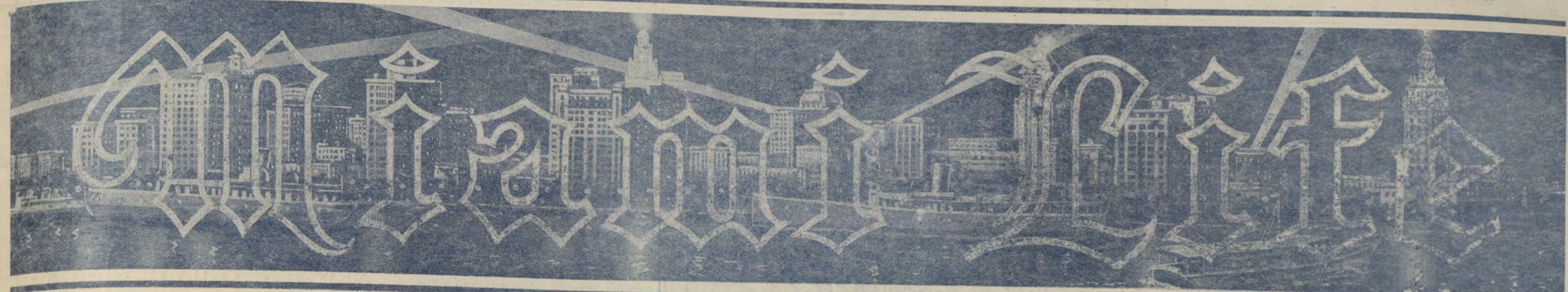

**Protected Murder Suspects; Gamblers;  
Crooked Officials And Little Tammany  
While Persecuting Political Enemies**

**VERNON HAWTHORNE**, the most venomous, viperous crook in Florida—Vernon Hawthorne, a corrupt, conceited egotistical puppet masquerading as a man—Vernon Hawthorne, a boot-licking catspaw for the Miami Daily News—Vernon Hawthorne, a vindictive, one-horse, lawyer using the sacred cloak of a dignified office to conceal his loathsome onslaughts upon decency and fair play—Vernon Hawthorne, a narrow minded louse who protects murder suspects; drives decent men to suicide and chains fellow men in mosquito infested cells to break their wills and spirits in order his own "magnificent" brain may dominate them—Vernon Hawthorne, the agitator who turned the Wickershaw investigation on South Florida—Vernon Hawthorne, a persecutor posing as a prosecutor who protects Miami Beach gamblers and crooked officials and viciously persecutes political enemies—Vernon Hawthorne, the thief of the age, who has stolen and maligned the good names of the decent, upstanding citizens—Vernon Hawthorne, the correspondence school lawyer who brands the honorable senators of the Florida State Legislature, crooks and grafters and thinks he is bigger than the governor.

The very name of Vernon Hawthorne has become nauseating in Miami. For eight years this petty, bootlicking shyster has posed as a paragon of virtue when in reality he has used the office of State's Attorney to further his own political gains and the gains of HIS BOSS, THE MIAMI DAILY NEWS.

Seven years ago Vernon Hawthorne STOLE THE GOOD NAME OF H. LESLIE QUIGG, the best chief of police Miami ever had. He dragged Quigg's name through the fifth and stime of political corruption because the Miami Daily News ordered him to do so. He broke the hearts of Leslie Quigg's children. HE ruined the life of a MAN. Vernon Hawthorne knew he couldn't convict Leslie Quigg of murder and that he was innocent. VERNON HAWTHORNE DIDN'T WANT A CONVICTION, HE WANTED TO STEAL LESLIE QUIGG'S GOOD NAME. For that Vernon Hawthorne IS A THIEF.

