullest.

But the Herald—obsessed with Sensationalism—cares nothing about the welfare of the individual mother or the baby.

They never mention the plight of the unwed mother, too often penniless and friendless.

Yet she is the figure the public is most interested in. Hasn't she given up part of herself? May never know what becomes of her own baby? May go on through the years, wondering, speculating about it?

But Herald "brown-noses" ignore her . . . when, as a matter of practicality, there should be state or federal aid to help unwed, penniless mothers in rehabilitating themselves!

We say that Miami leaders shouldn't come forth and blindly support the Herald. They should think over the situation carefully, familiarize themselves with every aspect of it, and, above all, resist any movement that deprives American citizens of their constitutional rights by delegating those rights to some bureau over which a conniving newspaper such as the Herald can exercise a sinister control.

If this were a movement to work out legislation that somehow would make it unnecessary for a mother to lose her child, every decent person in Miami would be for it.

But it isn't that at all.

It is a maneuver that, like too many of the Herald's campaigns, is tinged with politics.

Don't you, too, find it rather difficult to cry over the "plight" of the babies in the "evidence" the Herald sob-sisters put forth? . . . doesn't it occur to you, too, that parents who pay \$2,500 for a baby must certainly have a tremendous love for babies and be able, in other ways, to provide it with exceptional care?

Police State Here

Even Judge Curry Is Afraid He May Be Arrested for Something; Drive On Vagrants and Everybody. You May Be Jailed for Sassing Back

"THIS Miami police drive to clean up the streets and against vagrants is becoming so widespread and vigilant that I am almost afraid to go out myself," remarked Judge Cecil C. Curry to an elderly man standing before him charged with vagrancy Monday.

The elder said he was Tom Watson Hodges and the court felt inclined to be lenient toward a person carrying such a distinguished name. But he pleaded guilty, said he had come up from Kendall, did have some work. The judge remanded him to jail for the rest of the day and advised him to hurry back to Kendall where they are not so fussy about people on the streets and where the cops don't lug folks to jail because their shirt is dirty or they don't wear a tie.

The judge's facetious warning was well sounded. Whether a pedestrian wandering around loose or a motorist driving a car, or a person just sitting at a lunch counter, you are apt to be pinched, or even beaten, for any reason or no reason. Maybe the traffic officer got up on the wrong side of the bed and just feels mean toward humanity and you get in his way. That's a crime in Miami. Talking about the threat of a welfare state, Miami already has a police state. And that's no joke.

Other vagrants, found guilty, were given varying sentences up to 60 days in jail.

CHEESE it. That is get out of town. But don't pick up cheese without paying for it. You may be traced by its smell. Miami may be built upon cheesecake art but it is still a crime to sneak off with cheese from one of these big chain groceries. They have their nose out for such things. Charles Townsend, 57, and he looked older and feeble, was arraigned on the claim of trying to pocket two packages of cheese, priced at 53 cents. And the cheese was in court, too.

The allegations were filed by William A. Cross of the Tip Top store, 27 N. W. Fifth street. Charles, admitted kinship to the famous Townsend plan and said he could trace his ancestry back for several hundred years. But this had nothing to do with the cheese. Townsend explained he had been putting groceries in a basket and picked up this cheese, slipped it into his pocket, intending to take it out and pay for same at the counter. Then he forgot. "Yes," said Judge Curry, "that will happen every time you put something like that in your pocket."

Cross declared this was the second offense, that he had caught Townsend once before and let him go on the promise he would not repeat.

Editors Haven't Condemned Bribe; Quackery Seen

"The resolution," he said, "explained that whereas the press resented having to bear the burden of indirect publicity for the doctors' campaign against the national health program without remuneration, doctors in Minnesota henceforth would be allowed to insert professional cards as paid advertising in local newspapers.

"I am sure that we all know what this means," he said, "I am sure that all my colleagues appreciate the importance of the time honored prohibition of doctors' advertisements, as a means of keeping quacks and commercialism out of the practice of medicine, and of protecting the public against the blandishments and claims of fakers. Yet so intense has been the pressure on the doctors from their lobby headquarters that they willingly sacrificed the very ethics of their own profession in order to maintain the free flow of publicity in the columns of the press.

"The possibility that the press might not respond, apparently, was not even considered. For the good of America, I hope the honest newspaper publishers of the Nation will reject this bribe and will condemn it for the despicable action which it is. Unfortunately, they have not been quick to do so."

