## Chain Stores Lie To Obtain License

THE owner of an honest grocery store wouldn't perjure himself for a measly \$2.38, but we haven't heard of any medals being awarded chain grocery stores for honesty and we may expect perjury to be included in their other questionable tactics.

The Great Atlantic & Pacific (A. & P.) operates twenty-one stores in Miami. The net city license fee for any grocery store with a stock valued at \$1,000 or less is \$9.90 per year. A charge of only \$2.38 for additional stock not in excess of \$2,000 is made. An oath is required to procure any license and in 21 INSTANCES THE A. & P. HAS TAKEN IT TO PROCURE LICENSES AT THE MINIMUM FIGURE FOR ALL OF ITS STORES. The 21 A. & P. stores pay the city of Miami the munificent total of \$207.90 for grocery licenses each year.

The Piggly Wiggly concern operating 10 stores is somewhat more honest. They didn't have the gall to swear to the license department that the stock in each store was worth less than \$1,000 so they raised the ante to \$2,000 and paid the additional \$2.38 for each store. The Piggly Wiggly stores pay a combined total of \$128.50 in grocery license fees to the city, which added to the amount procured from the A. & P. makes a marvelous total of \$336.40 handed the city by an octopus for the privilege of strangling independent business.

The Frank T. Budge Hardware store, an honest and reputable concern hands the city \$330.00 annually for operating just one store WHICH IS EXACTLY \$6.40 LESS THAN IS PAID BY 31 CHAIN GROCERY STORES COMBINED. If the chain stores can't be honest with the city, and the city is powerless to make them honest WHAT CHANCE HAS THE CONSUMER? Is there anyone in Miami who really thinks that the extensive stocks on the shelves and in the store rooms of the 21 A. & P. stores is worth less than \$21,000? Could that stock be purchased for \$21,000, or even five times that figure? OF COURSE IT COULDN'T it's merely in keeping with the chain store idea of squeezing to the last drop.

Alexander Orr, Jr., is next to the favorite and will doubtless be runner-up to Williams next week. He is making a spirited campaign and everything about his organization is clicking smoothly. He refrains from... sensationalism... in... his speeches, which is in his favor, and will poll a tremendous vote. Nothing short of an avalanche can keep him out of the second primary.

Robert (Bob) Williams is the safest bet in the race. He should, and probably will, finish on top of the pile with a substantial majority which will add much to his confidence of ultimate victory. He is the "Lone Wolf" of the campaign, being unattached to any group or clique and barring the unforseen should be elected without trouble.

William "Fighting Bill" Lester, president of the Greater Miami Board of Trade, has the backing of a great number of business men and will pole a tremendous anti-Sewell vote. He has promised, if elected, to rid the city of Sewell at the very first commission meeting. He is one of the few who received substantial applause from the audience he addressed along with other candidates.

Charlie Laughinghouse will probably be the fourth man among the winning six. Like Williams he is a "Lone Wolf" drawing his votes from all sections and factions. He is the "liberal" candidate and is receiving splendid support from all voters in favor of a liberal policy for Miami, especially during the winter season. He mimes no words in stating his policy and has piled up a mountain of votes in all sectors.

Patrick (Pat) Cannon and Robert Reed will fight it out for the remaining pay-off position. They seem to have a slight advantage for the moment and if they can hold it until next Tuesday one of them may be the lucky one. Reed and Cannon aren't to be counted out of things until the last vote is counted.

R. C. Gardner, Mark Chartrand and J. J. Bridges, the "reform trio," will probably finish in the order named near the tail end of the list. Their published platform is entirely (Continued on Page Three)

Why is it that the question of the Sales Tax was not put up to a popular referendum vote among the people? Is it because the proponents of this taxation knew that it would be overwhelmingly defeated? We should not have asked the question—we KNOW that it is the reason no referendum was even suggested.

In contrast, some mighty fine and intelligent civic-minded citizens are now in Tallahassee in an effort to kill this obnoxious bill. These citizens have gone up there at their own expense and are fighting your battle as well as theirs. MIAMI LIFE gladly pays tribute and homage to such men as B. B. Freeland, I. C. Helmly, Fred Hosea, Robert Washburn and other sincere and successful Miami merchants for their efforts to throw the searchlight of sanity on this imbecilic tax. These men realize that their welfare depends entirely upon the healthy financial condition of the city and its citizens, and they know if such a treacherous tax is placed upon them it will seriously affect the buying power of the great majority of Miamians who have a tough enough struggle now making a bare living.

