While in Jacksonville he wrote letters to his brother which were printed in the Portsmouth Journal (Aug. 2,9,16,23, 1834) and in the Hampshire Gazette of Northampton, Mass. (Aug. 13,20,27, and Sept. 3, 1834). Mr. Hoole has edited these and reprints them at the above reference. Apparently Durkee never practiced in Florids. The letters concern themselves with the flora and fauna of Florida with one excursion to an indian mound on the St. Johns and occasional references m to the customs. There is a single reference to medicine the use of alligator musk as medicine (purpose not stated), p. 298 Durkee, H