Actually, few papers repudiated the promise made to the lobby by the State's Editorial Ass'n that its member papers would propagandize against health insurance in return for the ads. One of the few dailies to speak up was the Minneapolis Star and Tribune which editorialized that any editor who opposes the health program "in order to sell advertising space . . . is violating the ethics of his profession." It added that "purchase of advertising space does not include the right to dictate editorial policy."

Medical Ads Buy Support of 700 California Papers

The AMA was confident, however, that it had made a good deal for its side, and that the way to an editor's column is through his advertising office. It had its successful experience in California in this respect as a guide. In opposing a California health insurance law, Whitake & Baxter had also proposed a heavy advertising campaign, with the result that many papers hostile to its propaganda swung into line behind the campaign.

At that time (In Fact May 3, 1948), John Hunton, secretary of the California Medical Ass'n, admitted:

"We have 700 newspapers, a great many of them small weeklies. Never before have we been able to get real support from the newspapers because the answer constantly comes back: 'Why should we give the doctors any support when they don't advertise and chiropractors do?'"

"When we started our campaign we went to the California Publishers Ass'n and said: 'Gentlemen, we are going to spend a lot of money with the newspapers. We are going to advertise in every one of the 700 newspapers in California.'"

"Each of the 700 papers in the state is receiving a minimum of 100 column inches of advertising in a period of 12 months. We have found the response of editors, in publicity, has been beyond anything that we expected when we started this campaign."

Townsend was fined \$25 and costs or 14 days in jail. Although he had been free on \$200 bond, Townsend entered the bastille.

Virgie Watts, a Negro, charged with taking shoes valued at \$10 by Limie Dykes, denied his guilt, but was convicted and he received 60 days in jail.

SOME complaints, women and men, regret the charges filed against their mates, boy friends, or others, and fail to prosecute. The defendants are dismissed. Then there are women who insist upon going through with the case.

That was the course of Rosalyn Freeland, a little woman, with two small daughters in court. She pressed charges of drunken driving against her husband, Robert Lee Freeland. Warned by the judge what this would mean, she replied that she no longer loved Robert; that she worked, he did not; that she had supplied him with money. She was tired of it. Robert was convicted, fined \$50 and costs or 24 days—and took the days. Rosalyn was going to know where he was for a few weeks.

Mary Ahearn appeared against Charles E. Ahearn, 35, of 2333 N. W. 14th street, a cab driver, on charges of being drunk, disorderly conduct, assault and battery, and resisting arrest. He was awarded with 15 days.

A like sentence went to Ross D. Green, Sr., 47, of 3072 S. W. 18th street, for disorderly conduct and "refusing to obey the requests—the demands of a police officer." See, you must obey the cop and not talk back. That's lawlessness. The officer is always right—even when he is wrong.

Beach Battle Is Old, Newspapers Confused, Bell To Wage Fight

IN THIS battle over the beaches as to private and public ownership, the daily newspapers, of course, have been somewhat confused in their account as to why several attorneys were held in contempt by Circuit Judge George E. Holt, fined and jailed. The fight goes back to 1940 when the federal court ruled that the beach in question was dedicated to public use. However, when the issue was presented to the circuit court later, the state court declared just the opposite, raising the possible question as to which has jurisdiction over the ocean-front rights, the federal or state courts.

In that state court opinion was included an injunction against the city of Miami Beach forbidding it to assert its claim further through the federal court or otherwise. This injunction was not directed at any specific individuals, but it was in the alleged violation of this general court ban, that the three attorneys, R. K. Bell, David Koller and C. Frederic Brown, and Herbert Scott Young, president of the Citizens League of Miami Beach, were adjudged in contempt by Circuit Court Judge Holt when they appealed to the federal court to enforce its previous and earlier opinion.

In the contempt order, Judge Holt added another injunction against anybody asserting any claim to this particular beach on behalf of the public. Attorneys, surprised by such a ruling, declare that if a circuit court can prevent a citizen of the United States from appealing to his federal court, then why couldn't a city or county court prohibit a convicted person from appealing to the circuit court for the correction of what they deem to be an unjust decision.

The local court's contempt conviction has been appealed to the state supreme court, and among the lawyers who will represent the Miami defendants are Pat Whitaker, well known Tampa attorney, and J. Lewis Hall of Tallahassee.

The day after Attorney Bell's release from the county jail he filled a previously arranged speaking engagement before the Miami Acacia club at the El Comodoro hotel. Among those at the tables were Sheriff James Sullivan, who played "host" to prisoner Bell, and also another contemtee, C. Frederic Brown, who was jailed because he happened to be a partner of David Koller, although Brown had little or nothing to do with the case.

