## Widener and Bradley Grab Tropical Park

### Will Fight Desperately To Cram "40%" Bill Down Throats Of Miami Business Men

THE death grip already held on Dade county by J. E. (Sportsman?) Widener and his band of thieving snow birds, has been tightened and unless we act immediately we may as well resign ourselves to fate and prepare to part with the last vital drop of life blood because it is inevitable that it will be squeezed out of us before another Easter rolls around.

Widener, the mountebank of Philadelphia, who forced poor old Joe Smoot into bankruptcy in order that he might get his greedy hooks on the Hialeah racing plant and Col. E. R. Bradley whose crooked gambling casino at Palm Beach pours hundreds of thousands of blood dollars into the hands of grafting officials annually for "protection" have combined forces and have taken over Tropical Park.

Bill Dwyer, who once thought he could whip the Widener influence and the power of the Widener dollars, has given up the ghost and is now meditating upon his folly. Tropical Park, lock stock and barrel, fell into the hands of Widener and Bradley last Thursday for a mere pittance and as soon as they finish paying Dwyer's delinquent bills for the 1934-1935 season they will start work in earnest to strangle the last drop of life blood from the citizenry of Dade county.

Now that the cat is out of the bag everything becomes remarkably clear. It is easy to understand now why Dwyer has been tossed about like a leaf on a turbulent sea by the State Racing Commission in the matter of racing dates. Dwyer got the crumbs and Widener and Hialeah got the cream.

It doesn't take a clairvoyant to explain who is behind the sickening attempt to squeeze a bill through the present legislature requiring 40 per cent of the registered voters to sign a petition to bring about a referendum on continuation or elimination of racing permits.

A ten-year-old child can readily understand the pressure which has been brought to bear to prevent the enactment of a measure giving "breakage" from race tracks to the old-age pension fund instead of permitting it to continue to remain in the hands of track owners.

The full page advertisements inserted by "A Friend of Racing," which have been appearing in two of Miami's daily newspapers for the last few weeks to the tune of \$400 or \$500 weekly, likewise become clarified. They are the handiwork of Messrs Widener and Bradley because the dog track owners are too greedy to part with that many dollars for advertising, especially when such good "sportsmen" as Widener and Bradley are willing to pay the bills.

**CITIZENS OF DADE COUNTY YOU ARE FACING A CRISIS. WHERE AMONG YOU IS THERE A LEADER BRAVE ENOUGH TO TAKE UP THE FIGHT AGAINST A MENACE WHICH, IF UNCURBED FOR ANOTHER TWELVE MONTHS, WILL TOTALLY BANKRUPT DADE COUNTY?**

Right now there is a bill pending in the legislature proposing the signature of 40 PERCENT OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS TO BRING ABOUT A REFERENDUM FOR CANCELING PERMITS OF RACE TRACKS OR FOR A VOTE TO GRANT ADDITIONAL PERMITS. Such a measure, if adopted, sounds the death knell for Miami business. IT MEANS THAT RACING CAN NEVER BE VOTED OUT OF DADE COUNTY BECAUSE IT IS PRACTICALLY IMPOSSIBLE TO PROCURE, THROUGH CIRCULATION OF PETITIONS, THE SIGNATURES OF 40 PER CENT OF REGISTERED VOTERS. THERE ARE PERIODS DURING THE YEAR WHEN THERE AREN'T 40 PER CENT OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS IN DADE COUNTY.

At this same moment there is another bill before the legislature which proposes diverting "breakage" from the track owners to the old age pension fund or the state publicity fund. This breakage now goes to the track operators AND THEY WILL FIGHT TO THE BITTER DEATH TO KEEP IT BECAUSE IT AMOUNTS TO THOUSANDS AND THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS. The state law now provides that 11 per cent shall be taken out of each dollar and likewise sets the "breakage" on the dime. FEW PERSONS FULLY REALIZE THE SINISTER EXTENT OF THIS LEGALIZED ROBBERY BUT MAY PAUSE TO MEDITATE WHEN THEY DISCOVER THAT SUCH A SYSTEM, IN MANY INSTANCES, PERMITS THE TRACK OPERATORS TO RETAIN 40.8 CENTS OUT OF EACH \$2 WAGER MADE AT A PARI-MUTUEL WINDOW. The holder of a winning ticket on a horse or dog which should pay off, according to the actual computation of the amount wagered by all betters, \$4.08 ACTUALLY RECEIVES \$4.00 BECAUSE THE TRACKS COMPUTE

THEIR FIGURES ON ONE DOLLAR INSTEAD OF TWO. AWAKEN VOTERS OF DADE COUNTY, BEFORE MESSRS. WIDENER AND BRADLEY HARPOON YOU. IF THEY AREN'T STOPPED THEY WILL PASS THE BILL REQUIRING 40 OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AND THEY WILL DEFEAT THE "BREAKAGE" BILL. THEY WILL EXTEND THEIR RACING DATES AND THE DOG TRACKS WILL LIKEWISE EXTEND THEIR DATES UNTIL WE HAVE RACING EVERY NIGHT IN THE YEAR.

