He returned to Florida in 1870, and began the practice of his profession in this city, where he has since been located. Dr. Fernandez's offices are located in the front of the second story of No. 21½ West Bay Street. His practice is chiefly surgical, although he is a physician as well. Dr. Fernandez holds the office of medical examiner for the Equitable Life Insurance Co. of New York, and is their State medical referee. He is also medical examiner for the New York Life Insurance Co. of that city, and one of the medical staff of St. Luke's Hospital of this city.

It was held at the Musical Fund Hall, Locust Street; degrees conferred by the Rev. John Ludlow, D.D., Provost and the address was delivered by Dr. William Gibson, Prof. of Surgery.

Among the class was Fleming, George C. of Jacksonville, E. Florida whose essay was on Masturbation.

Also in this class from Florida were: John Pope DuVal of Tallahassee

In a letter dated Aug. 25, 1851, Wm. J. L'Engle mentions a Dr. George Fleming has given up his profession (physician) and gone to Princeton, N.J. to study divinity. Since L'Engle was from Jax. it may well be the same Fleming. See: L'Engle: Letters of Wm. J. L'Engle, etc.

Tells of Chief Neamathak's settlement crossed a (north) watercourse which the Indians considered as a source of the St. Marks. Tells of other Indian activities. Heavily populated at this time with Indians. "Dr. Foster and myself, in seeking fresh water came suddenly upon a female alligator

nursing numerous brood of young ones on the surface of the pool. She immediately sank. The young ones did not seem intimidated and swam around on top barking."

(p41) "Dr. Foster brought in a large pelican which he found dying, choked by a fish he had taken."

42 (p44) Dr. Foster visited me in the evening and informed me that they had run 4 or 5 miles out from the shore and found the water shoal the whole distance."

In an article datelined "Pepper Hammock, Merritt's Island, March 3rd," is mentioned a Dr. Fox partaking in looting the wreck La Dona, driven ashore 12 miles North of Canaveral Light, Aug. 17, 1871.

In another article "The Farming in Florida" and dated Fort Capron, Florida, April 1 (?) 1873, it says he came to Florida "5 years ago from Savannah, Georgia" apparently for his health. He settled on Mosquito Lagoon then after two years moved to Symerna. He is styled "one of the most careful and trustworthy guides in Eastern Florida". There is no mention of his being a medical doctor.