Bell, not wearing the pallor of incarceration, and not hesitat-

ing to continue his fight, warned that the public ownership of beaches at Miami Beach and elsewhere in Florida was depending by the hour. If Florida citizens do not protect what the government says belongs to them there will not be a bathing area left to them, said Bell. Outside of the one public park, there is only about an eighth of a mile of beach left open to the public at Miami Beach, declared Bell.

Continuing his talk, Attorney Bell said the state supreme court has held that the foreshore of the waterfront belongs to Florida for public use "but greed has now grabbed most of the oceanfront. The controversy rages between private and public interests, but this specific case is now before the state supreme court and I have confidence that the rights of the citizens will be upheld. It is insignificant what happens to us but it is important to preserve the beaches for the public. Circuit Judge Carroll overruled the motion of the 14 lawyers for the hotel to dismiss the complaint of Miami Beach and held that it was illegal to trespass upon the foreshore. But note how many hotels have built pools on the beach and even in the ocean.

"I asked local and state attorneys and the governor to act in the matter but received no co-operation, and so, as members of the bar, we felt it our duty to act. We are going to use every legal means to preserve the beaches forever for the public. Whatever the outcome there will be no animosity on our part."

COUNTY CONTRACTORS MUST NOW QUALIFY AFTER MIAMI LIFE EXPOSE

PROBABLY you have noticed recent advertisements in the newspapers giving notice to general contractors, to painting, plumbing, electrical, carpentry and other contractors wishing to do business hereafter in the unincorporated areas of Dade county.

Under an act of the state legislature and a resolution of the Dade county commission all contractors must file applications for qualification, showing their background, experience and ability or pass an examination.

This reform in the building restrictions by the county ought to be welcomed by legitimate contractors and by all persons and firms who have construction and repair work of any kind.

This drastic change in the rules followed the expose in MIAMI LIFE which revealed that anyone could obtain a contractor's license for work in the county regardless of qualification and without examination. A representative of this paper a few months ago was informed he would be issued a license for plumbing or carpentry if he could merely obtain the signatures of two people recommending him, although he might be unable even to hit a nail with a hammer.

That type of loose construction practices has been followed for years, with the result that unfit persons often engaged in construction and repair work, competing with the legitimate and experienced, and was the reason for much of the shoddy work reported throughout the county. There was no protection for the public and a license from the county meant exactly nothing. Now it will be different, conforming more closely with municipal regulations.

That is just another example of the accomplishments wrought by MIAMI LIFE for the protection of the public, for business and for the honest worker.

Bossy Miami Police Curse, Beat Citizens

GAIN it is being emphasized that Miami people need protection against their own police and that a little of the courtesy being sought at Miami Beach is also required on the Miami side of Biscayne bay.

At times you may wonder if you can believe the newspaper stories about alleged beatings of innocent persons by angry cops, reports of disorderly conduct, accounts of discourtesy. You cannot conceive that policemen, trained, employed and paid to maintain peace and order and to aid the public, indulge in lawless orgies of their own without rhyme or reason. Cops do have a turbulent and difficult task and must often deal with bad actors, drunks, battlers, and you figure that is the truth back of the allegations of improper treatment by the police. Then you have a minor experience of your own—you, a decent citizen, trying to abide by the innumerable regulations so far as possible. You are loudly bawled out for making a wrong turn or doing something that the traffic officer thinks or claims was contrary to what he believes should have been done. You may be cursed. You are ordered to show your license. You are regarded as a criminal. This happens to hundreds.

You may be, as we were, motoring slowly east on N. W. Fourth street, edging to the left to draw up even with a car in the right lane, creeping along as the Miami ave. traffic light is red. Cars are parked on both sides; there was a truck half way in the street. Suddenly there is loud honking in the rear. One of these nervous drivers, you suppose, who thinks he owns the road. He must expect you to climb a pole or rush through the red light to let him pass. But you proceed cautiously in keeping with safety advice until the light turns green and then you go ahead in the left lane.

As you near the postoffice this rear car rushes up to you on the right side and some guy starts yelling as to why you did not jump the curb when he blew his horn. "Why you straddled the yellow line. Don't you know I could throw you into jail for that? I am a POICE OFFICER."

Maybe he was or wasn't. You wouldn't, and we didn't know. He was driving a regular car, dressed in civilian clothes. No proof that he was a cop or even the mayor or president. Probably he was a police officer. He sounded like some—domineering, commanding, bossy, superior, to whom a citizen is scum, something to be kicked out of the way. Imagine anybody getting in the path of his hurried progress.