Three years ago Vernon Hawthorne walked into the Miami municipal courtroom and INTERCEDED FOR A MURDER SUSPECT WHOM HE LATER REFUSED TO EVEN INVESTIGATE. The murder suspect was A. R. Martine, operator of a shady bootleg joint on the Tamiami Trail at the juncture of the Monroe county line. HAWTHORNE INTERCEDED IN CITY COURT FOR MARTINE BECAUSE HE HAD USED MARTINE'S BAWDY HOUSE TO STAGE HIS OWN WILD CAROUSALS. Martine was arrested on a charge of driving an automobile while drunk. MARALS. Martine was arrested on a charge of driving an automobile while drunk. Martine was guilty but HAWTHORNE WAS AFRAID TO HAVE HIM GO TO JAIL FOR FEAR HE MIGHT DIVULGE DETAILS OF SOME OF HAWTHORNE'S WILD ORGIES. Hawthorne went into court and interceded in his behalf and succeeded in freeing him. Several months later a man was murdered in cold blood near Martine's slaughter house. Officials of Monroe county said the murder was committed in Dade county. HAWTHORNE REFUSED TO ACCEPT JURISDICTION AND THE CASE WAS DROPPED. For this Vernon Hawthorne IS A PROTECTOR OF MURDER SUSPECTS.

During the last general election the Miami Daily News wanted to keep Sheriff M. P. (Pop) Lehman from running for re-election. Vernon Hawthorne was given the order to "stop" him. Like a faithful puppet he put the wheels in operation and summoned his trusty grand jury. AN INDICTMENT CHARGING LEHMAN AND OTHERS WITH CONSPIRACY WAS RETURNED ON THE NINTH DAY OF APRIL, 1932. BUT WAS LEHMAN ARRESTED? HE WAS NOT. HE WAS TOLD THAT THE INDICTMENT HAD BEEN RETURNED BUT WOULD NOT BE SERVED UPON HIM IF HE WOULD CONSENT TO DROP OUT OF THE SHERIFF'S RACE. LEHMAN ANNOUNCED HIS CANDIDACY AND THE FOLLOWING DAY HE WAS ARRESTED. HAWTHORNE, BELIEVING THE PROTECTIVE POWER OF LITTLE TAMMANY WAS GREATER THAN THE ALMIGHTY HIMSELF, DIDN'T EVEN CHANGE THE TYPING ON THE ORIGINAL INDICTMENT BUT SIMPLY USED A PEN TO SCRATCH OUT THE DATE AND SUBSTITUTE ANOTHER. As a result of his vicious, venomous, malicious charges against Lehman another grave was filled—of his widow's heart was broken and another orphan's name was dragged in the mire. Mr. Hawthorne should have been awarded a medal for that.

Last winter Mayor Frank A. Katzentine, the most corrupt mayor Miami Beach has ever endured, was a candidate for re-election. The Miami Daily News and Little Tammany, controlling gambling interests on Miami Beach ORDERED HAWTHORNE TO THREATEN THE GAMBLING ELEMENT AND WHIP THEM INTO LINE. From Hawthorne's office word was passed that all gambling would be closed IF KATZENTINE WASN'T RE-ELECTED. He wasn't re-elected and Gambling was stopped immediately BY HAWTHORNE.

Still smarting over the defeat of Katzentine the Daily News ordered its puppet to proceed further and persecute the gamblers who were known to have helped whip Katzentine at the polls. Hawthorne waded in with his grand jury, despoiling the good names of all who met with his disfavor but very silyciously protecting GAMBLERS, CROOKS AND CORRUPT OFFICIALS IN GOOD STANDING WITH LITTLE TAMMANY.

When crooked trails started leading to the doors of Little Tammany henchmen HAWTHORNE DELIBERATELY IMMUNIZED THEM BY SUBPOENAING THEM TO APPEAR AS WITNESSES BEFORE THE GRAND JURY. Vernon Hawthorne, as well as everyone else in Dade county, knew that Mayor Katzentine was protecting certain gambling houses and that Chief of Police Robert Tenney and Mike Dallet, a general handy man for the Daily News were parts of the gambling ring. Vernon Hawthorne also knew that Ira's Supper Club, a notorious place operated by Leo Levy, was operating and that crooked dice were being used to fleece suckers. HE DIDN'T KNOW IT HE SHOULD HAVE KNOWN IT BECAUSE THE FACTS WERE PUBLISHED IN MIAMI LIFE IN BOXCAR TYPE.

Hawthorne subpoenaed Katzentine, Tenney and Dallet to appear before the grand jury to IMMUNIZE THEM AND KEEP THEM FROM BEING INDICTED FROM EVIDENCE GIVEN BY OTHER WITNESSES. Any one of the three could have given ample and sufficient evidence to indict the other two but HAWTHORNE, THE CROOK, DIDN'T WANT THEM INDICTED. As a matter of fact CHIEF TEANFY WAS INDICTED ON A CHARGE OF PERJURY. THE INDICTMENT WAS UNANIMOUS BUT HAWTHORNE REFUSED TO RETURN IT FOR A WARRANT on honest state's attorney would have returned that indictment.

