Later in this book mention is made that the same Dr. Daniel was a practitioner in Jacksonville and a member of the board of health during the yellow fever epidemic there.

Apparently this same letter is reproduced in: Fleming: Memoir of Capt. C. Seton Fleming, pp 100-102, however, it is addressed to L.I. Fleming, Esq. Again, no medical details. Daniel is styled, "Surgeon of the Eight Florida."

The residence of Dr. George W. Davis, is situated on a fine broad road some 200 yards from the King's Road, and a short quarter of a mile from the St. Augustine and Jacksonville Ferry. He possesses some seven and three-quarter acres, remarkably well fenced and kept, and every surrounding gives evidence of a well-managed place. The house is a handsome and commodious building, and all the outhouses, well-house, etc., especially a large house for packing oranges, are well worthy of inspection. Dr. Davis also has three acres a little separated from his main place. He has a very fine orange-grove of some 1200 trees, more than half bearing. Dr. Davis also grows grapes, figs, almonds, Japanese plums, etc. He came here for his health in 1870, consequently is quite an old resident and imparted much valuable information to the writer. Dr. Davis was born in Onodaga County, N.Y., in 1882 educated at the Onodaga academy, also in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he studied medicine. He afterwards practised at Seneca Falls, N.Y. He was two years Mayor of that city, also Supervisor

of Seneca Falls, and surgeon of the Board of Enrolment of the
24th District, State of N.Y., during the Civil War, with
headquarters at Auburn. His place is valued at \$30,000. Dr.
Davis is the author of a popular treatise on the culture of the
orange, which has met with a wide sale.

He did practice from 1925 to 1926 in Miami and had his office across the hall from Dr. John Newton in a building on Fifth Street N.W. just east of Second Avenue, however, he didn't like Miami because of the crowds and the expensive way of life so two weeks before the 1926 hurricane he went back to Madison to spend the rest of his life. Madison, Florida was in his own home. He devoted the top floor to a five bed hospital where he took care of his sickest patients and some of his deliveries. His wife was a registered nurse who was trained at "the Tampa Floating Hospital" and she assisted him in his practice and deliveries. He delivered each of his three children in his home. He also was the coroner for the county. Charlie recalls that on one trip to examine a Negro who was dead out in the woods the county sheriff would not accompany him because he didn't like to see dead people. Charlie recalls two other doctors in Madison about this time, a Dr. Long and a Dr. Hamrick. He does not know the initials.

It does not clearly state whether he was a physician. Further it does not make clear a definite relationship between Dr. J. G. Dell and Drs. J. M. Dell and Maxey Dell of Gainesville.

His father ran a meat market about where the Kinney Shoe is now located on the east side of the square , number 19 Southeast First Street. On page 22 it is stated that "The Dell family is one of the oldest in Alachua County." It goes on to list Dell's living in Newmansville including one, Dr. J. G. Dell.

These were there during the time 1824 to 1854. What relation he was to "Dr. Jim" is not stated. Dr. J. M. Dell had one son who is a physician and radiologist known as "Maxey".

(Aug. 13, 20, 27, and Sept. 3, 1834). Mr. Hoole has edited these and reprints them at the above reference. Apparently Durkee never practiced in Florida. The letters concern themselves with the flora and fauna of Florida with one excursion to an indian mound on the St. Johns and occasional references to the customs. There is a single reference to medicine - the use of alligator musk as medicine (purpose not stated), p. 298.