For him to talk about rules and threaten others was a joke. He violated several, along with safety admonitions. He kept honking a horn needlessly and for no purpose except to assert his importance. He himself must have crossed that yellow line. He was portance. He himself must have crossed that yellow line. He passed on the right side. He himself stopped in the middle of the street, holding back other cars. Then he turned right on First avenue, although he had wanted to get over to our left which would have placed him on the wrong side.

If Miami motorists may be pinched for straddling the yellow lines at times, every driver would be in jail for life. It is impossible to drive on downtown streets without doing so.

But this experience typifies certain hot headed police unworthy of their positions. They should be weeded out. The police should be made to understand they are employed to serve the people, not boss, persecute, curse, and beat them.

The new attorney general says he knows nothing about this case.

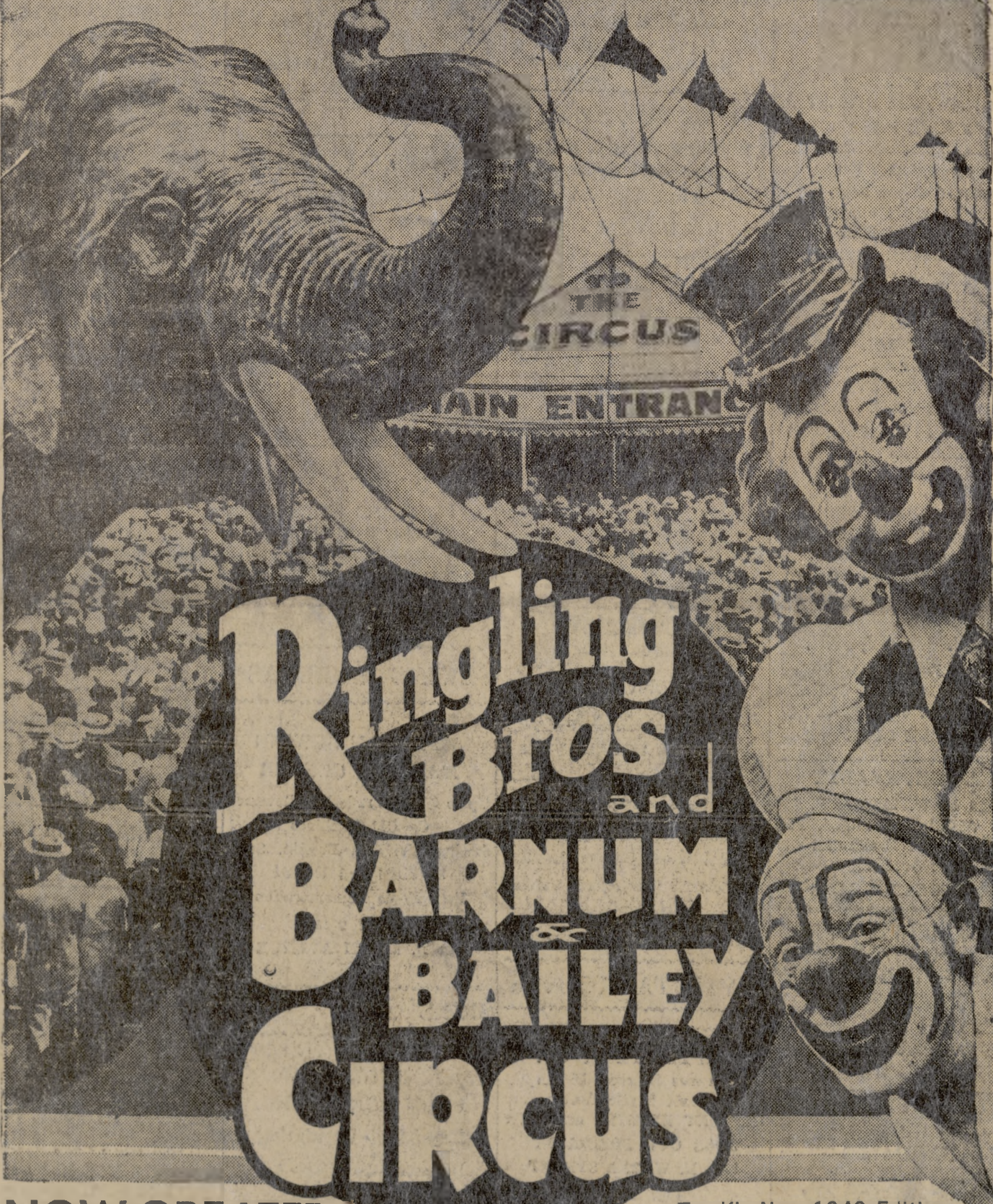
