"According to E. Ashby Hammond, a noted historian of medical practitioners in Florida, the first Gainesville physician was Dr. William H. Babcock (see Table I) who moved to the Gainesville area in 1852 and began practice in 1854 (the town was created that same year)" Barrow notes a record book of Babcock's in the P.K. Yonge Library of Florida History with entries from 1854 to 1858 illustrating his mode of practice.

Notes that he graduated from the Medical College of South Carolina in 1852 and that he lived 1827-1888.

In the Baldwin Letterbooks are repeated mentions of H. S. Bacon or H. S. Baron. The handwriting of the Letterbooks is often difficult to decipher. Once on May 3, 1865, it is clearly spelled "Baron" but at other times it appears, "Baran" and "Bacon." The initials are sometimes H.A. and othertimes H. S. All in all I think these are one and the same man although I suppose there could be two of very similar name.

Acknowledges receipt of Bacon's "resignation application" and states that he has no authority to act upon it and is unlikely he can get it to the Surg. Genl. for action within the 30 days requested. He cannot authorize turning over the hospital (at Tallahassee) to Surgeon Eppes.

Grants Bacon 30 days leave and orders him to turn over the hospital (Tallahassee) to Surgeon Eppes.

N.B.: Sometimes Baldwin seems to spell "Baron" but the initials are the same and I think "Bacon" is correct.

not practice medicine in and around Stuart.

In the above box are several pages out of a ledger belonging to Dr. James B. Bailey among which the page entitled, "In account A.B. Bailey to T.W. McCaa". On this page are listed various medical procedures carried out between January 5, 1860 and October 9, 1860. At the bottom of the page is noted that he received payment in full from Mr. McCaa, February 1, 1862. Among these are: dressing of wound - \$3.00; on January 5, 1860. After that he dressed the wound 3 more times at a dollar each. Examination and prescription March 24, 1860 - \$2.00. Visit in the evening (?) direct - \$2.00; March 29, 1860, visit, prescription and direct - \$3.00. April 2, 1860, "rising from bed visit in the night, prescription and direct daughter \$5.00." April 3, 1860, "visit morning, noon and evening, prescription and direct - \$4.00. December 28, 1860, administering clyster - \$5.00. Also in this collection are two letters to the editor of a newspaper in which Bailey states he is opposed to the

confederate states removing the iron from the Florida railroad
company's tracks apparently for use in the war. I did not read
it intoto.

Baldwin, Abel Seymour

A.S. Baldwin was Chief Surgeon of the District of East Florida as well as Surgeon in chief of the Confederate Hospital at Lake City and served on the Medical Examining Board at Lake City. His Letterbooks, Casebook and Furlough Book at the Museum of the Confederacy in Richmond are a source of much of the information we have of Confederate Surgeons and Medicine in Florida. See many notations in the chronological file and three cards in the bibliography file.

Letter: Baldwin to J.E.A. Davidson, Nov. 20, 1863; Baldwin Letterbooks, Vol. 1.: Tells Davidson he has been relieved, "... of the arduous duties of the Hospital & the Med. Exam. Board & will hereafter confine myself to the duties of Chf. Surg. of Dist. only."

EAST Baldwin became Medical Director of Hospitals of the District of Florida and part of Georgia - see card Feb. 27, 1865, (chronological file) and later, Apr. 23, 1865, the State of Florida alone, (see card, Apr. 23, 1865, chronological file)

Baldwin signed a letter to J.W. Morel, Mar. 1, 1865, as:
"Acting Medical Director, East District Florida and
Quitman, Ga."

Still later Baldwin became Medical Director for the ~~XXXX~~
District of Florida. See notations in the bibliography

Issued the call in November 1873 for doctors of Florida to meet at his home-office on Jan. 14, 1874, to organize a state medical society.

He had come to Jacksonville in early Dec. 1838.

It was he who issued the call for the organization of the Duval County Medical Society, "the first and only county medical society in Florida for two decades," which was organized on May 25, 1853.

He was elected first president of the "The Medical Association of the State of Florida" and was elected for a second term in 1875.

On these pages the editor acknowledges receipt of the records and proceedings of two annual meetings in January 1874 and February 1875, of the Florida Medical Association together with the address of the President, Dr. Baldwin, upon the Climatology of Florida. The editor then picks at Baldwin's lack of clarity in expressing himself with two illustrations. He ends up with the following commentary:

"We donot for a moment believe that our writer's ideas are as inexact or incorrect as such phrases would indicated. He may very probably have a very clear and correct knowledge of his subject of his subject. But surely it is not unreasonable to expect of a scientific writer some attention to exactness and accuracy of language, especially when dealing with a new and difficult science...."

