HODSDON, Benjamin Franklin, M.D.

"Benjameine Franklin Hodsdon, well known specialist in diseases of the eye, ear nose and throat was born December 29th, 1865, in Berwick, Maine, and has practiced in Miami since 1911. He is probably the best known member of his profession in Florida. On the paternal side Dr. Hodsdon is of English ancestry and of old New England stock, members of his family having resided in Maine for many generations. In spite of this, however, the father was a southern sympathizer during the Cival War. His mother was Miss Eliza Butler, wh was born at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, and was also of English extaraction. Both of his parents have passed away.

"Dr. Hodsdon was reared in his parents' home in Berwick, Me., and acquided his education in the public schools. After completing the regular course he went to Dover, New Hampshire, where he thought school for a few years later entering the medical department of Bowdoin College, from which he received

his degree of M.D. in 1897. He graduated from the University of Illinois in 1908 (Physicians and Surgeons, Chicago.) He took the following postgraduate courses: New York Post-Graduate, & 1900 and 1916: New York Polyclinic, 1902 and 1903; Chicago Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat College, 1905; Chicago Post-Graduate, 1905; Chicago Polyclinic, 1905; Illinois Elector Therapeutic College, 1905; and New Orleans Polyclinic, 1912. "He was house surgeon at the Chicago Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital in 1906 and in 1907 for the Illinois Charitable Eye and Ear Infirmary. He practiced Medicine and Surgery at xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx Manchester, N.H., from 1897 to 1905. He was assistant surgeon of the Sarker Sacred Heart, Notre Dame and Elliot Hospitals (of Manchester, N.H.). After completing his postgraduate work and hospital service he practiced specialty in Chicago until 1911, during which time he served as assistant surge n of the Illinios Charitable Ear and Eye Infirmary and the Dispensary of Rush Medical College. Then on March 3rd, 1911, he began practice in Miami, which has proved remarkable successful. "He is a member of the Miami Rotary Club, the Baptist Church , the American Medical Association, Southern Medical Association, American Academy of Ophthalmo-Oto-Laryngol Society and the

Dade County Medical Society. He is also occulist and aurist for the East Coast Railroad Company and occulist and aurist on the staff of the Miami City Hospital.

"Dr. H. C. Hood was born in the piney woods of Northweste Pennsylvania, Marhe 16th, 1855. After several year of ma ure and deliberate consideration, at the age of five year he concluded to go West to grow up with the country and. taking his parents with him. he moved to a village in Allen county, near ft. Wayne. Ind., where he resided a number of years. At the age of 19 he entered Adrian College, Adrian. Mich. He taught school during two sessions and at 24 graduated. After teaching a year he entered the Long Island Medical College at Brooklyn. N.V. from which he graduated in 1883; after spending a year in post graduate medical work, he located to practice his profession at Wichita, Kan., where he remained until 1891, wherex He was married to Miss Breksford of Palm Beach in 1889, and is the proud and doting father of two lovely daughters. In 1891 he removed to Knoxville, Tenr and from there to Palm Beach in 1893, where he has since

prospered. During his residence at Knoxville he was appointed to the faculty of the Tennessee Medical College as professor of materia medica and medical botany, which position he resigned when he removed to Palm Beach. Besides his practice which is a very lucreative one, Dr. Hood is largely interested in orange culture, being the owner of a very valuable 1200 tree grove.
