SEVERAL PROMINENT people have been indicted, many reputations ruined regardless of possible acquittals later, money shut off County-wide with thousands of innocent parties left holding the respective bags, the realty and building market most uncertain of expected strength this spring, and a general feeling, not only of unrest, but that Miami's future has been retarded several years' growth—all as the result of Dave Sholtz, who happens to be governor, and Vernon Hawthorne, who happens to be state attorney, making a publicity stunt at capitalizing on the killing of a bookmaker!

To our many visitors, and to a great many natives, this paper wants to call attention to the fact that both have been in office for a rather considerable length of time, and both have political ambitions. They could have called grand juries during the summer when we natives would really have time to thoroughly enjoy the newspaper reporters' sensationalism.

Further, we wish to remark that, so far, the grand jury investigations haven't in the slightest touched upon any friend of Boss Dan Mahoney of the Cox-News—who lost for virtually every candidate he put up in the last two years' many elections.

Although the statute of limitations still permits investigations of last season's misdeeds, when the Mahoney-Tammany Tiger gang thoroughly controlled Miami Beach's juiciest morsels, Mr. Hawthorne hasn't shown the slightest disposition to go into that angle whatsoever. Sponsored by the Cox-News and Mahoney, could you expect it?

Oppositely, isn't it most logical to believe that now—although sacrificing what appeared to be Miami's greatest season—he would pick the persons the Cox-News and Dan Mahoney want to get even with?

Until this grand jury investigation, so long as it has started and already achieved a disastrous crippling or freezing of the only real crop Miami has—the tourist—until it shows that it is going to proceed, without fear or favor, against all who have been guilty in the past two years of shady or criminal practices, especially with gambling, we are going to view it with alarm. As should every citizen of Dade county who has his soul wrapped up in its possible future. The past year has shown to what extent political chicanery may be used to attempt defeat of estimable men in politics, through use of court machinery. The case of Val C. Cleary of Miami Beach is a case in point. Val, however, rode a wave of extreme public indignation into top position on the new city council. Furthermore, through his ignominious arrest under a pretext—and Jim Hickland's removal as constable by the governor (but whose reinstatement came the day before the Beach city election)—the Beach thoroughly eliminated the machinations of the Cox-News and Boss Mahoney from Beach politics last month!

This left the Cox-News and Boss Mahoney with only two officials upon whom they could depend for vengeance—State Attorney Vernon Hawthorne, whom they have been grooming for next governor, and the present, and discomfited, governor, Dave Sholtz, who has spent more time out of the state than in it since elected.

If for nothing else, Hawthorne has a reputation for being honest. No one has ever accused him of taking a quarter (which is more than can be said of anybody else in public office in Dade county!). His ability is another matter.

Now he has an opportunity to prove his honesty to the satisfaction of the thousands of worried people of this county.

The season's whipped, of course—but if it could be shown it was for a good purpose, let him do it, fully and without fear or favor.

Let's have all the gamblers who operated on Miami Beach last winter indicted and brought into court, and find to whom they paid—and what connection the then mayor, A. Frank Katzenstine, had to do, with it! Let's find out why one party, or somebody else, was refused permission to operate gambling, while Ike Levy, whom this paper exposed by name late last winter as operating crooked dice, was allowed to run! Let us find what the pay-off was on ocean-front emporiums that got into most of the leading journals up north—but, as usual, into none of the local journals. Let us find out what connection Boss Mahoney and his henchmen at Miami Beach, who later used it so powerfully in the 1934 elections to try to elect the Cox-News tickets, had with illicit gambling!

Let's find out how much truth there is to Governor Sholtz "selling out" to gamblers and liquor dealers!

State Attorney Hawthorne is the man on trial now, in the eyes of Dade county people, who've seen visions of good profits go glimmering this season. Otherwise he's going to have thousands of property holders to answer to, at the close of the season. They'll forgive him now, if he'll make a clean sweep—so that, perhaps, the season of '35-'36 may end Miami's depression!

HAVING his name as one of the 11 "distinguished men" President Franklin D. Roosevelt publicly expressed delight in having sponsors for Roosevelt birthday parties over the land next week, was—and should be—a most keen thrill to our much-touted Colonel Henry L. Doherty, who has been running from state to state for the past five years trying to keep out state and federal penitentiaries for defrauding widows and orphans, laborers and farmers out of billions in Cities Service stock and its subsidiaries.

Strange to say, however, you have never seen a photograph of the bewhiskered stock-seller and President Roosevelt taken together. It has taken astute maneuverings by the President and his aides to evade this. It almost happened last spring when the President came to Florida waters for his fishing vacation—but he managed to shift his announced route. Although his secretarial party were wined and dined and bedded at the Biltmore hotel, upon which the "colonel" holds a lease or option.

Henry L.'s future hasn't been decided by the government yet, by any means—although he has done everything humanly possible to obtain the best graces of the White House, by exploiting Roosevelt's pet fancies, including Warm Springs, Ga., and birthdays. This is, of course, due not to Henry L.'s brains, but to those of Col. Carl Byoir, his publicity agent, who was press agent for Machado in Cuba.

The Doherty friendship for Miami is more or less a myth, exploited by Byoir and the Daily News. As a matter of fact, the only thing he has actually purchased outright is the Ronney Plaza hotel—and he paid well for it, because it was possibly worth it. The rest have been defunct concerns, with the bondholders eager for someone to take 'em over to pay them interest, at least.

Friend of Miami!
How can his purchase of hotel properties in Nassau and Palm Beach be consistent—with so much good hotel property here just as attractive to a "friend of Miami" with money?

Miami will some day learn that this elderly man Doherty, who doesn't dare go back to Kansas, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, or any of the other many states he floated billions of dollars worth of stock in, is no more a "friend of Miami" than Joe E. Widener or Col. E. R. Bradley are!

Here are the facts. Lipps has never been a sparring partner for Knight, although the reading public got that impression from the News story. He's a highly rated fighter. Was never in the same ring with Joe Knight. Has a decision over Frankie Edgren, Cheyenne, Wyo., heavyweight, one of the men Jack Bell listed as among the "GOOD FIGHTERS." Earned it late last year in Charlotte. Two weeks ago at Daytona Beach he fought a 10-round draw with Donald "Reds" Barry of Washington, ranked among the first ten heavyweights. Lipps himself was raised in December by Ring Magazine and Collier's Eye as third best light heavyweight in the South—and the best prospect for a world's championship.

As a consequence, Manager Huggins plans to enter Miami Monday or Tuesday to sue the Daily News for damages in behalf of Joe Lipps.
