# MIAMI IS HIT LOW AGAIN

EVER SINCE Miami and Dade county started showing any visible wealth, Dade county has been the sucker county of the state. Tallahassee ever since has looked down this way with lustful eye. And always harvesting.

This recent invoking of the archaic Davis package law, passed before the good people of this part of the state knew what crime prohibition would incite, is rather astounding to sensible taxpayers of Dade county. It was scarcely believed that Tallahassee would try to get even more millions from this county than it has for the last 15 years.

There are 67 counties in this state.

Investigation will show that Dade county — just one of the 67 counties — has paid almost half of the operating expenses of the state.

For years Dade county has been giving Tallahassee between six and seven millions of dollars a year to operate the state on... Along the Georgia line there are schools built on Dade county tax-money — from gas tax, race-track tax, and other Dade-promoted taxes — not only would grace the finest parts of Miami, but are actually needed here, with our over-crowded school facilities.

Properly prorated, the money we've been paying out to Tallahassee for the last several years would make Dade county taxfree in ten years. Properly prorated, from now on, the tax money that is going out of Dade county every year — and, mind you, it's going out, apparently never to return, after reaching the cash register at Tallahassee — would pay off all the bond-holders and other mortgages of all the municipalities of Dade county in a few years.

Nearly \$7,000,000 a year we're paying out from this county!

For what purpose?

Simply to enrich the northern part of the state that, for nearly a decade, tried to keep us from getting even one decent highway!

And now the state has nerve enough to attempt collection of more than a thousand dollars from every person selling any sort of liquor — although the impoverished community of Miami taxes each not more than \$250! If the state succeeded in enforcing such payment, it would mean another half-million dollars going from Dade county to Tallahassee (and somehow these Tallahassee birds invariably spend their money in Thomasville, Ga., or New York, rather than in Miami.)

Dade county has one senator and three representatives in the state legislature.

Yet it pays more money into the state treasury than 22 counties that have nine state senators and 29 representatives!

If there was ever need for a redistribution of state patronage, a pro-rating of taxes to conform with our paying population, it is now.

And we'd better start moving, while we've got the upper hand!
