She was married to a Mr. William Bourne but may have continued to use her maiden name in practice or business. Altho she is said to have been associated with F.A. Gowdy, M.D., Mr. Hobbs has no knowledge of either Gowdy or the Biltmore Hospital.

HODSDON, Benjamin Franklin, M.D.

"Benjamine Franklin Hodsdon, well known specialist in diseases of the eye, ear nose and throat was born December 29th, 1865, in Berwick, Maine, and has practiced in Miami since 1911. He is probably the best known member of his profession in Florida. On the paternal side Dr. Hodsdon is of English ancestry and of old New England stock, members of his family having resided in Maine for many generations. In spite of this, however, the father was a southern sympathizer during the Civil War. His mother was Miss Eliza Butler, wh was born at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, and was also of English extraction. Both of his parents have passed away.

"Dr. Hodsdon was reared in his parents' home in Berwick, Me., and acquired his education in the public schools. After completing the regular course he went to Dover, New Hampshire, where he taught school for a few years later entering the medical department of Bowdoin College, from which he received

"Dr. H. C. Hood was born in the piney woods of Northwest Pennsylvania, March 16th, 1855. After several year of mature and deliberate consideration, at the age of five year he concluded to go West to grow up with the country and, taking his parents with him, he moved to a village in Allen county, near ft. Wayne, Ind., where he resided a number of years. At the age of 19 he entered Adrian College, Adrian, Mich. He taught school during two sessions and at 24 graduated. After teaching a year he entered the Long Island Medical College at Brooklyn, N.Y. from which he graduated in 1883; after spending a year in post graduate medical work, he located to practice his profession at Wichita, Kan., where he remained until 1891, ~~where~~ He was married to Miss Breksford of Palm Beach in 1889, and is the proud and doting father of two lovely daughters. In 1891 he removed to Knoxville, Tenr and from there to Palm Beach in 1893, where he has since



prospered. During his residence at Knoxville he was appointed to the faculty of the Tennessee Medical College as professor of materia medica and medical botany, which position he resigned when he removed to Palm Beach. Besides his practice which is a very lucreative one, Dr. Hood is largely interested in orange culture, being the owner of a very valuable 1200 tree grove.

Also in this collection on pages 26-7 is a brief biographical sketch from the Palm Beach Timse about 1924 which states he was the "second practicing physician to locate in the county", that he located at Palm Beach, and that he came from a "northwestern state." No other information provided.

Apparently the Palm Beach Timse article was taken word for word from the Business ~~Guide~~ Directory, Guide and History of Dade County.

Hood, H. C., M. D.

Issued a license to practice medicine by the County Judge and Tax Collector of Dade County for the year beginning October 1, 1903. The price was \$10.00 for the state license and \$5.00 for the county license.