A BILL IS NOW PENDING TO LENGTHEN THE DOG RACING SEASON BUT DADE COUNTY DOESN'T WANT ANY DOG RACING AT ALL. IF WE MUST HAVE HORSE RACING, FOUR DAYS EACH WEEK IS SUFFICIENT. MIAMI LIFE IS ZEALOUS OF THE WELFARE OF THE CITY OF MIAMI AND THE BILL REQUIRING 40 PER CENT OF THE REGISTERED VOTE MUST NOT PASS!

If it should pass, due to the influence and money of race track moguls, MIAMI LIFE PROMISES—THAT THERE SHALL BE NO GAMBLING OF ANY KIND IN MIAMI NEXT WINTER. ## Virtuous Vernon's Questionable Activities May Be Probed By Grand Jury: Tool Of Daily News Has Many Questions To Answer

VIRTUOUS VERNON HAWTHORNE the most obnoxious hypocrite who ever inflicted himself upon a decent community is trying to bluff it out. Virtuous Vernon, the shyster who used the sacred cloak of the State's Attorney office for years to cover up his crooked manipulations with grafting officials and gamblers; took orders from the Miami Daily News; knowingly permitted friends of the Miami Daily News to violate the law while he maliciously persecuted its enemies as well as his own personal enemies and finally wound up his inglorious career trying to hide behind a woman's skirts is not only trying to bluff it out but actually has the gall to pretend that he is out looking for trouble.

VIRTUOUS VERNON WON'T HAVE TO LOOK VERY FAR BECAUSE AT THIS MOMENT TROUBLE IS RIGHT AT VIRTUOUS VERNON'S DOOR AND THE GRAND JURY, THAT GRAND AND GLORIOUS OLD WEAPON WHICH VIRTUOUS VERNON USED FOR YEARS ON HIS ENEMIES, WILL BE THE FRANKENSTEIN WHICH DESTROYS HIM.

Last Saturday night when Virtuous Vernon was introduced in Bayfront Park by some addle-pated speaker as "Florida's next Governor," he swelled up like a poisoned pup and waved the gold medal he received for prosecuting an Italian with the bellyache who not only confessed his crime but cried for the electric chair. Virtuous Vernon arose to great oratorical heights AND TRIED TO TELL THE BORED AUDIENCE THAT HE WAS REMOVED FROM OFFICE BY GOVERNOR SHOLTZ BECAUSE GOVERNOR SHOLTZ WAS AFRAID TO LET HIM REMAIN IN OFFICE DURING THE PRESENT SESSION OF THE GRAND JURY BECAUSE THE GOVERNOR WAS AFRAID OF WHAT MIGHT HAPPEN.

GOVERNOR SHOLTZ DOES NOT FEAR A DADE COUNTY GRAND JURY NEARLY AS MUCH AS VIRTUOUS VERNON WHO HAS PLENTY OF REASON TO FEAR ONE, AND AS THE MUDDLED AFFAIRS OF THE OFFICE FROM WHICH HE WAS UN CEREMONIOUSLY KICKED ARE STRAIGHTENED OUT HE WILL HAVE MORE REASON.

That, ladies and gentlemen, was what Virtuous Vernon told the audience but that, ladies and gentlemen, was a lie. VIRTUOUS VERNON FOUGHT DESPERATELY TO STEER THE GRAND JURY BECAUSE HE WANTED TO STEER IT AWAY FROM THE SHADY TRANSACTIONS OF VIRTUOUS VERNON HIMSELF AND THE CONDEMNING RECORDS WHICH WILL INEVITABLY FALL INTO THE HANDS OF HIS SUCCESSOR. Here are but a few of the many questionable acts of Virtuous Vernon which SHOULD BE INVESTIGATED BY THE GRAND JURY:

On Sunday morning, March 3, 1929, Nora Wilson, former "Follies" beauty, was found dead in room 315 of the Patricia hotel. She had been shot in the right temple and had been dead twelve hours when the body was found.

