Born September 25, 1825, at Grove Hill, Bottencourt, Va. Moved with his parents to Florida when he was a year old. Attended school at Richmond, entered the Univ. of Va. at the beginning of the 1844-45 session and graduated at its close; studied at the Univ. of Maryland in Baltimore; and then returned to Florida to practice medicine with Dr. James Randolph until the War between the States. Served as confederate army post surgeon with the rank of Major in the southwestern army under Gen. Braxton Bragg during the entire period of the war, or at least until he was captured at Shiloh while caring for the wounded. After the war he practiced

"Thos. P. Gary was born in Abbeville, Cokesbury District, South Carolina, April 10, 1835. He was of English extraction. Dr. Gary received his academic education in his native State. He read medicine with his brother, Dr. F.E. Gary; attended his first course of lectures in Philadelphia; and subsequently graduated in Charleston at the South Carolina Medical College in 1856, and at once located in Brooksville, Fla., where he was in practice until the civil war came on.

"At the beginning of the war he entered the Confederate service as a volunteer, but was soon commissioned as a surgeon, and assigned to duty in the Western or Trans-Mississippi Department. He was with the army of his choice, in the field and hospital service, until the close of the war.

"The war over, he returned to Brooksville, where he practiced his profession until 1867, when he removed to Ocala, Fla., where he lived until the day of his death, June 10, 1891.

"For a period of eight years he was mayor of his adopted city." Then follows extensive eulogy but no more biographical data.

He became interested in some real estate scheme in Cuba, with J.P. Donnelly, and others after the Spanish American war and died in Cuba on Christmas Eve, 1899, age 69.

This mission ministered to the spiritual and physical needs of the Seminole Indians. Godden died in 1914 and the mission closed until reopened at Everglades City under Deconess Bedell.

The second reference (Frank Farmer) lists him as an M.D. and mentions his asking the State Board of Health to survey and treat the Seminoles for hookworm infections.
