News Tower, constantly maneuvering some way of out-smarting us natives, went beyond the bounds of decency, even in political warfare, with the arrest of Val Cleary, who for 14 or 15 years has been one of Miami Beach's most respected citizens. Respected? For years he has been a large property owner; he has close to \$100,-000 in Beach property free and clear today, and his home at 8th and Ocean Drive is a work of art; the people of Miami Beach, before syndicate-gambling came into effect, elected him mayor twice (the first time, of course, wasn't counted properly as all of us who worked for Red, know, down in our hearts, because at that time Red need-

ed a job and Val didn't!) Before that he was justice of the peace, and before that, city tax assessor. And, before that, Val was always like he is today, a wholesome citizen of the Beach.

To make a long story short, here's the situation:

Dan Mahoney, who used to be James M. Cox's son-in-law, and is now the Tammany Tiger chief in these parts, apparently able to control all patronage from the White House

down to precinct committeemen, wants Abraham Frank Katzentine, from some place in Alabama, made mayor of Miami Beach for a second time.

Miami Beach, you must take in mind, is the prize gambling jewel of the continent during January, Februar and March, when the big birds' pulses stir to the sound of craps or roulette. A dictator controlling Miami Beach's gambling "concessions" is, indeed, a tremendous figure.

But even the supporters of the Tammany Tiger mayorality candidate paused when they heard the Cox-News boys screaming that Val Cleary was in jail and hadn't produced bond "at the time this edition went to press!" They knew that Mr. Cleary had produced bond hours before that "edition" had gone to press as the court records will show, and as the final horse-race results the Cox-News printed in that edition will substantiate! They knew something was terribly wrong in the picture.

Why shouldn't the good people of the Beach pause?

America's winter capital, small as it is but in many

ways the richest community on earth at the present time, defiled by seasonal gambling interests!

And the far-reaching influences of the Cox-News' Washington connections to call in even the government to squelch any opposition to the youthful Abraham Frank Katzentine!

City, county, state, and now Federal aid — to elect a Miami Beach mayor, who, under the true meaning of the city charter, is at the mercy of any one of the seven councilmen (if he didn't arrive late and leave early)!

STATE AID — Governor Sholtz, doing another of his frequent disappearing acts, removed Constable Jim

Hickland, twice comfortably elected by the voters, upon the grounds of being an Irishman, refusing him trial. Jim, as constable, was in a position to hamper the Cox-News' Tammany Tiger combination.

FEDERAL AID-The News Tower Brain Trust's dictated appointment of Abraham Frank Katzetine's law-partner, Sanders Gramling, as district attorney for this part of Florida. The resulting indictments hooking the name of one of his two formidable opponents

Especially now that John Levi, who has been the head and guiding star of the Miami Beach council ever since it existed, is almost being drafted to get Miami Beach political affairs back on their feet. Is Cleary's arrest an intimidation in which the government is, unwittingly, taking part?

We ask you?

President Roosevelt, who has always shown such high regard for this garden spot, would do the citizens of Dade County agreat favor if he would personally investigate this situation — and try to straighten out our coming winter season.

JOCKEY JIMMY

CLORIDA will have 92 days of racing through the 1934-35 I season, the longest in history, according to dates approved by the Florida State Racing Commission. The opening is set for Tropical Park on Dec. 15. Hialeah Park will open on Nov. 15. to receive shipments of horses. The racing schedule is as follows:

Hialeah Park, Jan. 17 to March 9-45 Days. Tropical Park, Dec. 15 to Jan. 16—28 Days.

Tropical Park, March 11 to April 1 (exclusive)-19 days The Tropical Park management is yet to be heard from on complete stakes and purse schedules.

When a rebuilt race course in the hills of New Hampshire, 40 miles from Boston can pass the 800,000 mark for attendance during their 31 day fall meeting, then we know that they are running the right kind of sport. Rockingham Park's mutuel handle during this period was approximately \$9,700,000. 