During his eight years as persecutor Hawthorne has INDICTED MORE THAN THIRTY DADE COUNTY OFFICIALS, ALL ANTI-DAILY NEWS, AND NEVER HAS HE EVEN ATTEMPTED TO INDICT A FRIEND OF LITTLE TAMMANY. BUT HAS FAILED TO CONVICT A SINGLE ONE OF THEM WITHOUT HAVING THEIR CASES REVERSED BY THE SUPREME COURT. He has jeopardized the good names of more than 100 innocent persons with his malicious, vindictive indictments. His attempted persecution of Senator Hayes Lewis was a personal matter and LEWIS WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN INDICTED IF HE HAD BEEN WILLING TO ARGAIN WITH THE SHYSTER STATE'S ATTORNEY.

**Drove Honest Men to Suicide Graves; Chained  
Defenseless Men to Iron Cells And  
Took Orders From Politicians**

**D**URING the last campaign Hawthorne neglected the duties of his own office to take the stump for Little Tammany candidates for the state legislature. In the heat of the campaign he went off half cocked and branded a majority of the state senators "crooks" and "grafters." He knew ONE MINUTE AFTER HE HAD MADE THE FOUL AND DISHONORABLEST ACCUSATION THAT HE HAD COMMITTED POLITICAL SUICIDE AND HE SOUGHT TO BOOTLICK HIS WAY BACK INTO THEIR GOOD GRACES. HAWTHORNE AROSE FROM A SICK BED AND WENT TO A DOWNTOWN HOTEL TO WHIMPER AT THE FEET OF SENATOR HAYES LEWIS AND ATTEMPT TO HAVE SENATOR LEWIS INTERCEDE FOR HIM WITH THE IRATE SENATORS WHOM HE KNEW WOULD REFUSE, AND MOST JUSTLY REFUSE, TO CONFIRM HIS APPOINTMENT FOR ANOTHER TERM. LEWIS REFUSED TO BARGAIN WITH THE CREEPING, WHIMPERING VIPER AND AS A RESULT WAS INDICTED IN A CHILDISH ATTEMPT BY HAWTHORNE TO GET EVEN.

Vernon Hawthorne gained a bad name for South Florida by having it mentioned unfavorably in the famous Wickershaw report. Fred Dieterle was arrested two years ago on a charge of murder in the death of Ollie Glass. He was arrested AND CHAINED TO THE FLOOR OF A BEDLESS, MOSQUITO INFESTED CELL WHERE HE WAS KEPT ALL NIGHT. The following morning, without breakfast and without being permitted to even wash his face, he was taken to the inquisition chambers of N. VERNON HAWTHORNE WHERE HE WAS QUESTIONED UNMERCIFULLY UNTIL AFTERNOON. THE SCALP OF THE DEAD WOMAN WAS THROWN IN HIS FACE AND EVERY KNOWN ARTIFICE WAS USED TO TRY TO FORCE A CONFESSION FROM HIS LIPS. A statement was obtained at last and introduced against him when the case came to trial. The following excerpt is taken verbatim from the Supreme Court's decision where the case was taken on appeal:

Dieterle vs. State; Southern Reporter, 124 Page 47: "If the statements alleged to have been made by the defendant during the course of examination by officials prior to the time he was taken out of the room where Ollie Glass died were freely and voluntarily made then we labor under a mis-apprehension as to the meaning of the word" THE CASE WAS REVERSED, ANOTHER MALICIOUS PERSECUTION OF VERNON HAWTHORNE'S AVENGED BY AN INNOCENT MAN WHO WALKED OUT OF THE PENITENTIARY FREE.

Vernon Hawthorne wears a medal awarded him for meritorious service—the biggest piece of brass in Florida. He received the medal for prosecuting William Lancaster charged with the murder of Hayden Clark and for his "vigorous and prompt action" in the case of Guiseppe Zangara, the Italian with a stomach ache who killed Mayor Cerniak of Chicago. In the Lancaster case Hawthorne was provided with enough evidence to convict ten men but LANCASTER WAS ACQUITTED. Why was Lancaster acquitted? HE WAS DEFENDED BY JIM CARSON, FRIEND OF THE THORNE'S. A CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL LAWYER COULD HAVE CONVICTED LANCASTER AS COULD HAWTHORNE HAD HE REALLY WANTED TO.