Dr. W.L. Baldwin is a son of Abel S. Baldwin, M.D., and a native of Jacksonville, where he was born in 1840. After a primary education in the schools of his native city, he entered Dr. Prentice's school at Geneva, N.Y.; afterwards the Walnut Hill School at the same place, then Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute of Troy, N.Y., from which he graduated in the class of 1861. He subsequently pursued a course of study in the Albany Medical College of Albany, N.Y., graduating therefrom in August 1863. He began practicing his profession in Geneva, and was subsequently located at Utica, N.Y. He returned to Jacksonville in 1879, where he has been since located. Dr. Baldwin occupies a series of comfortably appointed offices in the second story of the well-known Palmetto Block on Bay Street.

Bartram, John, M.D.

Location: Traveled in east Florida about 1765

This physician and surgeon lived 1699 to 1777 and was born in Derby, Delaware County, Pennsylvania and orphaned at the age of 13. He inherited a prosperous farm in Derby and both farmed and practiced medicine and surgery. His name appears in Haller's "Bibliotheca Anatomica" as a physician. At the age of 66 he set out with his 29 year old son, William Bartram (1739-1823) to explore east Florida. "He sojourned 400 miles making accurate observations of the river, its lakes and branches, the soil, flora, fauna and the climate. In 1766 he published in London: 'Description of East Florida with a Journal Kept by John Bartram, Botanist to the Floridas.'" Apparently William also wrote a biography of his father though the exact title is not stated. John was a humanitarian and emancipated his slaves even before the American Revolution. They ate at the dining table with he and his family. He died on September 22, 1777, approaching the age of 80.

But an unusual thing happened to cause him to break his rule. A man was attacked by the Ku Klux Klan and tarred and feathered. Finding that none of the other doctors would treat him, Dr. Brinson did so, and was accepted into the community. He opened up his own office on Broadway, practicing medicine, and holding the office of City Commissioner until his death in 1936. As a point of interest, the month that Dr. Brinson died, he delivered 11 babies, mostly in the homes of the patients.

The Brinsons lost their first son, Nils Haynes, of whooping cough, at the age of 18 months. In 1925 their son, Edward, was born. In later years, he became one of Kissimmee's leading attorneys. After Dr. Brinson's death, his wife went to work for the Welfare Department and held this office until her retirement in 1963.

W. Glenn Ray with his wife and daughter, Marjorie, came to Kissimmee in 1925. They were to become residents.

He was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine in 1809, the title of his graduation thesis being 'Hepatitis'. Little has been written concerning Dr. Bronaugh's life and some of that is inaccurate... He received the appointment of surgeon of the 12th Infantry on April 28, 1812. The same month two years later, he was appointed hospital surgeon, and again in April of 1818, he became assistant surgeon general. Parton (James Parton, biographer of Andrew Jackson) described him in these words: 'The General's military surgeon was a high-spirited Virginian, a stickler for the

code of honor, heartily believing in the pistol as the great social regulator, and always prompt to act in accordance with that faith."

The Legislative Council of Florida was organized at Pensacola July 22, 1821, and on the following day Dr. Bronaugh was unanimously elected president of the Council. He was very modest in his acceptance speeches printed in the article noted in the reference above. Bronaugh was also known as resident physician and president of the Board of Health and as such was issued the first permission to practice medicine in Pensacola under the _____.

This ordinance is reproduced in the above reference, p. 764. Brosnahan was the third physician accepted to practice under the American rule. It is of interest that Dr. Brosnahan was listed as alderman of the city council, which in turn made up the Board of Health _____.

It is not clear whether he actually practiced medicine or surgery in Florida. No further is made of him and at no time are his initials or first name given.

Dr. Charles Jenkins Burroughs was born at Savannah, Ga., in the year 1846. He graduated from the Savannah Medical College in 1868 and subsequently attended lectures in New York. He began practising in Eden, Ga., at which point he was located until the early part of 1884, when he removed to this city and became associated with his brother.

Byrne was a career officer in the U.S. Army medical department and died Sept. 6, 1860, at Ft. Moultrie, S.C. Some biographical detail appears in Brown: The Medical Department of the United States Army, etc.
