Dr. Hipolitus Cadorette-Huau was born in the city of Baltimore in the year 1809. He went to Cuba when very young, and after taking a preliminary course entered the Royal University of Havana, from which he graduated with a "Ph.D." in the Class of '38. He subsequently re-entered the university taking a medical course, and graduated with the degree of M.D. in 1843. After three years spent in Paris in completing his medical studies, he returned to Cuba and entered the government medical service as an assistant surgeon, from which position he rose to the rank of chief surgeon of the military hospital, Matanzas. He also became a member of the Royal Academy of Sciences of Havana. He remained in the Cuban Government service until 1872, when, on account of political troubles, he came to this country, locating at Jacksonville, where he has since practised. Dr. Huau is noted for his skill in the treatment of lung diseases.

Besides a complete line of choice drugs and patent medicines, a well-selected stock of cigars and smokers' articles is kept, and the store is the stationery and news depot of the village. A feature of the establishment is a fine soda-fountain, which adds materially to the ensemble of the store. Dr. Canova carries a fine stock, his store is a popular resort, and a large patronage is enjoyed.

Dr. Diego Alvarez Chanca, a prominent physician from Seville, was surgeon on Columbus' flagship and virtually fleet surgeon during his second voyage. He received a pay of 50,000 maravedis (\$327.50) a year and was the first graduate physician to visit the new world. He is left the first description of diseases among the indians and the remedies they employed, he was the first coroner in that he examined the much decayed bodies of the garrison at Navidad, he exposed the first case of malingering in a petty indian chief, and he left the most reliable account of Columbus' second voyage.

"The next day at six o'clock in the morning we reached Quincy. I hastened to go to see Mr. Chapman, a young physician who is busy studying natural sciences; his welcome was most fraternal. He had just discovered in the neighboring woods a fine forest tree not yet described, and he had sent the details about it to Dr. Torrey." This took place Feb. 26, 1838.

A medical practitioner and botanist; born at Southampton, Mass., Sept. 28, 1809; died in Apalachicola, Fla., Apr. 5, 1899, in his 90th year. ~~Again~~ Began the study of medicine with Dr. Albert Reese of Washington, Ga., and continued it at Savannah. Began his practice at Quincy in the winter of 1835-36 then moved to Marianna and finally to Apalachicola. Received an honorary degree of M.D. ~~of~~ from the Louisville Medical Institute in 1846 at the time he settled at Apalachicola. Was greatly interested in botany, entomology, nerology. In 1860 published "Flora of the Southern United States." --This was for nearly 15 years the only manual of flowering plants in the southern United States. The genus *Chapmannia* is named in his honor--a yellow-flowered legume of Florida. A robust man at the age of 83, he walked 13 miles to

Before moving to Charlotte Harbor he lived in Webbville, Florida, where he was appointed one of the trustees for the school lands of Jackson County in 1832. Later that year, although recommended by the Seminole Chief Blount, he was denied a position as physician on the government-sponsored exploring party to view the western lands assigned to the Seminoles. Finally, he had been one of the contractors associated with repairing and rerouting the road from Tallahassee to Pensacola." Buker gives several references to back up the above account.