Zangara plead guilty and not only admitted his murder but begged to be electrocuted and FOR THIS VERNON HAWTHORNE WAS AWARDED A MEDAL.

This is the same VERNON HAWTHORNE WHO WILL STAND IN BAYFRONT PARK TONIGHT TO POSE AS A MARTYR FOR THE UNINFORMED. THIS IS THE SAME VERNON HAWTHORNE WHO HAS KEPT DADE COUNTY IN A CONTINUAL STATE OF CHAOS FOR EIGHT YEARS WHILE HE HARKENED TO THE VOICE OF HIS MASTER AND POSED AS A PARAGON OF VIRTUE WHILE HE PLUNDERED, ROBBED AND CONNIVED WITH CROOKS TO DEFEAT THE JUSTICE WHICH HE SO MOCKINGLY PRETENDED TO HONOR. GOVERNOR SHOLTZ EREED IN REMOVING HAWTHORNE FROM OFFICE LAST WEEK—HE SHOULD HAVE THROWN THE SLINKING, BOOTLICKING, SHYSTER OUT OF OFFICE THE DAY HE ASSUMED THE GOVERNORSHIP OF FLORIDA.

The poor mis-guided fools who have arisen in Hawthorne's defense are being deftly guided by the Miami Daily News and many of them through sheer ignorance actually believe that Hawthorne is a martyr. For those persons we have no criticism, but deep sympathy for their gullibility, and for their enlightenment we dare to tell the truth, and here is the truth:

VERNON HAWTHORNE KNEW MANY MONTHS AGO THAT HE WOULD NOT BE CONFIRMED BY THE SENATE. HE KNEW THAT HE WAS THROUGH IN DADE COUNTY AND TURNED HIS EYES TO THE GUBERNATORIAL MANSION IN TALLAHASSEE. HE KNEW THAT HIS OWN FEEBLE, TWISTED BRAIN WOULD NEVER LAND HIM THERE AND HE DELIBERATELY STARTED A CAMPAIGN FROM HIS NARROW PERSPECTIVE HE BELIEVED WOULD MAKE HIM A MARTYR AND GAIN VOTES FOR HIM FROM AN UNINFORMED PUBLIC.

HE VICIOUSLY AND MALICIOUSLY BROUGHT ABOUT THE INDICTMENTS OF A SENATOR AND A SENATOR'S SON IN ORDER THAT HE MIGHT LATER SAY HIS NON-CONFIRMATION WAS ENGINEERED BY THOSE TWO TO GET EVEN WITH HIM FOR ATTEMPTING TO CARRY OUT JUSTICE. AT THE SAME TIME AND WHILE AVOWING LOYALTY TO GOVERNOR SHOLTZ HE WAS DELIBERATELY STABBING THE STATE'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE IN THE BACK AND SETTING THE STAGE TO MAKE GOVERNOR SHOLTZ THE GOAT WHEN THE BLOW-OFF CAME. HAWTHORNE SAW TO IT THAT HIS NAME WAS INCLUDED AMONG THE GUBERNATORIAL CANDIDATES AT THE ANNUAL WAUCHULA POLITICAL PICNIC THREE WEEKS AGO BUT SANE MEN ONLY LAUGHED AT THE SUBTERFUGE AND WERE NOT FOOLED BY THE ULTERIOR MOTIVE BEHIND THE WHOLE CROOKED PIECE OF POLITICAL MANIPULATION.

THIS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, IS THE VERNON HAWTHORNE WHO REFUSED TO OBEY AN ORDER FROM GOVERNOR SHOLTZ WITH A WHINE ABOUT BEING NEEDED AT HOME. HE WASN'T NEEDED AT HOME, EVIDENTLY WHEN THE SENATE GOT READY TO THROW HIM OUT BECAUSE HE BURNED OUT ALL HIS BEARINGS RUSHING TO TALLAHASSEE TO FURTHER HIS CROOKED SCHEME TO MAKE A MARTYR OF HIMSELF. MIAMI LIFE OFFERS NO APOLOGIES FOR THIS STRAIGHT FROM THE SHOULDER EXPOSE OF SOUTH FLORIDA'S BIGGEST LOUSE.