Dick Newcomb, justice of the peace and his constable Elmer Kennedy, assisted by George Bing, investigator for Virtuous Vernon, viewed the body AND UNANIMOUSLY AGREED THAT IT WAS A PLAIN CASE OF MURDER. NO POWDER BURNS WERE FOUND ON THE WOUND.

The investigation pointed toward Guy Loomis, millionaire yachtsman and owner of the palatial yacht Nadine. It developed that Nora Wilson had been employed by Loomis as a housekeeper and strong evidence was uncovered to prove that she had been more than a housekeeper.

An attempt to question Loomis resulted in failure until the following Tuesday when he voluntarily left the yacht and appeared at the inquest. Richard Hunt, Virtuous Vernon's assistant state's attorney represented his boss at the inquest which turned out to be one of the most unusual inquests ever conducted in Miami.

LOOMIS APPEARED WITH A. FRANK KATZENTINE, BOSOM PAL OF VIRTUOUS VERNON, WHO HAD BEEN PAID THE INSIGNIFICANT RETAINER FEE OF \$7,500 FOR REPRESENTING A MAN WHO WASN'T CHARGED WITH ANYTHING.

Evidence was introduced to show that on a previous occasion Loomis had struck Nora Wilson and that SIX STITCHES WERE REQUIRED TO SEW UP HER WOUNDS. MORE EVIDENCE WAS INTRODUCED TO PROVE THAT ONLY A FEW DAYS BEFORE THE WILSON WOMAN HAD FILED SUIT AGAINST LOOMIS FOR \$25,000. MORE EVIDENCE PROVED THAT LOOMIS HAD VISITED HER IN HER HOTEL ROOM.

Then—JUSTICE OF THE PEACE NEWCOMB STARTED TALKING TO THE JURORS. HE TALKED FOR 30 MINUTES TELLING THEM THAT NORA WILSON HAD COMMITTED SUICIDE. HE VIRTUALLY ORDERED THEM TO BRING IN A VERDICT OF SUICIDE AND VIRTUOUS VERNON, STATE'S ATTORNEY OF DADE COUNTY, LET HIM GET AWAY WITH IT. DR. E. C. THOMAS, ONE OF THE MOST REPUTABLE PHYSICIANS IN FLORIDA, TESTIFIED THAT THE REVOLVER WHICH KILLED NORA WILSON WAS HELD AT LEAST 18 INCHES FROM HER HEAD WHEN THE TRIGGER WAS PULLED AND THAT IT MIGHT HAVE BEEN FIRED FROM A DISTANCE OF 20 FEET.

The grand jury retired to bring in its verdict AND WHILE THE JURY WAS STILL OUT NEWCOMB ISSUED AN ORDER THAT THE REVOLVER, HELD IN EVIDENCE, BE DESTROYED. The verdict was suicide AND LOOMIS IN A BIG HEARTED WAY OFFERED TO PAY NORA WILSON'S FUNERAL EXPENSES. MILLIONAIRES AREN'T SEEN IN COURT EVERY DAY AND A DOLLAR IS A DOLLAR.

NEXT—Once upon a time there was a concern in Miami known as the Dade County Security Company. It dealt in millions and eventually went haywire. Considerable excitement prevailed and there was talk, and more talk. AN OFFICIAL OF THE DADE COUNTY SECURITY COMPANY WENT TO VIPEROS VERNON AND INFORMED HIM THAT AN ATTACHE OF THE STATE'S ATTORNEY OFFICE WAS TRYING TO SHAKE THE DADE COUNTY SECURITY COMPANY DOWN UNDER THREAT OF GRAND JURY INDICTMENT.

VINDICTIVE VERNON said he didn't believe the accusation and wouldn't believe it until he heard it with his own ears. VENEMOUS VERNON INSTALLED A DICTAPHONE IN THE ROOM WHERE THE ATTACHE WAS TO MEET AN OFFICIAL OF THE SECURITY COMPANY TO NEGOTIATE FOR THE SHAKEDOWN AND LISTENED IN ON THE OTHER END OF THE LINE AND HEARD THE WHOLE TRANSACTION. WHEN IT WAS ALL OVER WHAT DID HE DO?

HE GAVE THE ATTACHE A LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION, FIRED HIM AND WHITEWASHED THE WHOLE MATTER. WHY DIDN'T VIRTUOUS VERNON HAVE THE CROOKED ATTACHE INDICTED AND PROSECUTED?

