This is a news article stating that Dr. J.N. MacGonigle, superintendent of the Miami Water Works Company, had just returned from a trip to New York where he bought a new pump for the Miami Water Works which would pump 3 million gallons daily. This coupled with the one already in use would bring the capacity to 5 million gallons a day or more. This article does not state that MacGonigle was an M.D. and the name is spelled a little bit differently than the name I have in my file on MacGonigle already.

"Dr. W. H. Maynard of New York City," came up from Key Largo, yesterday where he has been visiting for several weeks. — — — he change this place and she has another first class physician, ~~to~~ to look after the health of her people. — — —

In the Sept 12th issue (Vol 7[#] 18, p 5, Miami
Mince meat), it states that he has opened an
office in the Hatchett Building, purchased
the hwy residence on 11th street "where he
may be found when not @ his office."

His ad first appears in a separate column entitled
"The Professors" on p 8 of Sept 19, 1902 edition (Vol 7[#] 19)
In the next issue it appears with the other physicians
names on p 3.

Gay Giddy Dr. Maynard

Has only Three Wives and There is Another
Woman in the Case

Apparently, Maynard (W.H.) had returned to NYC
where he was in marital difficulties - bigamy
States "Dr. Maynard resided here about four
months, when he left rather suddenly.
He was a man of very pleasing manners and

his conduct while here was that of a gentleman, although perhaps a little erratic. He purchased the Prout cottage on 11th Street, but for some reason failed to make good."

"Dr. A. Leight Monroe Off For Philadelphia"

"Dr. A. Leight Monroe left on last evening's train for Philadelphia where he will attend the National Convention of Omeopathists.

Dr. Monroe ranks with the highest in the profession, and during his attendance at the convention much honor will be done him. Before coming to Miami Dr. Monroe was professor of materia medica in the college of homeopathy at Louisville and he is quoted as an authority by all of his colleagues. Dr. Monroe has written numbers of treatises on various subjects, which are not only highly regarded in this country but have been translated into German.

Miami is gratified at the honors done Dr. Monroe"

"Miami Man Honored in Philadelphia"

This article states that Dr. A. Leight Monroe was unanimously chosen as president of the alumni association of the Honoman (?) Medical College in Philadelphia, his alma mater. "He remarked after his election that nine had always been his lucky number: graduated in 79, married on the 9th day of the 9th month of 89, and has 9 children and came a 29 hour journey to receive this honor in 09."

A. Leight Monroe

March 3, 1910

"A. Leight Monroe Succeeds W.W. Ferris on School Board"

The article states that Dr. A. Leight Monroe today received his commission to fill the unexpired term of Dr. W.W. Ferris as president of the Board of Public Instruction of Dade County. "He is a native Kentuckian, and was graduated from Hahnemann Medical College at Philadelphia in 1879. For two years he had a chair in the Pulte Medical College at Cincinnati and for 14 years was dean and professor of materia medica of a southwestern medical college at Louisville. In 1883 he visited the foremost European hospitals, and returned to Louisville, where he engaged in the practice of medicine, for 22 years, during which time he sustained his connection with the southwestern college. He has been in Miami 3 years and established himself staunchly here in professional and social circles..."

Dr. Mullett Milk Inspector

"Field Inspector Wants Blue Milk Specimens"

"Dr. J.H.F. Mullet desires all who have milk in their possession at any time, which gives out a bluish tint, to please save sufficient of the milk to make a test. This milk is not dangerous to drink, but contains substances which the inspector would like to test."

Mullet was appointed Food Inspector for the ~~xxx~~ city by the City Council in 1909 - see 21st Ann. Rept. Fla. State Brd. Health in manuscript file "D" for Dade County.

Dr. Mullett Resigns as City Physician June 13, 1911

In an article about the city assuming the control of the Friendly Society Hospital mention is made that Dr. Mullett had been the city physician but had turned in his resignation during the previous meeting of the council and that the council had appointed Dr. J.L. North to succeed him.