And at all future elections! Because it is perfectly obvious that they are attempting to sell out their constituents who are solidly against such legislation.

## STOP PEEPLES!

### For Honest Boxing Commission

CAPT. W. H. PEEPLES, JR., has been suggested by "Dinty" Dennis, sports editor of the Herald, for state boxing commissioner. What a joke! Peeples' record during his two years as a Miami matchmaker alone stamps him as entirely unfit for promoting boxing bouts, not to mention such an important position as state commissioner.

We refer to Pete Nebo who was battered from rope to rope by Frankie Davis. Everyone knew Nebo, once a truly great little scrapper, was no longer physically fit for ring warfare, Dennis and Peeples included.

But instead of exposing existing conditions, Dennis and Peeples went into a huddle and came out with a lot of silly ballyhoo to pull the wool over the public's eyes. Then after the lop-sided match which netted Peeples a tidy sum, out comes Dennis with a scathing attack on the Miami Boxing Commission for allowing such a fight. Instead it is Peeples and his conniving dupes who call themselves sports editors who should hang their heads in shame.

Our boxing commission is composed of honest men who donate their services free for the betterment of the sport. They have no time or means of investigating every boxer pulled out of the bag by Peeples. They have to depend largely on the newspapers for this information. So when Dennis started boosting the Nebo-Davis match, they naturally gave their approval.

It is also strictly against the boxing rules for a man to

fight more often than once every five days. Yet Miami Life discovered that Burl suffered a fractured rib in an up state bout less than five days before he was served up as a punching bag for Barry. But did Dennis expose this fact to guide the boxing commissioners?

So when Dennis criticizes the local boxing commission and in the next breath advocates Peeples for state commissioner, he holds himself up to ridicule. Because if there is any man in the State of Florida totally unfit for such a responsible position, that man is this same nincompoop, Mr. "Help-Himself" Peeples.

Whether he is dishonest or just plain ignorant, (he probably couldn't truthfully deny either accusation), Capt. Peeples' record stamps him as the last man in the world to be associated with boxing. "You're screwy," said the reporter. "General Sherman was a yankee."

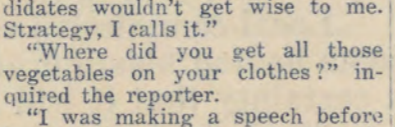

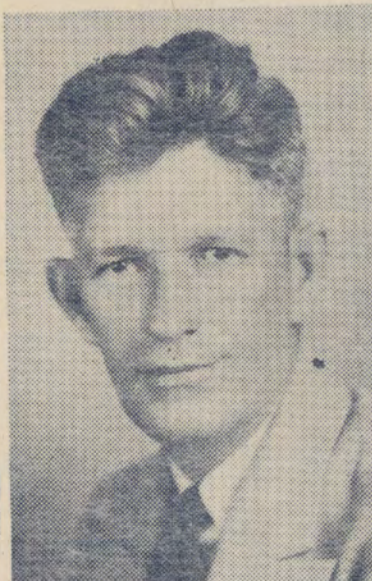

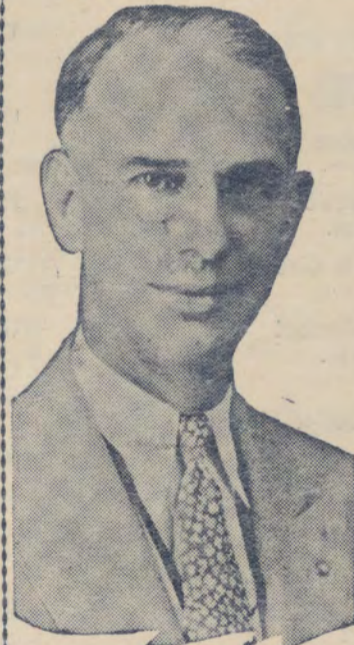