NEXT—On the morning of February 9, 1932, Juanita Kempton, 25, and exceedingly pretty, jumped into a taxicab driven by S. Seliger and drove to a Miami Avenue pawnshop where she purchased an automatic revolver. She drove back to the Principia Apartments, 45 S.E. Second Street, where she was living with R. O. (Pete) Allison, small time badger game worker. Rushing into the apartment she found Allison's back turned and proceeded to pump seven bullets into the defenseless man. She was promptly arrested and held for murder. DURING THE MONTHS WHICH WAS FOLLOWED, JUANITA STILL AS PRETTY AS EVER, WAS QUESTIONED SEVERAL TIMES BY VARLET VERNON. JUANITA IS SAID TO HAVE MADE QUITE AN IMPRESSION ON VACUM VERNON BECAUSE WHEN THE GRAND JURY OF MAY 9 FINALLY RETURNED ITS INDICTMENTS THERE WASN'T ONE FOR JUANITA AND SHE WALKED OUT A FREE WOMAN. IF HER ACT WASN'T COLD BLOODED, PREMEDITATED MURDER, THERE IS NO SUCH THING, BUT A PRETTY WOMAN IS ALWAYS A PRETTY WOMAN.

NEXT—Every male citizen in Dade county, INCLUDING VAINGLORIOUS VERNON KNOWS THAT THE HIALEAH RACE TRACK WAS OPERATED ILLEGALLY IN 1931. ALMOST EVERYONE IN FLORIDA KNOWS THAT OPERATORS OF THE TRACK KICKED IN THE STAGGERING SUM OF \$103,000 FOR THE PRIVILEGE. IF VEHEMENT VERNON DIDN'T GET HIS BIT WHY DIDN'T HE FIND OUT WHO DID GET IT AND INDICT THEM?

LAST, but not least, the stench of the Lancaster case and the friendship between Vermin Vernon and Jim Carson, attorney for the Daily News and likewise attorney for Lancaster who was acquitted on a murder charge despite the damning evidence available to Vile Vernon. Who is this Carson besides being the fellow who stopped racing in 1928 in order to bankrupt poor old Joe Smoot and throw control of the Hialeah track into the paws of Widener?

Right now he appears to be a successful lawyer carrying out the dictates of his boss, The Miami Daily News, and speaking a good word now and then for his friend, Viper Vernon. On Wednesday, December 15, 1926, he was PLAINTIFF IN A SUIT FOR CUSTODY OF HIS OWN DAUGHTER IN CIVIL COURT FOR THE PARISH OF NEW ORLEANS IN LOUISIANA.

Carson, it seems, married a refined New Orleans girl and became the father of a daughter. He deserted both wife and child and re-married. A few years later his first wife was killed in an accident and left nearly \$100,000 insurance to (Continued on Page Two)

the minor child. CARSON WENT INTO COURT TO GAIN CUSTODY OF THE CHILD AND MONEY.

"I find that this child, now in the care of her grandparents, is surrounded by everything that can tend to physical comfort, mental development, and with every reason to believe that she will be raised in traditions of honesty, character and just pride in her maternal ancestry.

"What have I on the other side? The father, I am shown by the words out of his own mouth, and without giving any justification, if such thing can be justified, THREW THIS WIFE AND THIS CHILD OUT OF HIS HOME, drove them forth, bought them tickets, put them on a train and sent them to the father and mother of the wife. There he cut himself off from the child.

"Now who is he as shown by the testimony before me? He is shown to be A NOTORIOUS DRUNKARD. The claim is that he is now reformed. It is shown to me that he is, as one of the witnesses says in this case, WITHOUT HONOR. Cases of breach of faith of the LOWEST AND WORST FORM, the pecuniary breach of faith, ACTS OF EMBEZZLEMENT, COMMITTED BY A MEMBER OF A PROFESSION WHO SHOULD BE WHITE ROBED MINISTERS IN THE TEMPLE OF JUSTICE.

"I find too, that he is heavily in debt; that among these debts is at least one ARISING FROM EMBEZZLEMENT. I find that HE WAS SAVED FROM DISBARMENT, PERHAPS FROM THE PENITENTIARY by lawyers of the bar raising a purse of \$1,000 and paying money which he received for a client. IT IS IMPOSSIBLE FOR ME TO THINK SO BADLY OF THE BAR OF FLORIDA OR PEOPLE OF FLORIDA THAT THIS MAN CAN BE HELD IN HONOR OR ESTEEM. I REFUSE TO BELIEVE IT."

Custody of the child was denied Carson, and he returned to Miami to counsel the Daily News and his friend, Vociferous Vernon.
